GETTING THINGS DONE

Saving your least-favorite or most distasteful chore until the end of the day is a stress producer. It's not going away, and it dogs you all day. And if you don't get it done, the next day is Groundhog Day.

A better plan? A friend of mine offered me this personal success principle. On a 3"x5" card in your shirt pocket, write the three things you have to get done today. When you start your day, work only on those three things. No email, no Facebook, no report checking. Just work on those three things. This works best if you write those three things on your card the night before.

You'll find, after time, that if you do your three most important things each day, you can probably go home after that. The other things are either so inconsequential they'll go away, or they're problems that will be solved by working on the three important things.

Combine that with the strategy of diving into the most distasteful or most difficult of the three first thing, and you'll end every day saying, "I really made some progress today."

Try it for a week. Or a month. Let me know how it works out for you.

Rotary Partnership for Literacy helping students in Greenville

The Rotary Partnership for Literacy is a collaboration of 10 Rotary clubs in the Greenville area committed to supporting the Greenville Literacy Association (GLA). The club are providing funds to meet the needs of GLA students and tutors, recruiting Rotarians as volunteers for one-on-one tutoring and teaching in small groups, assisting with the annual fundraiser for literacy, the "Really Good, Really Big, Really Cheap Book Sale," and more.

Rotary partners have contributed \$32,138 to the Rotary Partnership for Literacy over a two-year period. Some funds came from two district grants, one from the Rotary Club of Greenville East and one from the Greenville Breakfast Rotary Club.

Another contribution was a grant through Allstate Insurance from an agent, Shannon Harvey, president of the North Greenville Rotary Club.

Funds for 2015-2016 have been used to provide scholarships for 166 individual GED tests and pre-tests, two portable Active Panel Promethean Boards, Aztec P-12 on-line seats for independent study for the GED, and scholarships for a unique pilot project with Quick Jobs for the Future at Greenville Technical College.

In the pilot GED/Quick Jobs program, five GED students were awarded scholarships to complete Quick Jobs training in order to quickly obtain work skills matching the needs of local business and industry. These students have GED

tutors working with them, so they are on track to earn the GED.

By GED students working simultaneously on literacy and work skills, they can earn credentials, get living wage jobs, and put their talents to work for employers in less time. One student is working toward **Computer Numeric Control (CNC) Certification for which the** starting salary ranges from \$15 to \$19 per hour.

Other students are working toward certifications in Medical Physician Practice Clerk, Medical Interpreting, and Certified Nursing

Greenville East president teaches basic writing

Amy Hickman, president of the Rotary Club of Greenville East, has been teaching the beginning writing class for GED preparation at the Harley Bonds Center for the Greenville Literacy Association since January. This is the first class most students take when they enter the GED prep program, and it focuses on basic writing skills and simple essay structure. Amy enjoyed the teaching so much that she enlisted her husband to help. He has filled in for a math class and is now teaching economics. The Rotary Club of Greenville East received a district grant that was used to purchase one of the new Promethean Boards for the Literacy Association.

One unanticipated outcome is that the self-confidence of the students has risen because of the investment of Rotary in their future.

Two students recently made a presentation on their experience in the GED/Quick Jobs program at a meeting of Rotary leaders from the 10 participating clubs. The students are grateful for the opportunity that Rotary has given them to pursue a career while earning a GED. At the same meeting of literacy partners, math tutor Marti Johnson demonstrated how she engages GED students in an interactive learning experience while teaching with an Active Panel Promethean Board. Up to four students can interact simultaneously to

solve problems using the board, which students enjoy, especially those in their 20s. She creates flipcharts and moves back and forth between them to demonstrate the differences and similarities in several problems, calculations, and concepts.

Because of the Rotary Partnership, GLA now has three Promethean Boards, two of which are mobile and can be moved from classroom to classroom.

The Rotary Partnership for Literacy is making a sustained difference in literacy in the Greater Greenville Metropolitan Area.

Proceeds from this event will help the Golden Corner club fund its projects: Backpacks with food for Oconee school children, two RYLA students and a district grant to help with an international project.

