bership gains are at risk of ending the year with a membership loss. This is due to the normal increase in attrition we experience at the end of the year. This loss of membership is already beginning to show itself. Also, several clubs have contributed very little towards their Annual Fund and PolioPlus goals.

What can you do to help your club?

- 1. You can recruit new members by asking a friend or acquaintance to join your club. If all current members ask at least two friends or acquaintances to join the club, historical data tells us that this could turn the tide of attrition. It is very conceivable that your club can end the year by finishing strong with an increase in members and meeting its membership goal.
- 2. You can contribute to the Foundation and PolioPlus. If you have already contributed, consider increasing your contribution.
- 3. You can encourage each other to help the club achieve its goals.

Makulinski Foundation also will match polio gifts above our goal

Mark challenged the District last year to beat our polio eradication goal and then matched any dollars over that goal.

We ended with a record breaking year for Polio in 2016-2017 with contributions totaling \$164,872.

This year's Polio goal is an average of \$1,500 per club x 53 clubs = \$79,500 and we are currently at \$66,450.

Hopefully, in the next couple of months we will have contributions over \$79,500 and receive a match again this year from the Makulinski Foundaiton..

Please consider making a contribution to Polio so together we can make a greater impact in the world.

Power in matching: Gates, Makulinski, Irick

Every time you make a contribution to Polio The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation matches you \$2 for every \$1 you contribute. For example: You donate \$100 to Polio (credited to your Rotary Foundation account) and The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation donates \$200 (credited to The Rotary Foundation) for a total of \$300 for Polio.

Once the District gets to \$79,500, The Makulinski Family Foundation will match dollar for dollar any contribution over our goal of \$79,500. For example: You donate \$100 to Polio (credited to your Rotary Foundation account) and The Makulinski Family will contribute \$100 (credited to Mark Makulinski's Rotary Foundation account) and then The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation donates \$400 (credited to The Rotary Foundation) for a total of \$600 for Polio.

- If you have a password click on Sign In to My Rotary and logon.
- If you do not have a password click on Register For An Account and then click on Give.

Once you are on the Donate page, click on Donate. Click on the circle next to Annual Fund – SHARE

- or Polio and click on Continue, select the amount and frequency.
- Click Continue, enter Billing Information.
- Select payment type. Click on Continue.
- On the summary screen, be sure everything is entered correctly then click on Continue, enter your payment information, then click on Continue, you will see your confirmation. You may print this by selecting print.
- Once your contribution is processed you will receive a letter from The Rotary Foundation. This could take several days.

April not a good month; three new cases of polio reported

Unfortunately, there is bad news this month. As of April 20, Afghanistan(with five previously reported cases) reported two new cases of polio and Pakistan (with zero cases this year) reported one new case of polio bringing the total to eight for 2018. This surpasses the total of five cases in 2017.

But the good news is that

we are not abandoning our fight to eradicate polio. It is imperative that we continue our fight so that polio does not gain ground and become an epidemic again.

As for our district's giving, we are currently at \$34.60 per capita.












AF Per Capita - By Area
