It has been a long journey, but for the children of the world we must keep the promise that Rotarians made



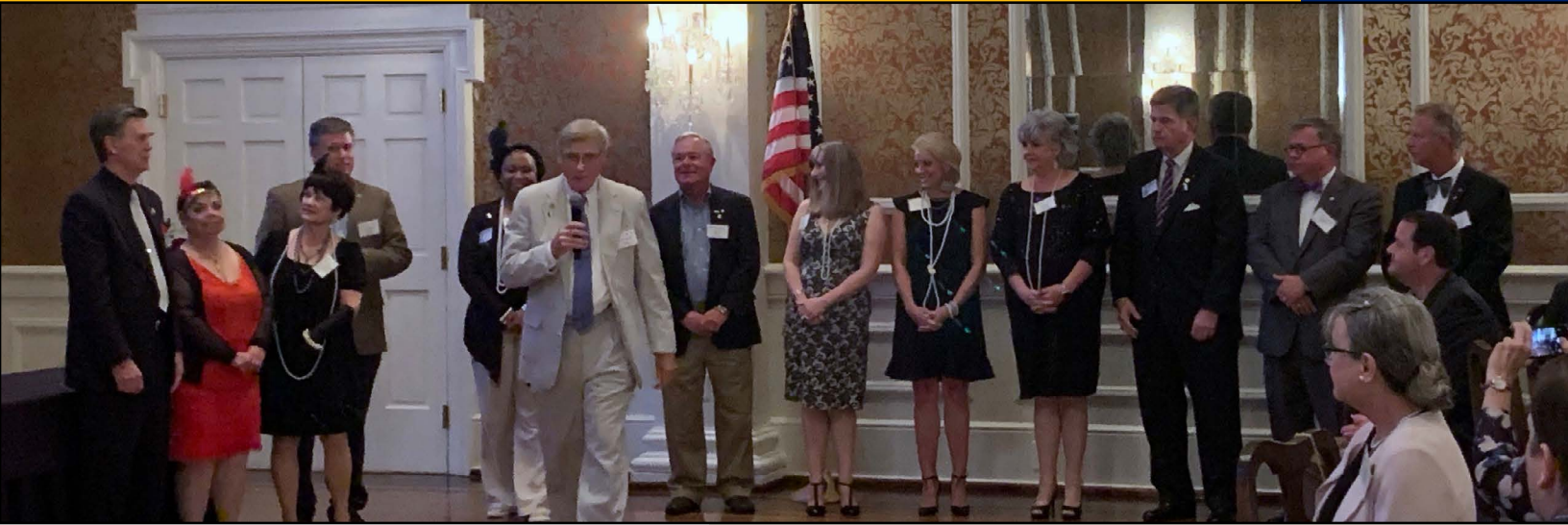

CART is another amazing story of how an idea can grow. Since its inception in 1996, contributions to CART have funded forty-five grants totaling \$7.2 million. Last year was a banner year for CART contributions, and I ask that you build on this momentum for the new year.

People of action like to serve. That was demonstrated at the All Club Conference when attendees packed 36,000 meals during the Rise Against Hunger service project. Rotarians' service will also be visible as clubs complete their District Designated Fund supported projects. But our District's service extends beyond its borders. If you have a sense of adventure consider joining Al Steele on one of his water projects, or join one of the trips to Haiti where Rotary is making a difference.

Finally, there is a new Rotary club in our District, the Rotary Club of Indian Land Lunch, and in a few weeks this club will receive its charter. I look forward to working with their leadership team to expand Rotary's reach in Lancaster and York Counties.

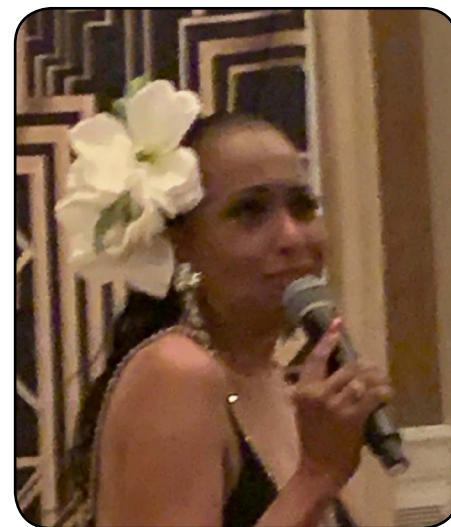

The Blacksburg Rotary Club celebrated the 75th anniversary of its club charter on Tuesday, May 21. The club was chartered on May 22, 1944.

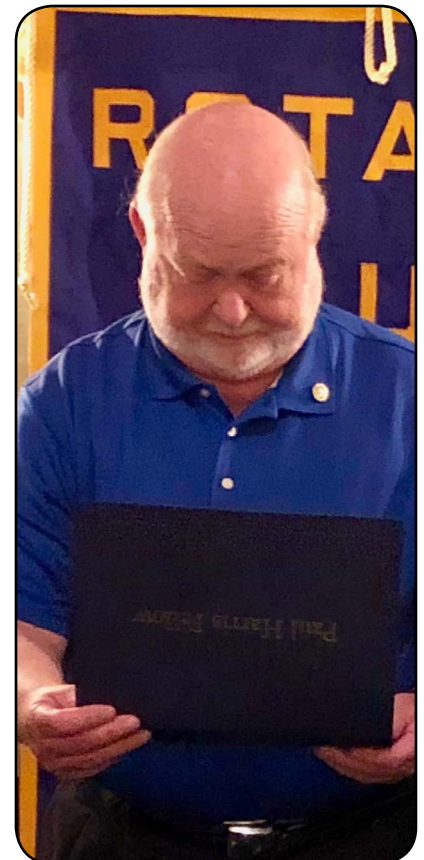

The Rotary Club of the Reedy River Greenville has participated in many tree plantings with Trees



