The groundwork of membership growth

In THE ROTARIAN, October 1945, Paul Harris wrote, "Of the thousands of matters on which Rotarians, of so diverse a complexion disagree, there is one in which we are in perfect accord. We believe in the brotherhood of man ... Rotary International itself offers a review of a world at peace."

When Paul Harris wrote in 1945 that Rotary offers a preview of a world at peace, he did so with the knowledge that forty-nine Rotarians helped draft the United Nations Charter in San Francisco. In addition, many of the delegates from around the world were also Rotarians. Edward R. Stettinius, Jr., who was Secretary of State of the United States, wrote: "The invitation to Rotary International to participate in the United Nations Conference as consultant to the United States delegation was not merely a gesture of good will and respect toward a great organization. It was a

simple recognition of the practical part Rotary's members have played and will continue to play in the development of understanding among nations. The representatives of Rotary were needed in San Francisco and, as you well know, they made a considerable contribution to the Charter itself, and particularly to the framing of provisions for the Economic and Social Council.

When the founders of Rotary paved the road ahead and laid the groundwork for membership and continual growth they were explicit in their vision. They were steadfast in their convictions and the provision that neither racial, political, nor religious standards shall constitute barriers to membership. In 1989 gender was added to the list, allowing women participate in active leadership roles.

Celebration Ideas

Here are the fourth 10 of 100 Celebration ideas that are listed on the RI website.



31. Coordinate a centennial plastic duck race with 100 ducks floating down a river. Each duck can represent a Rotary year. Proceeds from any bets can help a local community project.

32. Write an article or book on the history of Rotary in your community. Focus on vocational, community, and international service. Submit it to your local newspaper for possible publication.

33. Conduct a 100-hour telethon. Utilize local radio, public access television, or other means to communicate with the public. Each hour can represent a Rotary year and any funds raised can go to a centennial community project.

34. Ask prominent celebrities in the community to help promote Rotary's centennial. Invite them to speak at a centennial banquet or promote the program through the media.

35. Develop a Rotary Centennial exhibit at the local post office. Use samples of Rotary stamps (see postcards in the *Centennial Promotional Kit*) and highlight local and global Rotary projects.

36. Coordinate with a local television station (morning talk show, evening news weather segment) to have a different Rotarian share a different Rotary project each day for a week. Highlight Rotary history and local and international service efforts.

37. Have a 1905 costume ball where guests dress up. Ask someone to act as Rotary's founder, Paul Harris, and have him share some of Harris's quotes on volunteerism.

38. Help Interactors develop volunteerism exhibits at their schools. Highlight Rotary's century of civic service.

39. Collect 100 pieces of different items (for example, 100 pairs of shoes, school supplies, coats, gloves, eyeglasses, etc.) and distribute to those in need at a centennial event.

40. Create a list of top 100 Rotary projects and share it with your local newspaper or magazine. Offer local and international examples.

members in this our Centennial Year, you might want to think about developing a Prospective Member Packet. An essential part of successfully recruiting members to your club is informing them of Rotary's benefits, as well as the responsibilities of club membership. Providing a comprehensive Rotary information packet to prospective members, either when they attend a club meeting or meet with a club member afterward, is an effective way to accomplish this. Include the latest issue of the *Rotarian* magazine in your packet to illustrate the many humanitarian projects being carried out by Rotary clubs around the world. Two other must-have RI publications are "This is Rotary" (001) and "Rotary Basics" (595). This is Rotary provides a brief overview of Rotary, while Rotary Basics outlines Rotary's history, principles, and programs.

To help prospective members understand your club, develop a club brochure or fact sheet that details information about your club's history, recent service projects, featured speakers, youth programs, and social events. It should also list the responsibilities of membership in your club, including expectations for attendance and membership costs. Making prospective members aware of your club's expectations from the start will help ensure retention.

