Be a Gift to the World

Thanks so much to so many for your incredible service to your communities and the world this past year. District 7750 has certainly been a Gift to the World, touching billions of people with our efforts. While this year's theme will be retired in only a month, let's remember to Be a Gift to the World for years to come.

We were reminded of the global reach of Rotary at the International Convention in Seoul, South Korea. 42,000 Rotarians from over 100 countries gathered to celebrate the accomplishments of their clubs, each one doing good in their corner of the world, just as all of our clubs do. It was an extraordinary opportunity to join leaders, exchange ideas and make plans to take action upon returning home.

Pam and I have thoroughly enjoyed this year as your District Governor team, and are really impressed with the way D-7750 clubs have responded to the challenges set forth this year. Many clubs have shown that they can grow membership, reversing their historical declines, and are on their way to creating a membership growth culture—a belief that a healthy Rotary club maintains or grows membership every year. We have several clubs that have consistently grown for the past decade, even including the Great Recession years of 2009 2010. Many clubs have proven this year that they, too, can consistently grow, despite folklore to the contrary.

I'm also overwhelmed by the generosity of our 80 new Paul Harris Society

members in response to the Governor's 10+1 Challenge, each pledging \$1,000 a year to The Rotary Foundation. Your commitment going forward will provide a significant boost to our capacity for doing good in the world (and in South Carolina) through both District and Global Grants.

Let's not forget the Gift of Polio Eradication to the World. The 1,000 new polio cases per day when we started this battle 30 years ago have been reduced to only 16 cases of polio so far this year. The end is in sight—it's only a matter of which of the next couple of years will mark the last case of polio in the human race.

I thank you for the honor and the privilege of serving as your Governor this year, and for your extraordinary accomplishments, club by club, of being a gift to your communities and to the world.

It's also a great feeling to have a lineup of outstanding Rotarians following me as Governor. Lance Young has been going full bore for a year in preparation for his term, and Ed Irick and Rita Yarbrough are ramping up their preparations for oncoming years. We're indeed fortunate as a District to have such commitment in these leaders of the future.

As Robert Jarvik said, "Leaders are visionaries with a poorly developed sense of fear, and no concept of the odds against them. They make the impossible happen." Rotarians are the kinds of leaders that make the impossible happen, and I'm thankful to be among so many of them.

Leadership is shown in many different ways. One way comes from those serving in our military, helping keep peace in our world.

SOUTH CAROLINIAN GUARDS FREEDOM IN KOREA BY DG TERRY WEAVER

In yet another incredible experience we wouldn't have had were it not for Rotary, Pam and I visited the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) between North and South Korea while there for the Rotary International Convention. The DMZ is a two-mile wide, mined "no man's land" that stretches across the entire peninsula, the center of which is the border between the two countries.

We stepped over the border into North Korea within the DMZ, which is guarded by a UN peacekeeping force. The country is still technically at war, despite an uneasy "peace" in the form of a cease fire with a nuclear armed country led by an unstable dictator just 30 miles from Seoul, the capital of South Korea. Imagine our surprise upon learning that our host for the DMZ visit, part of the UN peacekeeping force, was US Army Specialist Timothy Monroe, a graduate of Mauldin High School!

As Americans born during the Korean War, we were largely unaware of the hostile invasion in 1950 by North Korea (supported and encouraged by Communist regimes in the former USSR and China) of South Korea, one of the then poorest countries in the world. Three years of war ensued, during which tens of thou-

sands were orphaned and the country was reduced to rubble. Assisted greatly by the US military and other UN allies from around the world, the North Koreans were pushed back to the current boundary between the still communist North and the Republic of (South) Korea. Rotary, of course, played a major role in relief efforts and the 60 year process of rebuilding the country.

Rotarians on the trip to Seoul were astounded by the country the South Koreans have built in only 60 years, under the system of democracy and freedom that they fought to preserve. Their culture, economy, infrastructure, and technology have all come together to create a truly impressive, clean, safe and vibrant country. Yet like ours, there's plenty left for Rotary to do for those least able to help themselves. And, like ourselves, South Korean Rotarians have also been a Gift to the World by helping clubs in other countries through global grants from The Rotary Foundation.

Were it not for Rotary, Pam and I would have had no reason to visit this remarkable country and be reminded once again that freedom has a price and Rotary has a place in the peace and conflict resolution process.

