## The Rotary Foundation: The Action Arm of Rotary

November is Rotary Foundation Month and as we all know The Rotary Foundation is the true Action Arm of Rotary. On July 1, 2004 the "Every Rotarian Every Year" initiative was launched. This marketing plan is designed to instill a sense of ownership of the Foundation among our members. We have seen that when Rotarians make a contribution to the Foundation, no matter what the size, they become invested in the Foundation's future and want to do more, whether it is raising their level of support, organizing a Matching Grant project, or hosting a Group Study Exchange team. The EREY program is designed to encourage every Rotarian to contribute something to the Annual Programs Fund every year with the overall goal to be a minimum of \$100 per capita.

For the first time, local Rotary clubs were asked to set their individual club goals. The clubs in District 7750 met the challenge and we were the first District in Zone 33 to have 100% of our clubs reporting. **You, the individual clubs, set the District 7750 goal at \$301,675.00.**

Now the real challenge begins. In order to better track our progress the Foundation has asked that we submit 50% of our APF pledge by December 31, 2004, 75% by March 31, 2005 and 100% by May 31, 2005. By achieving the \$100 per capita goal, the Foundation will be able to meet the need for humanitarian and educational programs identified by clubs and districts.

Our success in the centennial year will not be measured by per capita giving but by hopes and dreams achieved, by the benefits that our gifts

bestow on the children, families and young people whose needs are met when our centennial contributions are spent.

I would be remiss in talking about the Foundation without mentioning PolioPlus. It is true that major gains have been made in the global fight against polio. In September 1994, the entire Western Hemisphere was certified polio free. But, some of the most difficult battles have yet to be fought. Six countries remain polio endemic. Most of these countries lack

sufficient political and economic commitment, or are embroiled in conflicts.

The active participation of every Rotarian in every club and district will be required to achieve the goal of a polio free world. Polio is a disease that does not respect geographical or

political borders. To become complacent is to risk losing the gains we have made. Therefore, Rotary International encourages every Rotarian to continue their commitment to global polio eradication by remaining knowledgeable about Rotary's historic support of this public health initiative and by continuing to participate in the PolioPlus program.

Each club in District 7750 made a three-year commitment beginning in the 2002-03 year. If your club hasn't fulfilled its commitment now is the time to do so.

Finally, we must remember that financial support is critical to our Foundation's future, but we must also keep in mind that fundraising itself is not a goal but a tool, a vital resource that allows us to put our Rotary ideals into action and better serve our communities and the world.

# EREY

## Every Rotarian Every Year

The guiding principle of Every Rotarian, Every Year (EREY) is the full participation and support of our programs and ensuring that adequate funding is available for these programs every year. The EREY initiative encourages:

- Every Rotarian and every club to participate in a Foundation project every year;
- Every Rotarian to contribute to the Foundation's Annual Programs Fund personally every year;
- Every Rotary club to set a minimum goal of \$100 per capita in contributions to the Annual Programs Fund every year.

### Permanent Fund Update

As of Sept. 30, expectancies to the Permanent Fund were \$276.4 million. The Fund's net assets were \$141.2 million as of 30 June 2004. The Permanent Fund goal is \$500 million in net assets and expectancies by 30 June 2005.

### Bequest Society Update

As of Sept. 30, there were 3,893 Bequest Society commitments at an expected value of \$165.1 million. These commitments represent a significant percentage of the expectancies of the Permanent Fund.

### Donor Advised Funds Update

As of Sept. 30, there were 37 DAF accounts with a fair market value of \$1.9 million. For additional information on The Rotary Foundation Donor Advised Fund, please visit <http://daf.rotary.org>.

## The Last Child - Global Race to End Polio

A new documentary "The Last Child: The Global Race to End Polio" is airing on public television stations across the United States. This one-hour program captures the dramatic story of the largest public health initiative in history - the global effort to end polio by 2005.

Just as volunteers drive the global effort to end polio, television viewers drive public television stations' program selection process. In certain markets, public television station programmers have not yet selected, or have declined to select, The Last Child, which is being offered to them free of charge through American Public Television (APT) Exchange, the U.S. distributor of the program.

The more educated and interested people become in polio eradication, the closer we are to literally reaching the last child.

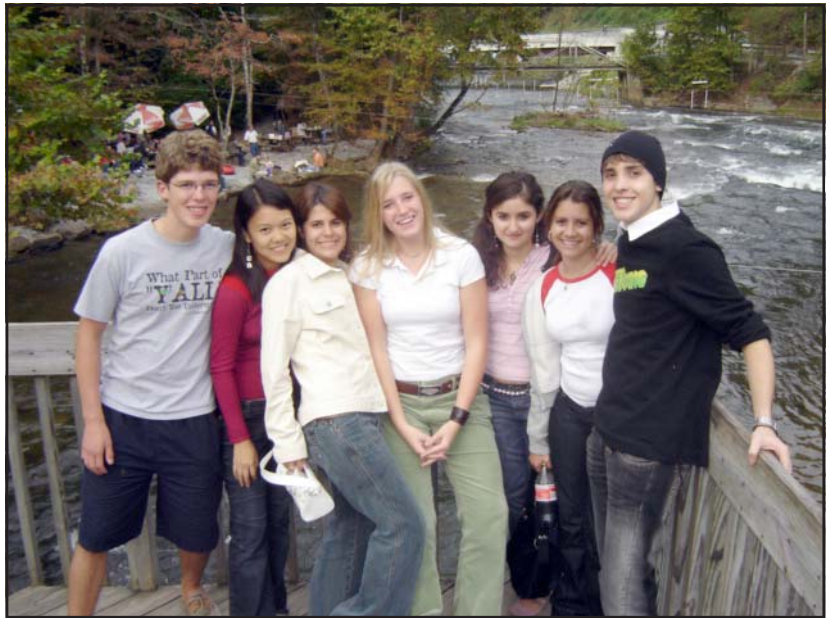

Rotary Youth Exchange is a program where the Rotary ideal of peace through world understanding is made real, in day-to-day encounters between teenagers from around the world and their local Rotary clubs. Each year, between 7,000 – 8,000 students worldwide participate in the two exchanges, most for an academic year.

