WATER IN HONDURAS

"I believe you have been sent by God"

As a supporter of The Rotary Foundation (TRF), you would be both pleased and satisfied with the work your money is doing in poor villages in Honduras. In a world where water-borne diseases are the cause of half the deaths of children before adulthood, clean water is life-giving. Interestingly, people where child mortality is reduced actually reduce their birth rates, according to the Gates Foundation.

District 7750, with funding from The Rotary Foundation, has been installing clean water systems for villages in Honduras since 2008. DGE Terry Weaver, DGN Lance Young and District Water Resource Coordinator Al Steele traveled to Honduras in September to visit a new project under construction. Serving 225 families of 1,350 people, this system is based on a simple, proven, gravity-based design that will last for decades with no electricity and little maintenance. There are virtually no moving parts.

Al Steele made a profound statement when he said, "Rotarians don't send their money, we bring our money." This, like all Rotary Foundation projects, was identified and proposed by a local club, the Rotary Club of Copan Ruinas, in the heart of Mayan civilization since 400 AD. We met with the club, the second time for Terry and the 35th time for Al, to discuss not only this project but also future needs. We stayed in a hotel owned by the founding President of the Copan Ruinas club. Our driver was a Rotarian cattle rancher — a good thing since these villages are only accessible by 4WD vehicles. These are real Rotarians, just like us, who know what their country needs and are willing to work to help and support projects funded by D-7750 and TRF.

WATER IN HONDURAS—

We met with Chepe Rodriguez, Governor of District 4250, and developed a plan to step up our efforts from 2 projects per year to 6 or 8. He was extremely thankful for your support of projects in his District. There are hundreds of these rural villages, all of whose children die needlessly because of contaminated water.

Make no mistake — there's no free lunch here. Our funds are used only for materials == PVC pipe, reinforcing rod, cement and concrete blocks. Everything else is provided locally at no cost. Local municipalities provide the engineering work. Local businesses haul sand, rebar and pipe up the mountain for us. The villagers themselves provide all the labor. If you want water, you show up and work.

By the time we arrived, the villagers had hand-dug four and a half miles of trench two feet deep and buried PVC pipe from a mountain spring, the source of clean water. We met a crew of 40 who were digging the foundation for a 10,000 gallon storage tank. They stopped work and we spoke with them and they spoke with us, translated by our Rotarian hosts.



One very old man, perhaps 90, stepped forward and said, "I've been praying for this for 25 years. I believe you have been sent by God to bring clean water to our village." We took that compliment on behalf of D-7750 Rotarians whose TRF contributions made this project possible.

Sent by God? Perhaps. But occasionally God needs a little help. You can help by stepping up your support of The Rotary Foundation and our D-7750 water initiative in Honduras.

Presently through the incredible dedication of a small group of our Rotarians, we are having an amazing impact in rural communities in Haiti, El Salvador, Honduras, and Guatemala. Other Rotary Districts are so impressed with our efforts that they

are now increasingly interested in joining our cause.

I believe that in five years, our District Governor will be able to say, "Every dollar you contribute to the Rotary Foundation is returning to our District either to have a positive impact on our communities or to fund projects we control in developing countries."

Please sign up today for the Rotary Foundation Banquet and Seminar that will take place on Friday, November 7 at the TD Center in Greenville.

You will hear incredible speakers from El Salvador talk about the impact our projects are having as well as give us insight into the challenges this and other Latin American countries face as they contend with the violent elements of the growing drug trade there. There will be seminars beginning in the afternoon at 3pm that will give you an opportunity to learn more about our Foundation as well as insights and ideas on membership recruitment and retention and the art of public relations.

The Foundation Banquet is a springboard into **our campaign to raise a record \$375,000** for our Foundation this Rotary year as well as over \$86,000 for Polio Plus.

