President of Rotary International 2022-2023



Jennifer E. JonesRotary Club of Windsor-Roseland,
Ontario, Canada

Jennifer's nomination as Rotary International's president for 2022-23, is a groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the organization's 115-year history.

Jones says she sees Rotary's Action Plan as a catalyst for increasing Rotary's impact. "As we reflect upon our new strategic priorities, we could have never envisioned that our ability to adapt would become our North Star during what is inarguably the most profound time in recent history. Using metric-driven goals, I will harness this historic landscape to innovate, educate, and communicate opportunities that reflect today's reality."

As the first woman to be nominated to be president, Jones understands how important it is to follow through on Rotary's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Statement. I will champion double-digit growth in both categories while never losing sight of our entire family."

Jones is founder and president of Media Street Productions Inc., an award-winning media company in Windsor. She was chair of the board of governors of the University of Windsor and chair of the Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce. She has been recognized for her service with the YMCA Peace Medallion, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal, and Wayne State University's Peacemaker of the Year Award, a first for a Canadian. Jones holds a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.).

A current Rotary Foundation trustee, Jones has been a Rotary member since 1997 and has served Rotary as RI vice president, director, training leader, committee chair, moderator, and district governor. She played a lead role in Rotary's rebranding effort by serving as chair of the Strengthening Rotary's Advisory Group. She is the co-chair of the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee, which aims to raise \$150 million for polio eradication efforts.

Jones recently led the successful #RotaryResponds telethon, which raised critical funds for COVID-19 relief and was viewed by more than 65,000. Jones has also received Rotary International's Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service. She and her husband, Nick Krayacich, are members of The Rotary Foundation's Arch Klumph Society, Paul Harris Society, and the Bequest Society.

Joyce joined the Lancaster Rotary Club in 2011, served as club president 2013 – 2014, and became Assistant Governor for Area 7 in 2018. She is a RLI graduate and multiple Paul Harris Fellow as well as a Major Donor. Rotarian of the Year 2015 – 2016. Joyce originally joined the Rotary family in 1994 as a charter member of Brattleboro Sunrise Rotary (VT), where she also served as club president.



Planning for the 2022-2023 Rotary Year

Rotary District 7750 has a culture of giving to The Rotary Foundation. Why do we give to The Rotary Foundation? Rotary's motto is "Service Above Self" and The Rotary Foundation's motto is "Doing Good in the World". By giving to The Rotary Foundation, we can fulfill both ideals. The Rotary Foundation allows us to pool our resources of time, money, and/or talents with the opportunity of "Doing Good in the World".

Planning for the 2022-2023 Rotary Year starts **now** for The Rotary Foundation.

What can you do now to make sure your year is successful?

- 1. **Goal Setting** Determining club's giving based on past contributions and anticipating new contributions.
 - a. **Major Gifts** Contributions of \$10,000 or more to AF-SHARE or Polio
 - i. If you have club members that make Major Gifts, you will want to thank them for their contribution. Many of them will continue given at a strong level because of their commitment to The Rotary Foundation.
 - b. **Paul Harris Society Member** \$1,000 contribution on annual basis. Can combine AF-SHARE, Polio, and/or qualified Grant.
 - i. Find out how many PHS members are in your club.
 - ii. Consider becoming a PHS member during your year.
 - iii. Easiest way is to sign up for Rotary Direct at \$85 per month to AF-SHARE. Also, I like to recommend contributing \$15 per month to Polio.
 - c. **Sustaining Members** \$100 per Rotary year to AF-SHARE.
 - i. Find out how many members are Sustaining Members.
 - ii. Consider contributing \$100 in July or sign up for Rotary Direct.
 - iii. Encourage members to make quarterly or annual contributions through dues invoicing.
 - iv. Encourage members sign up for Rotary Direct at \$10 per month, \$25 per quarterly, or \$100 annually in a specific month to AF-SHARE.