I have asked all clubs that have a club brochure to send me a copy. I have received a number of them and will be glad to share them with you so you don't have to reinvent the wheel. By providing prospective members with comprehensive information about your club and RI, and by showing them how fulfilling Rotary is, you will get them excited about joining your club and motivated to Celebrate Rotary.

The RI Membership Development and Extension Award Program recognizes one club in each District in each of the following areas:

- The club in the district with the highest growth rate (percentage).
- The club in the district that inducted the most new members.
- The club in the district with the highest retention rate (percentage).

Why don't you plan now to earn one of these awards? Just remember the 6 P's (prior, proper, planning, prevents, poor, performance).

Effort underway to buy Paul Harris' house

A group of Illinois, Indiana and Michigan Past District Governors has been working with past and current RI directors over the past five years to acquire the Paul Harris house located in Morgan Park which is a neighborhood on the south side of Chicago.

Rotary International has allowed the group the use of the name "Paul and Jean Harris' Home Foundation" for a non profit foundation, with the expressed mission of acquiring the house and operating it as a museum at no cost to Rotary International.

This group of PDGs has formed a not for profit foundation (The Paul and Jean Harris' Home Foundation) which needs the help of every Rotary District, Club and individual Rotarian to have the house available for the 2005 Centennial Convention in Chicago.

Paul and Jean moved into the house in 1912. The house was selected because it was very near to the location that Paul met Jean in 1910 with a hiking group. Paul and Jean lived in the house until Paul's death in 1947. The house was the meeting place in the early years of Rotary, 1912-1922, with many interested persons from around the world who wanted to start a Rotary club in their country. Many Rotarians were invited to Paul's house when they visited Chicago. Paul planted many trees in his yard in memory of those who visited his home. It was considered a great honor in Rotary to have been invited to "Comely Bank," The house was named "Comely Bank" after the street and district that Jean lived in Edinburgh, Scotland.

With your help we can acquire the house and preserve it as a museum. The house would be open by arrangement to any Rotarian or club to visit and to have their very special meeting in the house. There are many other planned Rotarian uses for the house including being a

depository of the Rotary Presidents personal correspondence.

Rotarians have maintained an ongoing relationship over the past five years with the current owners of the house (Non Rotarian) who have been reluctant to sell, but have now consented to the purchase by the above foundation. They want to finalize the purchase not later than December 31, 2004. The group has been given an option to purchase the house for \$550,000, which was appraised by a non Rotarian appraiser at a current fair market price of \$561,687. The offer to buy for \$550,000 has been accepted and a non refundable deposit of \$1,000 was given. That option expires on September 1, 2004. The sales agreement requires at least 5% of the full purchase price on September 1, 2004 with the balance at closing but no later than December 31, 2004.

Along with the purchase of the house the group needs to establish a contingency fund for future operations and maintenance of the house. The entrance fees, net funds from the bus tours during the Rotary Convention in 2005 and continued club contributions will allow us to make necessary repairs, to restore the house to how it was when the Harris's last occupied it, and to comply with the ADA code (Americans with Disabilities Act).

We are well aware that we have taken on a very difficult task of raising funds to save Rotary History with all of the other requests there are for Rotary's help and funding in the world, but we believe this will be a fitting Centennial Project.

If we do not save Paul's House now there may never be another chance as old homes in this historic and very desirous area are being torn down and new very large estates being built in their place.

We have a list of items such as letters, pictures, newspaper articles etc. about Paul and Jean Harris that various clubs and Rotarians have in their possession and have expressed an interest in giving these items or have them on temporary or permanent loan to the Paul and Jean Harris Home Foundation for safe keeping and cataloging and for the rest of the Rotary World to see. We know there are many other such items as Paul traveled around the world many times. We would like those Rotarians or clubs to contact us and tell us about such items and would hope that they might want those items to be displayed or copies of the items in the Paul Harris House. We would very much like to have your views and your support for this Historical Rotary Centennial Project.

CART delegation attends Alzheimer's symposium in Philadelphia

On Friday, July 23 I was privileged to be a part of a delegation of six Rotarians from the Carolinas and Georgia plus four of our spouses in attending a Symposium honoring The CART Fund in Philadelphia.