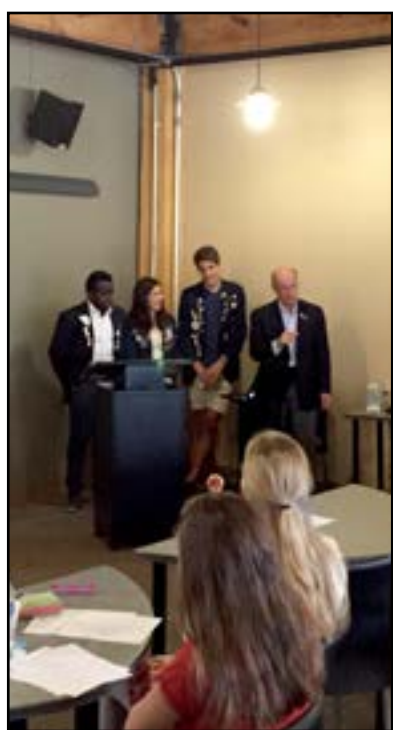

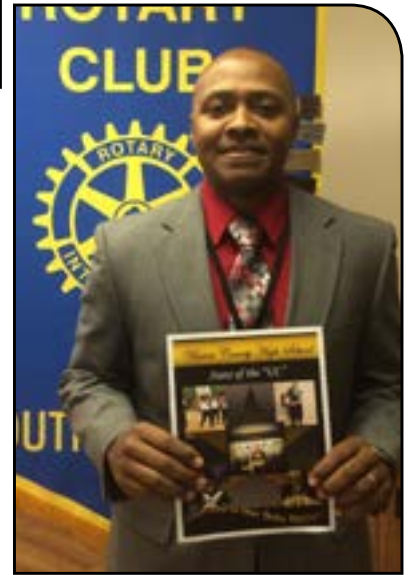

When Rotary began the fight in 1985, polio affected 350,000 people, mostly children, in 125 countries every year. Since then, polio cases have dropped by more than 99 percent.

To date, Rotary has contributed \$1.3 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect more than two billion children.

After nearly 30 years, the Global Polio Eradication Initiative stands on the brink of history by making polio only the second human disease to be stopped forever.

JOSE "CHEMA" ARGUETA

– Fisheries Expert and Community Educator, Mangrove Association: Heralding from a fishing family with deep ties to communities in the Bay of Jiquilisco, Chema has a vast local knowledge of fisheries issues and local livelihoods in El Salvador's largest coastal protected area. He garnered a scholarship through USAID to attend Mt. Hood Community College in Oregon, where he received an Associate's Degree in Natural Resource Management, and has been trained in El Salvador and Japan on fisheries management issues. Apart from managing the training and coordination of resource guards and establishment of best management practices Chema also manages coastal development projects in his community Isla Mendez. He also helps facilitate EcoViva's Community Empowerment Tours Program.

NATHAN WELLER—Program and Policy Director, EcoViva: Nathan has been involved with rural development initiatives in Latin America for more than five years, specializing in local capacity building to solve environmental problems. He completed his Master's degree in International Environmental Policy at the Monterey Institute of International Studies, during which time he worked in the Bay of Jiquilisco with communities to integrate climate change adaptation measures into community-led conservation. Currently as EcoViva's Program and Policy Director, he works closely with local leadership in the Bay of Jiquilisco to formulate and enable management plans and protections in the internationally-recognized protected area. Nathan has also overseen forest management projects for the United States Forest Service, and has also directed wetland conservation on agriculture lands in Central California.



Due to the generosity of anonymous donors from the Pickens Rotary Club, we have the special opportunity to have two outstanding leaders who are immersed in the challenges of the rural countryside in El Salvador. We are excited not only of the timeliness of these leaders' visit with us, but also for the opportunity to recognize firsthand what our Rotary Foundation in concert with some of our lead Rotary Clubs are doing to transform these rural villages into places of self sufficiency and hope.—

VISIT WARM SPRINGS— WHERE THE WAR AGAINST POLIO GOT ITS START!

Join fellow Rotarians on a trip to Warm Springs, Georgia — the home of Franklin Delano Roosevelt's Little White House and the Roosevelt Warm Springs Institute, where polio patients came for treatment before the Salk vaccine was invented.

WHEN: Friday October 17, 2014

WHAT: Tour of the historic site in observance of World Polio Day (Oct. 24).

Your tour will include the FDR Memorial Museum, the Little White House, the historic pools and springs and the Polio Hall of Fame at the Institute. We will be outside, please dress for the weather.

WHY: Learn more about polio and see first-hand the place where FDR invented hydro-therapy rehab treatment for polio. He so loved Warm Springs that he built his Little White House in 1932, the year he ran for president of the United States. He swam in the 80+ degree warm spring waters and received some relief for his paralyzed hips and legs, and brought national attention to Warm Springs. Today Warm Springs is still operating as a rehab center for persons with disabilities.

ITINERARY: Tour the Little White House with our own guide, Kathryn Smith.
