Over 95 million children in schools across sub-Saharan Africa have no access to a classroom desk.

The Valentine Week activities of the Powdersville Middle School EAFK Student Council will raise money for this international project. They will sell "Valigrams" that students can send to each other, and they will sponsor a Valentine's Day Dance.

The Student Council has been a very active club. They have



had a canned food drive where they collected canned fruit, applesauce and jelly for the United Christian Ministries in Pickens and Anderson County. They had a donut sale during Spirit Week where they collected over \$450 for service projects. They offered a Teachers Night Out in December which provided free babysitting for the children of their teachers.

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TED Talk speaker Azim Khamisa to speak at Peace Conference

Azim Khamisa's only son, Tariq, 20, a university student who worked a part-time job as a pizza delivery man, was killed by 14-year-old gang member Tony Hicks in a gang initiation ritual. Since then, Azim has authored four books and speaks worldwide to students and adults on nonviolence, forgiveness, and peace-building.

Committing his life to halting the continuing cycle of violence among youth, Azim became a social activist after his son's death. Out of grief and despair, Khamisa was inspired to transform his loss through the miraculous power of forgiveness. Believing that

there were "victims at both ends of the gun," Azim forgave Tony and founded the Tariq Khamisa Foundation to break the cycle of youth violence by saving lives, empowering positive choices, and teaching the principles of nonviolence and peacemaking.

Soon after estab-

lishing the foundation,

Azim invited Ples Felix,

Tony's grandfather and guardian, to join him. Since November 1995, the two have reached over a million elementary and middle school children live and several million though video programs, guiding youth to choose a peacemaker's life of nonviolence and forgiveness.

Because of his work in impacting social policy and norms, Azim is a highly regarded and respected leader and a sought-after speaker nationally and internationally. Azim has given more than

1,000 presentations to grade schools and university students and over 550 keynote speeches at conferences worldwide, including an audience of 300,000 at the "Stand for Children" rally in Washington D.C. in 1996.

Azim has received regional, national and international awards. These include the National Crime Victims Special Community Service Award presented by President Bill Clinton and Attorney General Janet Reno; the prestigious "Search for Common Ground" international award for "Building Peaceful Communities"; "California Peace Prize," and "Freedom Heroes Award." Azim's work has been featured in the The New York Times, Oprah Magazine, People Magazine, and many other news outlets.

Azim is author of the book, From Murder To Forgiveness – A Father's Journey. He followed up this book in November 2007 with From Forgiveness to Fulfillment, showing the continued evolution in an unfolding story that is his path, his passion and his life. In February 2009, Random House published The Secrets of the Bulletproof Spirit: How to Bounce Back from Life's Hardest Hits.

Azim says, "We continuously confront defining moments in life. Sometimes these events are joyous; sometimes they are tragedies. At these moments it's

Orthopedic equipment will help patients in the south of Haiti, thanks to Global Grant

Les Cayes (Haiti) officially handed over to the hospital of Les Cayes on January 25 a C-ARM medical imaging device worth more than \$182,000.

This piece of equipment will make it easier for orthopedic surgeons to have a better surgical approach, allowing the physician to monitor progress at any time during the operation and make any corrections immediately. With this device, the results

of treatment are better and patients recover more quickly. The hospital and also patients will benefit from savings through fewer follow-up operations.

The hospital of Les Cayes being a center of reference for all the Great South of Haiti will now be able to better serve the population affected by

so many accidents of motorbikes and cars. It will also be able to receive teams of orthopedic surgeons coming from other hospitals nationally or internationally allowing academic exchanges. We hope this hospital will become e one of the most modern Trauma and Orthopedic Centers in Haiti.

This Global Grant project has been achieved through the Rotary Club of Les Cayes thanks to the contributions of Rotarians at their Club level but especially the contributions of 15 Districts, 4 Rotary clubs,

Since 1988, we've seen a worldwide reduction in polio cases of 99.9%. In 2018, we saw wild polio cases in two countries, Afghanistan (21 new cases) and Pakistan (12 new cases). So far in 2019 no new cases have been reported. But **WE STILL HAVE** WORK TO DO!

Polio mainly affects children under age 5. There is no cure, but polio is preventable with a vaccine.

By the time the world is certified polio-free, Rotary's contributions to the global polio eradication effort will exceed \$2.2 billion. including \$985 million in matchingfunds from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Rotary's contribution to the Global Polio Eradication Initiative since 1988 accounts for nearly 14% of all contributions