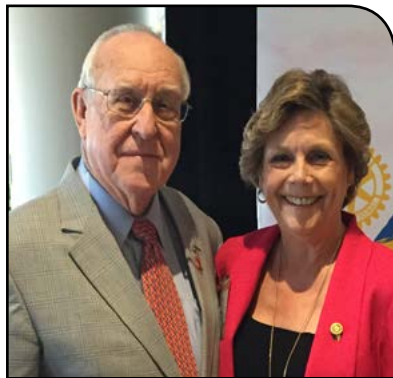

U.S. and Rotary funds released for polio eradication

Rotary has released \$35 million in new grants to support the global effort to eradicate polio. The funds will build on last year's historic achievement of stopping transmission of the wild poliovirus in Nigeria and all of Africa. Just two countries reported wild polio cases in 2015, Afghanistan and Pakistan. Rotary's funds will go toward efforts to end the disease in those countries and seven others. The United States Congress approved a total of \$228 million for the 2016 federal budget to support the global effort to eradicate polio. The funding represents a \$10 million increase over the level of funding approved in fiscal year 2015. Rotary's Polio Eradication Advocacy Task Force for the United States leads our efforts to inform the U.S. government and other funding sources of the urgency and benefits of supporting the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. ZONE 33 REPORT:

As of March 23, Wild Polio case counts for Pakistan was 6 compared to 54 last year and Afghanistan had one compared to 20 last year. The newly confirmed Afghanistan case was in the Shigal area

of Kunar province. Kunar province is located in the northeast of Afghanistan. This information came from the National PolioPlus Committee Chair Mohammad Ishaq who attended a polio eradication coordination meeting on March 7, during which the World Health Organization (WHO) provided information about the newly confirmed case. The meeting focused on the renewal of the microplans for the region with an integrated approach to operation as well as communication.

The Kunar area is inaccessible and controlled by the Taliban from the Swat region of Pakistan. Rotary has provided assistance to the families of polio workers killed in Kunar through the National PolioPlus Committee in Afghanistan. The funds were presented at the Nangarhar Emergency Operations Center (EOC) to the patrons of the families represented by Haji Salih Mohammad who is the father of one of the victims.

This danger to volunteers committed to eradicate polio is a reminder to us how important it is to complete Rotary's goal to eradicate polio before it is spread by refugees back into already declared polio free countries.

As part of its Centennial Celebration

Rotary Club of Greenville to sponsor Peace and Conflict Resolution Seminar

Peace and conflict resolution is one of the six areas of focus of Rotary International. The Rotary Club of Greenville will offer a Peace and Conflict Resolution Seminar as part of its Centennial Celebration.

The seminar is scheduled for Wednesday, April 13, from 9:00 to 5:00 at the Younts Conference Center on the campus of Furman University. All Rotarians in District 7750 are invited to participate in the seminar.

A diverse lineup of speakers will examine such topics as the following: "Is Peace possible?" "Does religion create peace or conflict?" "What is the role of spirituality in conflict resolution?" "What does the Holocaust tell us about peace initiatives?"

Bawa Jain, Founding Secretary General of the World Council of Religious Leaders, is the keynote speaker. The World Council of Religious Leaders seeks to reduce religiously motivated conflicts. Bawa was Chairman of the Millennium World Peace Summit of Religious and Spiritual Leaders which brought over 2000 of the world's preeminent religious leaders to the United Nations in 2000. He coined the term "Religious Diplomacy," and actively speaks, practices and promotes it around

the world as part of his broader thrust on Responsible Leadership.

A panel with representatives from five different religions (Christianity, Buddhism, Hinduism, Judaism, Islam) will discuss religious perspectives on peace and conflict. Past Rotary International Director **Ken Morgan**, a member of the Rotary Club of Chapel Hill since 1983, will speak about Rotary's peace initiatives. Ken served as moderator for the 2008 International Assembly and as chair of the 2007 International Institute that preceded the Convention in Salt Lake City. He served two years as the Rotary Board representative on the International PolioPlus Committee and as chairman of the Board Audit Committee. Ken served as Vice Chair of the Rotary Peace Center Committee from 2008-2010 and has been involved with the Duke/UNC Peace Center since its inception in 2000.

Vinod Deshmukh will examine the role of spirituality in conflict resolution, and **Norbert and Gerda Bikales** will speak about their experiences as Holocaust survivors. The final session will feature the The Applied Theatre Center in Greenville providing experiential opportunities for seminar participants to solve actual conflicts.