- d. **100% Paul Harris Fellow Club** Are you a 100% PHF club? (see attached 100% PHF list)
 - i. If yes, then you will always be a 100% PHF club. Your club may make as a goal to keep your club at 100% PHFs by getting newer members to become PHF in their first year or two as club members.
 - ii. If no, determine what it will take to become a 100% PHF club and put a plan together. If you need help, ask the District Rotary Foundation Chair.
- e. **Benefactors** Leaving \$1,000 in your will, beneficiary of Life Insurance or Retirement account, or other method.
 - Look at the number of current Benefactors.
 - ii. Try to increase number by at least 3 members.
 - iii. If you are not a Benefactor consider signing up
 - iv. Ask members to sign up before the District Governor's visit and present to DG.
- f. **Bequest Society** Leaving \$10,000 or more in your will, beneficiary of Life Insurance or Retirement account, or other method.
 - i. Look at the number of current Bequest Society members
 - ii. Try to increase number by at least 1 member.
 - iii. If you are not a Bequest Society member consider signing up
 - iv. If you have a member interested in the Bequest Society, please let the District Rotary Foundation Chair (DRFC) know and please give the member contact information for the DRFC.
- 2. **District Grant** Doing Good in our Communities. The favorite part of The Rotary Foundation is being able to do a District Grant and Global Grants every year. Seeing all the great projects that are done throughout District 7750 is truly a blessing.
 - a. Attend District Grant webinar
 - b. Reports for 2021-2022 due March 31, 2022 (see attached District Grant list)
 - c. Applications for 2022-2023 due April 30, 2022 (see attached Eligibility List)
 - d. Determine with your Board what project you want to do.
 - e. Look at the Eligibility Report to determine Maximum Grant Eligibility.
 - f. Look at last year's grant and determine if you want to reapply for the same thing.
 - g. Keep in mind the needs in your community and the goals of your Rotary Club.
 - h. Popular ideas are Weekend Backpacks, School Supplies, Happy Feet, etc.
 - i. Find something needed in your community with a hands-on opportunity.
 - j. Make sure club members agree to the project.
 - k. Be sure to Brand the project in some way.
 - I. Application Form is on www.Rotary7750 web site e-file form.
 - 3. Global Grants Doing Good in the World
 - a. Haiti Goat Project Part III

District Grant Priorities

The District Grants committee has put a great deal of thought and consideration into allocating our available funds among a growing number of grant applications. Needless to say, we are not able to fully fund all the requests. The total of clubs' grant eligibility far exceeds the total available funding.

There are several reasons why funding may range from 100% of the grant request to 0%, with several partial funding levels in between. In general, grants that likely won't be fully funded fall into one or more of these categories:

- **Small number of beneficiaries** -- In some cases only a handful of people receiving benefit from the grant. Preference is given to projects that benefit larger numbers of people.
- Limited or no Rotarian involvement -- One of the success factors in attracting and retaining members is doing service projects together. Preference is given to projects that engage and involve multiple Rotarians.
- **Limited sustainability** -- Preference is given to projects that have a lasting impact, without need for ongoing maintenance and support. Projects with a 1-time impact that must be funded again and again receive limited, if any funding.
- Projects funding other organizations -- It is our intent to have significant
 impact on projects developed and conceived by Rotary clubs and executed by
 Rotarians. Projects where our funding becomes part of the general operating
 funds of another organization are generally not heavily funded, if at all.
- Projects with limited Rotary branding -- Part of our Public Image, leading to attracting and retaining members, comes from the Rotary brand being prominent during and after the project is completed. Projects where our brand gets "lost" or is overshadowed by another organization receive limited funding.
- Unclear mission or intent -- Funding is minimal for grants where the purpose or intent of the funding is not clear to the committee, such as "everyday programs" usually funded as a club operating expense.
- Outside D-7750 Geography -- District grants are intended for use inside the geography of D-7750. Projects outside the District are generally not funded.