Mauldin Rotary packs meals for Stop Hunger Now

Each Tuesday at noon, Mauldin Rotarians and their guests gather for lunch at the Mauldin Cultural Center and hear from agencies around our area who are making a difference in the lives of others, putting "Service above Self".

We were very interested when we recently heard from Ray Buchanan, the co-founder of "STOP HUNGER NOW." His vision: to end hunger in his lifetime by providing food and life saving aid to the world's most vulnerable and by creating a global commitment to mobilize the necessary resources.

Around the world, 870 million people lack adequate food and more than 25,000 die each day from hunger-related illnesses. Undernourishment kills more people every year than malaria, tuberculosis and AIDS combined!

So Stop Hunger Now's Meal Packaging Program became very interesting to our Mauldin Rotarians and we set out to organize our community to participate in a "meal-packing" day!

Our club's efforts in concert with the Mauldin High School Interact Club secured volunteers from the Mauldin Police and Fire Departments, the Mauldin City staff and many area churches.

On Saturday, April 16, the supplies arrived at the Mauldin Cultural Center for our volunteers to begin the packing project!

We had 67 volunteers who

shared their Saturday morning to come and convert the bulk supplies to highly nutritious meals using rice, soy protein, dried vegetables, flavoring and essential vitamins and minerals. Each package provides a reasonable serving for 6 and is easy to transport, store and distribute to those in greatest need, and it is easy to prepare, needed only water and heat.

Our volunteers packaged a total of 10,800 meals in less than 1-12 hours at a cost of a little over \$3,100. That money was raised through our Mauldin Rotary Club annual golf tournament. (This year on 9/20).

The Mauldin Cultural Center was transformed that day to a total meal packaging facility. The pictures we captured of young people working hand-in-hand with our City Police Officers; the families who brought along their small children and helped them stand on chairs to put the products into the bags; the Rotarians of all ages

working alongside the church volunteers and city staff was such a powerful image of how a thriving community works together to focus on the needs of others.

Stop Hunger Now has packaged and distributed more than 225 million meals to 73 countries since its founding in 1998! For each donation received, 87.9% goes toward the feeding the hungry around the world.

Fighting hunger is not just about feeding people; fighting hunger is about transforming lives and changing the systems that created it!

The Mauldin Rotary Club has already scheduled our day to package meals next year, Saturday, April 1, 2017! Mark your calendars NOW and join us. You will enjoy the time of fellowship and fun, and enjoy knowing you have made a difference in the life of the hungry in our world!


The Little Free Library project enabled the Lake Wylie Rotary Club to impact early childhood literacy in areas of our community with need.

Each research study brings us closer to the cure for Alzheimer's disease.


The best thing about hope is that it is contagious. RI Director Robert Hall and his wife Charlene joined leaders from 15 supporting Rotary districts.

Still time for clubs to meet (and exceed) their polio giving goals BY AMELIA NELSON D7750 POLIO CHAIR



Is your club one of the clubs that has not met its 2015-16 PolioPlus goal? You still have time to make a contribution to the Rotary Foundation-PolioPlus but you need to send in your contribution by June 25th. So, why contribute?

Doing Good in the World. Almost every applicable country has made the switch from the trivalent to the bivalent polio vaccine, a necessary step in the strategic endgame for combatting polio, now that the Type 2 wild polio virus has been eradicated.

AND, other than eradicating polio from the two remaining countries of Afghanistan and Pakistan, Poliovirus cancer treatment by Duke researchers receives 'breakthrough' status from FDA. A poliovirus cancer treatment designed by Duke medical researchers was awarded breakthrough therapy status by the Food and Drug Administration to speed up its approval for market use.

The FDA's recognition follows Phase 1 clinical trials of the therapy, which have been occurring since 2012 and are held at Duke's Preston Robert Tisch Brain Tumor Center. Medical researchers have found a 20 percent three-year survival rate in patients with glioblastoma—a particularly aggressive form of brain cancer—who received the poliovirus therapy, compared to a historical 4% survival rate. Darell Bigner, director of the Preston Robert Tisch Brain Tumor Center, said that the team of researchers will meet with the FDA within 60 days to discuss the next steps for future trials, and that they hope to expand the trials to several hundred patients.

These are just two reasons to contribute to Polio-Plus. Polio has made so much progress and it's great to know you've been a part of RI's goal to eradicate it. There are still 10 clubs who have not contributed to PolioPlus – won't you make a contribution – either as a club or as an individual member? **THANKS!**






% of Club AF Goal Achieved - By Area