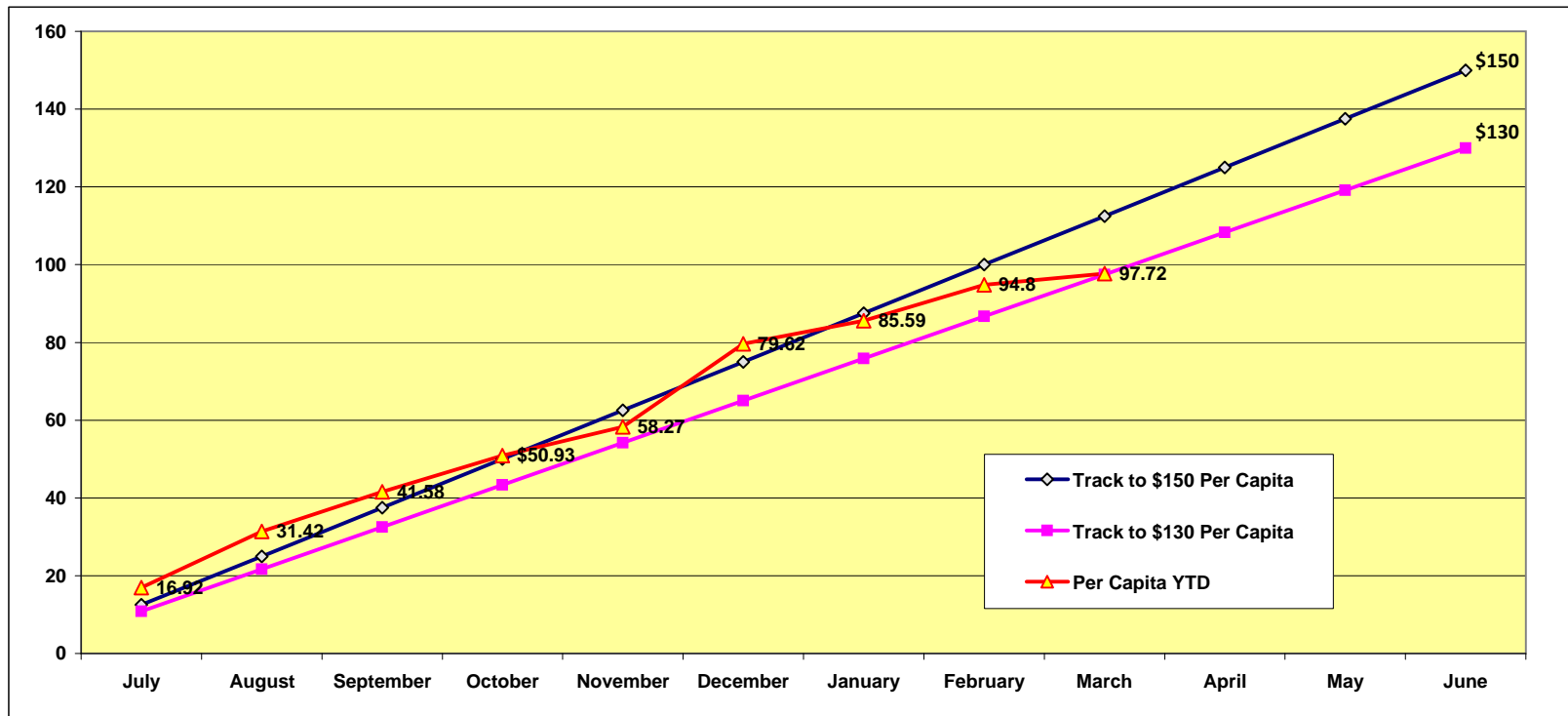

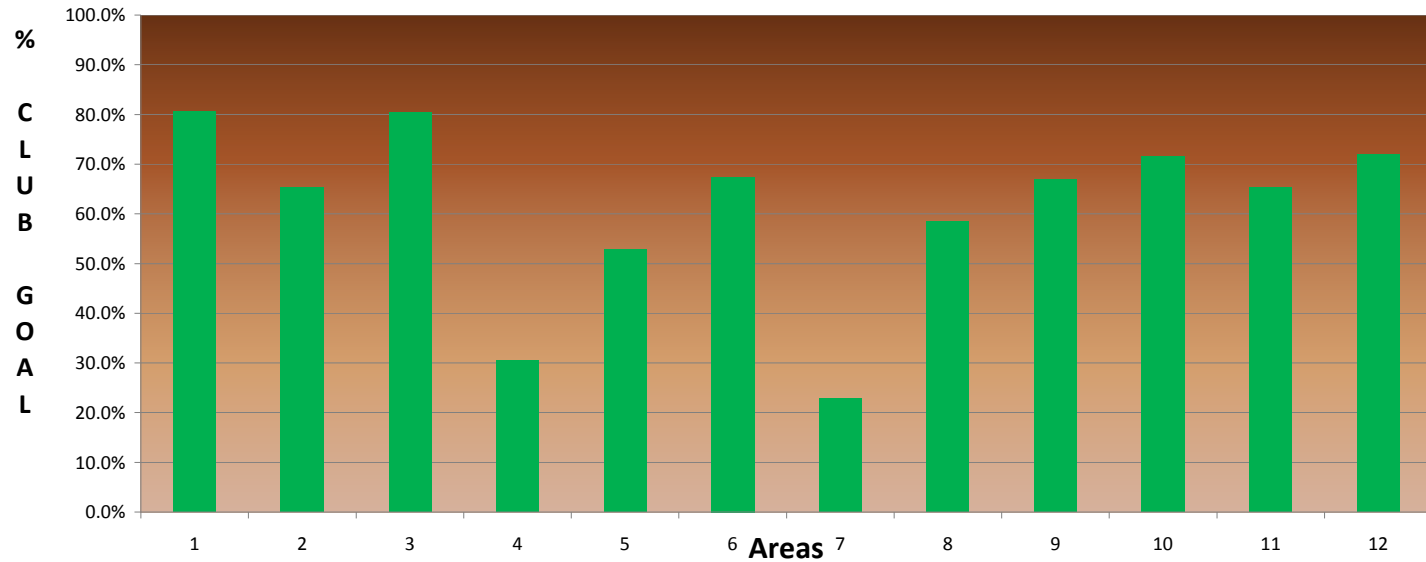