As you build your grant applications, please consider these guidelines. Please note also that the committee is able to consider only the information, data, and facts supplied in the grant application itself. We are not able to fund situations where the need or the benefit is not well understood by the committee. Contact me if you have questions

2022-23 District Grant Application Procedures Rotary District 7750

November 5, 2021

Rotary Clubs were provided with the amount of funding allocated for District Grants in November 2021. The deadline for submission of District Grant applications from clubs is April 30, 2022. The amount of funding available per club typically ranges from \$1,000 to \$5,000. The applicant club must provide a dollar-for-dollar match for whatever total grant amount is applied for.

The amount of District Grant funding that can be applied for is determined by a Rotary Club's total contributions to the Annual Fund of The Rotary Foundation in 2020-21. The following table describes the maximum grant amounts at the different total contribution levels:

Rotary Clubs contributing less than \$50 per capita in 2019-20	Ineligible
Rotary Clubs contributing \$50-\$100 per capita in 2019-20	Up to \$1,000
Rotary Clubs contributing \$100 to \$175 per capita in 2019-20	Up to \$2,500
Rotary Clubs contributing over \$175 per capita in 2019=20	Up to \$5,000
5th Club in combined per capita and total giving	Up to \$6,000
4th Club in combined per capita and total giving	Up to \$7,000
3rd Club in combined per capita and total giving	Up to \$8,000
2nd Club in combined per capita and total giving	Up to \$9,000
1st Club in combined per capita and total giving	Up to \$10,000

Work with local librarians and/or educators to identify age-appropriate books which celebrate the Rotary values outlined above. Conduct a project or program which provides or makes use of such books.

Examples:

2022–2023 Environment Project



Proposed Rotary "Protect the Environment" Project

<u>Project:</u> Construct a garden at an elementary school as an educational amenity

Participants: Rotarians, Administrators, Teachers, Students

<u>How To:</u> The Clemson Cooperative Extension Service offers many resources for constructing a school garden, including an excellent online course that includes the resource materials shown below. Cost of the course is \$75.

<u>Materials to Build the Garden</u>. Clemson also has a \$1500 package that includes tools, aboveground garden frames, soil, fertilizer and all materials necessary to build a raised school garden. Rotary helped procure a grant from the Greenville Soil and Water Conservation District for Alexander Elementary to buy the package.

<u>Pilot Project.</u> The Rotary Club of Greenville has been working with Alexander Elementary, a Title 1 School, for several years. PDG's George Fletcher and Rob Hanley decided to use Alexander for the pilot project. The school librarian volunteered to help with the garden and serve as the link between Rotarians and the administration, janitorial staff and teachers of different grades to work on the project. Rotary will build the initial garden and provide support for maintenance. Rotary also paid for the librarian to take the Clemson Extension Course.

Teachers will hopefully include gardening concepts in their curriculum. There is also a core of after school kids available to work on the garden. Clemson provides a month-by-month schedule on what and when to plant, maintain and harvest the garden.

CITATION GOALS AND INSTRUCTIONS



The Rotary Citation is an award that recognizes the hard work clubs do throughout the year. Taking action toward achieving the citation goals helps clubs engage their members, stay relevant in their communities, and run more efficiently. A welcoming and engaging club also reflects the values of Rotary. When clubs work to achieve these goals, they also contribute to the overall health and culture of Rotary for generations to come.

To be eligible for the Rotary Citation, clubs need to begin the year as active clubs in good standing – or having paid each invoice balance in full upon receipt. To verify that your club is in good standing, check your daily club balance report under Club Administration > Club Finances. You should have an outstanding balance of \$0.00. Invoices are due when they are posted, in mid-January and mid-July.

Rotary club leaders can go into Rotary Club Central and select at least 13 out of 25 goals they wish to apply toward citation achievement. This flexibility allows clubs to choose the goals that are most relevant and achievable. In addition, many goals will be self-reported by marking "achieved" in Rotary Club Central.

To achieve the citation:

- Go to Rotary Club Central
- Review the 25 available goals
- Select at least 13 goals (or more than 50% of the available goals)
- Achieve those goals
- Report achievement in Rotary Club Central by 30 June.

