Why organizations (maybe your Rotary club?) fail to perform

If you're doing an assessment of your Rotary club (highly recommended), you may find that the club just isn't performing on a given front, such as:

- Membership growth (our lifeblood)
- Growth in Rotary Foundation contributions (our financial support structure)
- Expansion and relevance of service projects (our core purpose)
- Sustainability of future leadership (our future)

If that's the case, you'll want to figure out why and how to fix the shortcoming. In decades of business experience, I've learned that there are only about three reasons companies fail to perform (in one area or another), and I've also learned that those are the same 3 reasons Rotary clubs fail to perform.

1 They don't get it — The leadership and/or the members just don't understand why it's important.

- Important to grow membership
- Important to support The Rotary Foundation
- Important to regularly reassess, expand, retire and create service projects
- Important to cultivate and grow a supply of capable future leaders.

Clubs simply fail to realize that it's essential to be improving in all 4 areas of performance every year. Club leaders are responsible to move the ball forward at least a few yards every year.

2 They don't care—Leadership lacks either the belief or the will to cure the performance problem. They're willing to accept mediocrity or unwilling put forth the effort to excel. Nero fiddles while Rome is burning. "We've lost a few members but we still have a good solid core." "Companies are looking for well-rounded "C" students." Club leaders sometimes fall into a complacent, comfortable "Status Quo" and simply don't expect to excel in all of these four essential areas.

3 They don't know how to fix the problem

- Don't know what's wrong
- Don't know where to start
- Don't have a strategy or process that works
- Don't have a sustained effort (spotty activity yields spotty results) – the process "breaks"

Take a hard look at your club's performance over the past five years in all four areas. If you find an area that hasn't improved over time, ask yourself, "Is it because we don't get it, because we don't care, or because we just don't know how to improve?" Then go to work on that reason. More next month on how to fix the problem.

Youth Exchange committee to brand program as scholarship

The Rotary Youth Exchange Committee announces plans to rebrand its name to include “Scholarship.”

After attending the North American Youth Exchange Conference in Little Rock, Arkansas, members of the District Committee are reviewing recommendations, by other Rotary Districts, and guidelines from Rotary International, to rebrand the program to better reflect the actual value of the youth exchange experience.

It's more than just a name change on a poster. It's about allowing Rotary clubs to award a valuable scholarship to a worthy high school student. For decades Rotary clubs have been sponsoring and hosting students from more than 100 countries.

For most clubs it is viewed as a line item expense and requires a lot of volunteer time to administer. Because of the time and expense associated with the administration of the program, some clubs had pulled away from regular involvement. This is a real shame, since the exchange program helps to fulfill the 4th Rotary Objective of “*the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace.*” About 8,000 Rotary sponsored students participate every year.

Last year the Ohio District 6690 wanted to know why their program was not growing. They took the lead in reviewing the trend and uncovered several key marketing points.

The findings were plain and simple. “It's a ***scholarship*** and we should be calling it by that name” said Walter Lundstrom, District 6690 Chair – Rotary Youth Exchange Program in Ohio.



It's a scholarship!

Generally, Rotary clubs have been virtually giving away a program that includes almost a year of training and orientation pre-departure, room and board (homestay), school tuition, a monthly stipend, a Rotary Blazer, patches, and pins, business cards and name tags, airport transfers on arrival and departure (students are met at the airport by a program representative), 24-hour worldwide emergency

Here is what the club, the school and the student receive:

- 1 Rotary clubs get the bragging rights of awarding a BIG scholarship.
- 2 They get great PR in their community and the schools.
- 3 The members feel good about being part of the club that is making a direct impact on students from their community.
- 4 It makes it easier for the club to approach their schools with other programs and projects.
- 5 School counselors, teachers, and principals love scholarships, so they become champions of Rotary.
- 6 Parents and students love scholarships, and they look great on resumes.
- 7 Because the students are awarded a scholarship, we can expect and require more from them. The RYE Scholarship is actually a three (3) year program: Year 1: Preparation, training, language acquisition, and learning how to function in a different culture. Year 2: The year abroad – the full experience. Year 3: Sharing the experience, helping new students prepare and train and a personal reflection on their growth and help with their future goals.

assistance, a Monthly stipend, host country training and orientation, regional tours and travel opportunities, Rotary Conferences and meetings, trained local support and counseling, often language training and assistance or school tutors, and planned activities with other RYE students.