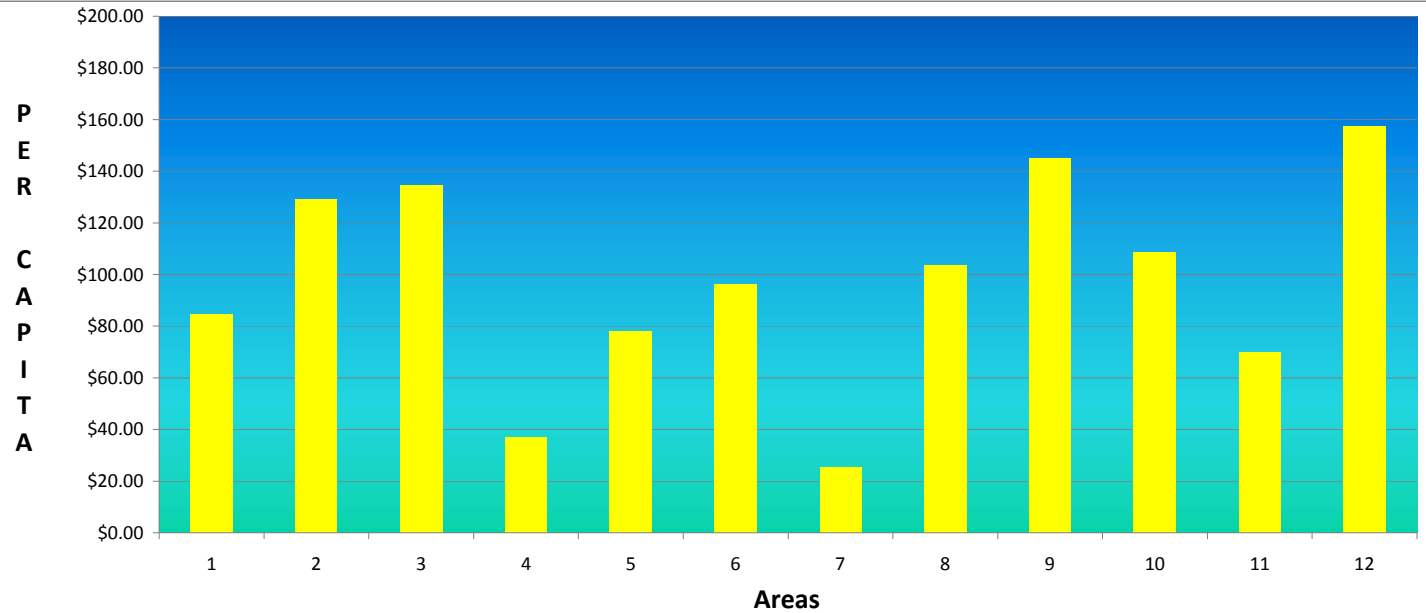


% of Club AF Goal Achieved - By Area