Once you are in Rotary Club Central, navigate to the **Goal Center**, select the **year**, and click on the **All tab** to see the goals.

Read Analysis - This report shows all members that have been sent a a Pmail in the past **90 days**. Each member's reading habits are detailed to the right of their name, including the percentage of Pmails they have read as well as the average time it has taken them to read their Pmails.

The read rate is approximate. Many factors, including off-line viewing, security settings of the reader and network problems at the reader's end affect whether we can tell if a Pmail has been 'read'.

Use this data as guidance, not gospel.

Rotary Adult Harassment Best Practices



Rotary is committed to maintaining an environment that is free of harassment. Harassment is broadly defined as any conduct, verbal or physical, that denigrates, insults or offends a person or group based on any characteristic (age, ethnicity, race, color, abilities, religion, socioeconomic status, culture, sex, sexual orientations, or gender identity).

All members and individuals attending or participating in Rotary meetings, events or activities should expect an environment free of harassment and shall help maintain an environment that promotes safety, courtesy, dignity, and respect to all. Adults who work with youth are subject to policies outlined in Rotary Code of Policies section 2.120.

Adult Harassment Best Practices

If you are subjected to behaviors that violate Rotary's policy on maintaining an environment free of any form of harassment:

- 1. Inform the respondent(s) that the conduct is unwanted and unwelcome and must stop.
- 2. Notify law enforcement if you feel threatened, unsafe, or that criminal activity has taken place.
- 3. Tell someone what happened, for example, a leader in the club, district or zone with documentation of names, dates, times, facts, witnesses, etc.
- 4. Report your allegation to Rotary by contacting your <u>Club and District Support officer</u>. Any Rotarian that has an allegation of sexual abuse or sexual harassment is barred from working with youth in a Rotary capacity, until the allegation has been investigated and cleared.

If you witness harassment of another individual or receive an allegation of harassment:

- Advise the complainant that you witnessed the event or received an allegation of harassment, and express sympathy, support, and compassion. Consult with complainant about reporting incident to a leader in the club, district or zone. If appropriate, determine who will do the reporting and notify law enforcement.
- 2. If the complainant agrees, report the allegation by contacting a leader in the club, district, or zone with documentation of names, dates, times, facts, witnesses, etc. If the respondent is a leader of the club, district, or zone, make the report to another club, district, or zone leader.
- 3. Notify Rotary through your <u>Club and District Support officer</u> that an allegation has been witnessed or received. Any Rotarian that has an allegation of sexual abuse or sexual harassment is barred from working with youth in a Rotary capacity, until the allegation has been investigated and cleared.

Rotary Adult Harassment Best Practices



If you are a club, district, or zone leader and receive an allegation of harassment within your club, district, or zone:

- Express sympathy, support, and compassion with the complainant. Discuss Rotary
 procedure as well as any local club, district, or zone procedures for handling allegations,
 with the complainant. Indicate the allegation will be held in strict confidence and only shared
 if an investigation is pursued. Ask for their desired outcome and if they want an
 investigation.
- 2. Determine if the behavior falls within Rotary's harassment policy and warrants an investigation based on severity and pervasiveness.
- 3. If an investigation occurs, determine who to interview and what questions to ask. It is helpful to have two investigators in any interview or on any phone call, where one asks the questions and the other takes notes. Typically, you would talk to the complainant, respondent and eyewitnesses. Be sure to ask both the complainant and respondent for the names of people that witnessed the incident and add them to your interview plan.
- 4. Conduct the investigation in such a way as to maintain confidentiality to the extent practical under the circumstances. Each person should be notified of the allegations and asked to share what they observed. Requests to interview "character witnesses" those that can vouch for a person's character but were not witness to the events should not be included in your investigation.
- 5. Write a full summary report of the interviews you conducted and share with each person interviewed for their comment and confirmation. Occasionally a witness may alter their testimony after review. In these cases, both you and the other person(s) that conducted the interview need to make a judgement call if complainant is feeling pressured to change their testimony by the respondent or if this is a sincere attempt to correct their previous statement. Add the details of any change in statements to your findings report.
- 6. Complete report with any recommended action for the club, district, or zone to take to address the situation and/or prevent future such occurrences. Share your findings with the relevant club board of directors (club investigation), district governor (district investigation) or RI Director (zone investigation) for further action.
- 7. If the club, district or zone investigation team makes a finding of harassment, you must notify Rotary through your <u>Club and District Support officer</u>. If the local finding is for sexual abuse or sexual harassment, the respondent must be permanently barred from any Rotary activities involving youth.