Urgent business faced by the District 7750 Youth Exchange Committee is the selection of someone to serve as chairman beginning July 1, 2005.

I have served in that capacity since 1999, and will end my term on June 30, 2005. In order to hold interviews for the upcoming group of applicants, the new chairman must be named by November 13, 2004. The official term, of course, begins July 1, but due to the long lead times in youth exchange, the new chairman must be named well in advance.

If no one is willing to take on this rewarding opportunity, the youth exchange

# Greenville Centennial Project Committee hosts event for major donors

On Thursday afternoon, September 23, members of the Greenville Metro Rotary Clubs Centennial Project Committee were busy hanging artwork, checking signage, revving up computers and finalizing arrangements in preparation for the Rotary Family Literacy Center Preview Party set to begin at 5:30 that evening.

The party was planned to say thank you to the project’s major donors and to give them the first peek at the beautiful new center located at the YWCA on Augusta Street. The event was also an opportunity to thank the board members of the YWCA and the Greenville Literacy Association – the two organizations who partnered with the Rotary Clubs to make the project possible.

The Rotary Family Literacy Center is the chosen Centennial Project of six Greenville area Rotary Clubs: The Rotary Clubs of Greenville, Greenville East, Pleasantburg, Foothills, Greenville Evening, and Simpsonville. With the combined support of more than 550 Rotarians, it is the largest project undertaken by Rotarians in Greenville County in decades.

About 75 guests attended the event. Through the generous support of BI-LO, Dahlias Florist, Gretchen’s ABS Cakes and an anonymous donor, the group was treated to a beautiful buffet complemented by music performed by a chamber quartet from the Governor’s School for the Arts and Humanities.

Everyone had a chance to tour the new facility which features a computer lab, two classrooms and three private tutoring rooms.



Guests also viewed the “drop in and play” area – a special feature of the Center which will provide quality child care for kids while their parents attend tutoring sessions.

During a break in the festivities, Project Chairman Matt Shouse welcomed Rotary District Governor Bill Boyd and thanked those in attendance for their generosity. “This is a significant achievement for this community. I thank each of you for your support. You made this project happen,” he said. Chairman Shouse noted that more than \$236,000 had been raised to build the facility, but added that another \$35,000 was needed to meet the capital budget. He said he was confident that these additional dollars would soon be raised.

With the doors of the Center set to open in the coming weeks, 12 students are now on the waiting list to begin classes. Nine Rotarians are trained to start work and more tutors are being recruited and trained to accommodate scheduling needs as the student list grows.

## Celebration Ideas



Here are the seventh 10 of 100 Celebration ideas that are listed on the RI website.

61. Have a sky diving team hold a centennial logo flag or flags as they descend from the sky.

64. Hold a Rotary Centennial immunization day where — even in countries where polio is now a memory — Rotarians encourage children to receive other necessary routine immunizations. Celebrate the eradication of polio and share how Rotary helped make it possible.
65. Plant a grove of 100 trees to protect the environment and provide sanctuary and a place of solitude for others. Name it Rotary Centennial Grove or similar.
66. Conduct a public access or cable television program on the history of Rotary. Use the *History of Rotary* video (921-EN from the RI *Catalog*) and supplement the program with information about local Rotary history and projects.
67. Coordinate with local authorities to have a giant Rotary wheel or centennial logo placed on a water tower or the highest building in your town.
68. Hold a pancake breakfast using the Rotary Centennial as a theme.
69. Conduct a centennial sweepstakes horse race, puppy race, or turtle race. Proceeds on any bets could go to local Rotary projects.
70. In contrast to *Bowling Alone*, Harvard University professor Robert Putman's book on declining community life, organize a Rotary Centennial bowling league. Proceeds from the league could help fund a community service project.

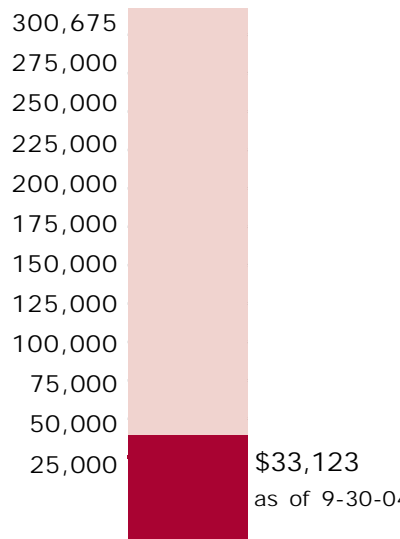

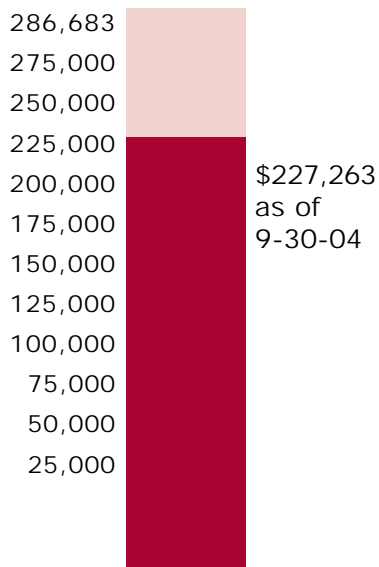