We believe the real value of the scholarship should be placed in the \$15,000 - \$30,000 range. This is in line with other independent cultural and study abroad programs. Whatever quantifiable number the committee recommends to the District Governor, the rebranding process opens up a tremendous opportunity for local Rotary clubs and the District to promote its youth programs to schools and the community.

Ohio D6690 expected the rebranding to take two to three years. After 8 months they discovered.

- 100% acceptance by all students and parents
- 100% acceptance by Rotarians and Rotary clubs.
- 6 clubs that refused to sponsor outbound exchange students totally changed their minds and are now bragging about the scholarships they have awarded.

ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARDS

April 24 deadline for 2015 RYLA registration

What: The 33rd annual week-long motivational, leadership training, and free enterprise seminar for rising high school juniors and seniors.

When: June 7-13, 2015. The seminar begins with registration at 3:30 p.m. on Sunday and ends following brunch on Saturday morning.

Where: Erskine College, Due West, South Carolina.

Who: Sponsored by Rotary District 7750 (Western South Carolina).

Why: This seminar is designed to help the delegates develop sound leadership techniques for their daily use in school and extracurricular activities, as well as in life.

Benefits: Personal growth and development through interaction with peers and outstanding business, political, and community leaders. Each delegate will receive a \$5,000.00 per year RYLA Scholarship at Erskine College upon acceptance, renewable for up to 4 years.

Cost: The sponsoring Rotary Club pays \$340.00 per delegate, and each delegate pays \$60.00. Checks should be made payable to RYLA.

- Several school counselors that used to be against RYE are now champions of the Rotary Youth Exchange Scholarship.
- 100% of exchange scholars secured all host families for the inbound students.
- 100% of exchange scholars have written their schools telling about the scholarships they received.
- Dramatic increase of media coverage and new interest from school officials.

March library work team improves Cange's resources

Once upon a time,

... in the lovely Haitian month of March, a Cange Library Work Team entered the village for a two week's stay. They first enjoyed the new Cange librarian, Maradonna (Dona) Pierre, actively engaged in improving the Cange Library. The travelers included Jan Cox (Pleasantburg Rotary), Dianne Clark-Kudless (Eclub of the Carolinas), and Bootie Cothran (First Baptist Greenville, and me.

The weeks passed quickly and at last it was sadly time to depart. As we left, we all agreed that much that we had done together was good. We had—

- Expanded the size and professional base of the Library Committee.
- Met for further choices with the Religious Books Committee—four Haitian ministers (four denominations) and community members.
- Received 10 Bib la (Kreyol Bibles) from Cameron Vipperman of Columbia. Donated four to Haitian religious leaders and placed six in the permanent collection.
- Purchased \$750 worth of new religious books in Port au Prince bookstores with a grant from Greenville's Christ Church Episcopal Women.
- Interviewed and videoed 20 Haitian residents from Cange and nearby towns about their hopes for the library with Bootie (made possible through a FBCG grant providing his transportation and living expenses) Assisted by Dianne.
- Trained 20 primary teachers on Jan's PowerPoint of basic computer concepts (translated to French by volunteer Chantal Smith).
- Shared *The Very Hungry Caterpillar* in Kreyol via Maradonna with two schools' preschool and primary

teachers and children, Jan emphasizing what concepts could be taught from the book.

- Met with ODAMCEJD, Organisation des Dynamistes pour un Avenir Meilleur, a Cange Youth Organization for a Better Future, to discuss their upcoming Quiz Bowl Competition which heavily uses the library, which PILH supports.
- Held a preliminary meeting about expanding the library to meet a variety of learning needs.