2022–2023 Working With Youth



Statement of Conduct for Working With Youth

Rotary International strives to create and maintain a safe environment for all youth who participate in Rotary activities. To the best of their ability, Rotary members, their partners, and other volunteers must safeguard the children and young people with whom they come into contact and protect them from physical, sexual, and psychological abuse.

Rotary takes all youth protection concerns seriously.

Rotary's approach to preventing abuse

The safety and well-being of young people and youth program participants are Rotary's highest priority. Our comprehensive approach to youth protection includes:

- No tolerance for abuse or harassment of young people
- Policies that prevent misconduct and outline how to respond to grooming behaviors and abuse that involve youth and other program participants
- Mandatory youth protection training for governors-elect
- A dedicated and trained staff that uses a trauma-informed approach when receiving and responding to reports of sexual abuse or harassment
- A certification process that requires Rotary districts involved in Rotary Youth Exchange to have:
 - Student, family, and volunteer training in abuse prevention
 - Volunteer screening that includes an application, criminal background check, and reference checks
 - A process for reporting allegations of abuse and harassment to Rotary and local law enforcement
 - District-specific youth protection policies
 - On-site evaluations (audits) that are conducted by Rotary staff member

Working with other youth-serving organizations

If your club or district is interested in working or partnering with a local youth-serving organization, we recommend you:

- 1. Ensure any organization you partner with has youth protection policies in place that meet or exceed Rotary's policies
 - Confirm the partner organization has a process to appropriately screen, vet, and train volunteers
 - Confirm the partner organization's program participants receive youth protectionrelated training and education
 - Verify that adults do not have significant, unsupervised, one-on-one contact with youth
 or if they do that there are policies and procedures for ensuring those interactions are
 appropriate, monitored, and reviewed as appropriate
 - Confirm the partner organization has a process to prohibit individuals from contact with youth who are ineligible or have a documented pattern of inappropriate behavior
 - Periodically review the partner organization's youth protection policies if the partner organization does not regularly complete a self-assessment or audit.
- 2. Create a memorandum of understanding to identify your responsibilities, the partner organization's responsibilities, and any shared responsibilities related to youth protection
- 3. Keep program participants' parents/legal guardians aware of your relationship with other youth-related organizations and where they can go to find more information
- 4. Regularly check-in with both your counterparts at the partner organization and youth program participants about your experiences working together
- 5. Stay apprised of the organization's community reputation and any issues that may arise that could compromise the safety of youth or damage Rotary's reputation as a partner
- 6. Modify, suspend, or end Rotary's relationship with the partner organization if an allegation, suspicion, or report of misconduct occurs
- 7. Ensure Rotary branding is used appropriately, clearly, and in accordance with Rotary's policies
- 8. Confirm the partner organization has adequate liability insurance and require the partner organization to indemnify your club or district and name it as an additional insured.

Report a youth protection concern

It's important to understand your responsibility to report any youth protection concerns to Rotary International.

Our incident and allegation reporting policy

Rotary International takes all reports of misconduct seriously, and it is the responsibility of all Rotary members and non-member volunteers to ensure that any serious incidents that involve youth and program participants — including all allegations of abuse or harassment — are promptly reported to local authorities and to Rotary International. Doing so not only is required but also is a way to prevent further abuse or harm.