The event was scheduled to follow the closing day of an International Conference on Alzheimer's Research so that the scientists participating and/or attending could be present. It was for me one of the most memorable events of my almost 38 years in Rotary. It was planned by and CO-chaired by Dr. John Trojanowski and Dr. Sam Gandy with assistance of four of our grant recipients.

The Symposium included research reports from eight of our nation's top Alzheimer's scientists who all were so very generous in their praise of The CART Fund. Many of the comments explained

how their research would not have been possible without CART funding. One would find it difficult to assemble a more highly respected group of scientists.

A luncheon in our honor followed the presentations and then we toured Dr. Gandy's extensive laboratory at the Farber Institute for Neurosciences at Thomas Jefferson University of which he is the Director.

Jack Bass, Vice President of our Board and Chairman of the Grants Committee, has arranged for photos and a video presentation which we plan to have available to you soon. We hope it will enable you to hear directly about the progress being made on Alzheimer's. It is very encouraging.

Dr. Gandy, who has chaired the advisory group of scientists who have served as advisors for all five of our CART grants, received his M.D. and Ph.D degrees from MUSC and is a native of Chesterfield, S. C. which is where my family was living when I was born.

Dr. Trojanowski lived in Sumter when his father was stationed at Shaw AFB and his sister was born here. He is the Director of the University of Pennsylvania Alzheimer's Disease Center. We truly had a South Carolina connection.

I just wish all of you could have shared this special day with us. It would have made you even prouder than you already are to be a Rotarian. Your generous support of CART has truly made a difference.

Rotary Leadership Institute: March 5, 2005

RLI is a training program that was begun in Zone 33 during the past Rotary year. Its goal is to train club members to become outstanding club leaders. The training materials that are used are standardized throughout the zone so that participants may attend sessions in any location throughout the Carolinas and the Virginias. 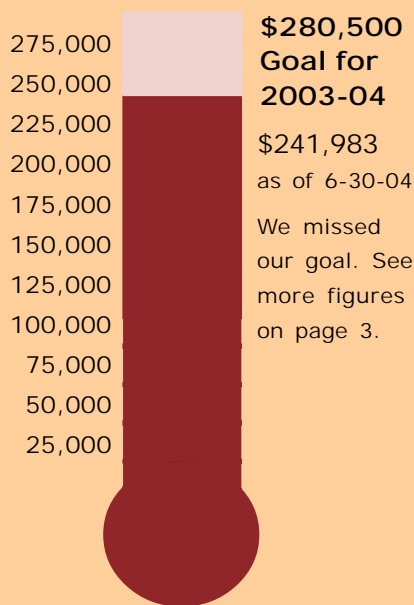
Topics covered include how to organize and run a meeting, the Rotary Foundation, membership development and other subjects that help strengthen club leaders.

The first RLI to be held in our district will be March 5, 2005, in Greenville. **Clubs will be asked to nominate members to participate in the day-long training.**

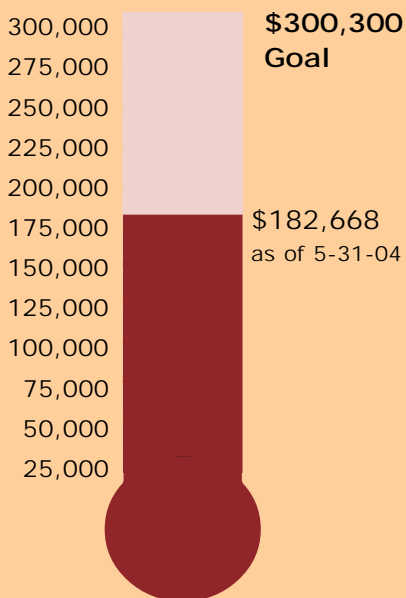
Terry Weaver of the Greenville club is coordinating the event. PDG Sue Poss is a member of the Zone RLI Executive Committee.