How do I report a youth protection concern?

- 1. Ensure that the young person is in a safe environment.
- 2. In case of emergency, contact local law enforcement immediately.
- 3. Report your concern to Rotary International, using the button below, within 72 hours. Reporting abuse or a youth protection concern can be difficult. If you need advice or assistance, write to us at youthprotection@rotary.org or call +1 866-976-8279 08:00-16:00 Chicago time (UTC-5 or UTC-6) to talk with Rotary's Youth Protection staff. Our staff members are experienced and trained in receiving reports of abuse or misconduct that involves youth, and each situation will be handled with care and confidentiality.

Reporting requirements according to the Rotary Code of Policies

All allegations of abuse or harassment shall be reported to RI within 72 hours of learning of the incident. Failure to report incidents to RI within 72 hours may result in suspension of the district's Rotary Youth Exchange certification. Where there is sufficient evidence that an individual, club, or district knowingly failed to report as required, the general secretary may determine whether and/or the extent to which involved parties may continue to be eligible to participate in Rotary's youth programs, or whether additional sanctions may be necessary, including but not limited to requiring the club to terminate an individual's membership.

Budgets & Budgeting Best Practices

The following are items that should be considered/included in the budget and budgeting process:

- Club should have a Balance Sheet, showing all club assets (including reserves) and liabilities, updated at least monthly
- Club should have an Income Statement showing all income and expense categories, updated at least monthly
- Balance Sheet and Income Statement should be presented for Board review Monthly (minimum - Quarterly)
- Budget should include all Income/Expense line items as estimated for coming year. Look at history for 2 prior years when estimating.
- Budget should include allowances for expenses outside club operations, such as reimbursement of officers for attendance at District events, Training, RLI, Pre-PETS, PETS, etc. Ensure that club dues are sufficient to cover RI and District dues, plus some operating funds for the club.
- Budget should be broken down monthly, as a Rotary club's income and expenses are "lumpy", with large expense items occurring at irregular intervals during the year. Club reserves must be sufficient to cover expenses in between dues income intervals.
- **Do NOT** use Rotary Foundation contributions as club operating or reserve funds. Those are not the club's funds, and should be forwarded to The Rotary Foundation monthly, or, at a minimum, quarterly. The same goes for CART funds.
- Third-Party Review -- Conduct a <u>review</u> by a CPA or third party not on the Finance Committee or Board at least every three (3) years, and when changing Treasurers. A CPA in the club should be able to help (or you should recruit one as a member).
- Assistant Governors are available to assist clubs with budgeting, if needed. (They are considered ex-officio member of the club board)

IRS & SC Tax Filing



IRS FILING REQUIREMENTS FOR 501(C)4 ORGANIZATIONS

All 501(c)(4) organizations are regulated by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and are required to file annual financial reports.

If an organization normally has gross receipts of \$50,000 or less, it must submit Form 990-N, Electronic Notice (e-Postcard).

If an organization has gross receipts less than \$200,000 and total assets at the end of the tax year less than \$500,000, it can choose to file Form 990-EZ, Short Form Return of Organization Exempt From Income Tax.

Form 990 must be filed by an organization exempt from income tax Form 990 must be filed by an organization exempt from income tax if it has either (1) gross receipts greater than or equal to \$200,000, or (2) total assets greater than or equal to \$500,000 at the end of the tax year.

SOUTH CAROLINA FILING REQUIREMENTS

All charitable organizations that solicit contributions or have contributions solicited on their behalf must register with the Secretary of State's Office prior to any solicitation activity and on an annual basis unless they fall under one of the statutory exemptions from registration, such as churches and educational institutions. The due date is the 15th day of the 5th month after the taxable year ends. There is a \$50 filing fee.

A charitable organization that is required to register with the Secretary of State's Office must submit a <u>Registration Statement for a Charitable Organization (PDF)</u> each year. In addition, a charitable organization must submit the <u>Secretary of State's Annual Financial Report Form (PDF)</u> or the IRS Form 990, 990-EZ or 990-PF each year. Charities can file registrations and financial reports online.

A charitable organization which does not intend to solicit or receive contributions from the public in excess of \$20,000.00 in a calendar year can file an <u>Annual Application for Registration Exemption</u> which also excludes paying the \$50 filing fee.

participate in this opportunity to learn about Rotary and share and network with fellow Rotarians across the Mid-Atlantic region.


Register on the District Calendar on DACDB

The CART Fund provides funds for cutting edge research to cure Alzheimer's disease.

The CART Fund is dedicated to raising funds to provide "seed" money for cutting edge, high impact research in hopes of finding a cure/prevention for Alzheimer's disease. The goal of the Fund is to encourage exploratory and developmental AD research projects within the United States. This is accomplished by providing financial support for the early and conceptual plans of those projects that may not yet be supported by extensive preliminary data but have the potential to substantially advance biomedical research.

One hundred percent (100%) of donated funds go to cutting edge Alzheimer's disease research as of May 2021, *CART has made 67 grants totaling \$11.2 million*, to recognized US research institutions. All administrative expenses of the Fund are paid from interest earned from invested contributions.

The Fund is governed by a Board of Trustees composed of representatives from the Rotary districts which support the program. It is a 501(C)3 organization, Federal ID #31-1466051. The Fund is chartered as a nonprofit organization under the laws of the state of South Carolina.

Liability Insurance & Risk Management



LIQUOR/ALCOHOL LIABILITY

The Program provides liquor liability coverage for bodily injury or property damage to a third party arising from the selling, serving or furnishing of alcoholic beverages, subject to policy terms and conditions. Liquor liability is shown on the Certificate of Insurance, so a request to add or include it is not needed.

When possible, use a third-party vendor to provide and sell/distribute liquor for/at your club and district events. In your agreement, require the vendor to carry liquor liability coverage, request that your club/district be added as additional insured on their policy (\$1M minimum limit) on a primary and non-contributory basis, and require that the vendor provide you a certificate of insurance.

When a third-party vendor is not used, please have any Rotarian or volunteer selling/distributing alcohol at the event be familiar with Training Intervention Procedures (TIPS) or equivalent program. TIPS is a program designed to teach serving alcohol responsibly. Additional information can be found at www.gettips.com.

FIREWORKS:

Rotary International Risk Management would like to remind you that if your Club is planning to hire a pyrotechnics vendor for the detonation of fireworks, your Club is required to purchase a primary general liability policy with minimum coverage limits of \$5,000,000 ("\$5M") per occurrence for the fireworks display.

A local insurance agent should be able to assist your Club in purchasing this policy.

The pyrotechnics vendor is required to have a general liability policy with minimum coverage limits of \$5M per occurrence as well, or the minimum coverage limits required by the municipality, whichever amount is more.

The Program provides coverage excess of your Club's \$5M primary general liability policy in case of a catastrophic loss.

Additional Considerations:

- Before your Club signs the vendor's contract, it should be reviewed by an attorney, and your Club should understand the allocation of responsibilities between your Club and the vendor. Further, do not agree to indemnify the vendor for risks beyond your control.
- Insurance requirements in the vendor's contract should include language that requires them to name your Club as an additional insured on a primary and noncontributory basis and provide a certificate of insurance.

Risk Management needs proof that your Club has purchased a primary general liability policy, so please send us your certificate of insurance at minimum one week in advance of the fireworks display: insurance@rotary.org. Send us the vendor's certificate of insurance as well. If there is a claim, this allows us to respond as quickly as possible.

A primary general liability policy is not required of your Club in the following instances:

- If your Club contributes funds to a fireworks display but does not sign the vendor's contract.
- If your Club sells pre-wrapped fireworks but is not involved in detonating them.

If the municipality instead signs the vendor's contract, but your Club remains in charge of other parts of the event overall, ask if the municipality could include language that requires the vendor to name your Club as an additional insured and provide a certificate of insurance.