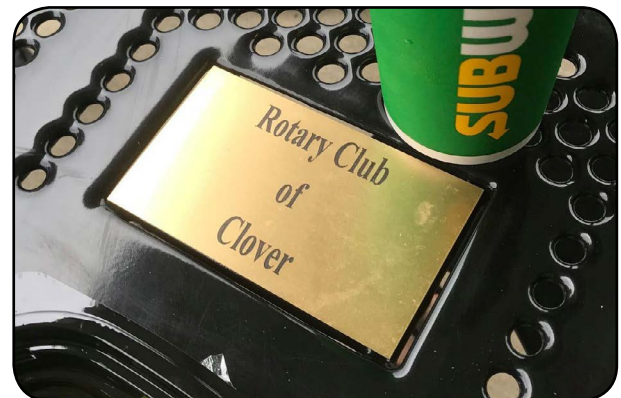

Greenwood presents agriculture award

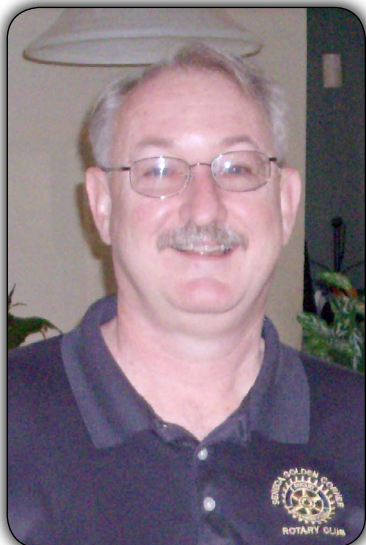

Greenville club celebrates success of Peace Conference 2019

About 375 people attended the 2019 Rotary Peace and Conflict Resolution Conference held in Greenville in May. Participants included Rotarians, 20 students from the Legacy Early College Charter School, Rotary International Exchange students, about 80 representatives from non-profit organizations in Greenville, and many more.

Amy Wood, anchor of WSPA News, served as moderator for the conference. Evaluations from participants at the conference referred consistently to the "great variety of topics, varying approaches to the challenges of peace, and multiple perspectives" presented at the conference.

Keynote speaker Azim Khamisa said "I have to say this was one of the most organized and inclusive conferences I have spoken at. Having given over 700

keynotes, this speaks highly of you and your team. So huge kudos to you and all the wonderful people that were involved in making this a resounding success."

Another speaker, David Forward, said "It was an amazing peace conference. I already told our district governor elect that she should begin planning something similar. But we would never be able to pull off what you did that day! Congratulations on a super event!

A student from Legacy Early College Charter School said, "I never imagined that there were actually people out in the world that were trying to make peace. It's very wonderful to know that we have people not only in the U.S. but all over the world talking about peace." Another student said, "I would recommend this experience to all students -scholars because many young teens are not aware of peace.

AIKEN SUNRISE

The Dictionary Project began in Aiken County in 2002 with the involvement of all Rotary Clubs in Aiken County. The clubs decided rather than sponsor individual schools, they would instead make the commitment to sponsor every third grade student in Aiken County. The three Rotary Clubs in Aiken County (Aiken, Aiken - Sunrise, and North Augusta) purchase and distribute the paperback dictionaries to students in all public and private schools. Approximately 2,376 dictionaries are distributed directly to the students in their classrooms by Rotary volunteers in cooperation with the Superintendent of public schools and the heads of schools of the private schools. The project is coordinated by a chairperson from one of the three clubs on a rotating basis. To date, we have distributed over 30,000 dictionaries to eager third grade students. **\$2500**

ABBEVILLE

The Abbeville Rotary Club will partner with Abbeville County First Steps, the Tracy Jackson Summer Food Program, and Christian United Ministries to provide food for families. The club will also partner with Christian United Ministries to provide medical supplies for families. The Club will take responsibility of the project, and overseeing the funds. **\$1,000.**

AIKEN

In 2017, the Rotary Club of Aiken along with partner Rotary Club of Aiken Sunrise installed Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) in public buildings throughout Aiken. Subsequently, the City of Aiken and the Aiken Downtown Development Association (ADDA) completed the development of The Alley and the Newberry Festival Plaza. These venues host a number of restaurants within a two-block long area that also serves as a sit for concerts and music festivals. The AEDs would serve as a potential life saving measure for patrons in need. **\$1,152**

CLEMSON-CALHOUN

The club will mobilize volunteers and resources for support of the local clinic. These volunteer and resources will come first from the membership of the club and their first-hand resources. Additionally, the club leadership will connect and collaborate other necessary resources and groups to close the needs gap to deliver needed resources to the local community. **\$5,000**

BLACKSBURG

Blacksburg will provide bags of food to students who when they leave school on Friday might not eat again until they return on Monday. When school is out for more than just the weekend, we pack extra items so they can eat until they return. By providing these bags we hope that children will be able to concentrate in school and learn thus helping them to be more successful in life. We are able to provide this service through donations, food donations and volunteers including Rotary to pack bags. **\$660**

CLEMSON

Operation School Supply provides back to school supplies for low income children identified with our partnership with Clemson Community Care (CCC). In addition, it provides funds for CCC to host a workshop for school personnel related to identifying the students for the supplies and a "back to school" party for the students on the day they receive their backpacks. School supply list comes from the child's school. **\$2,500**

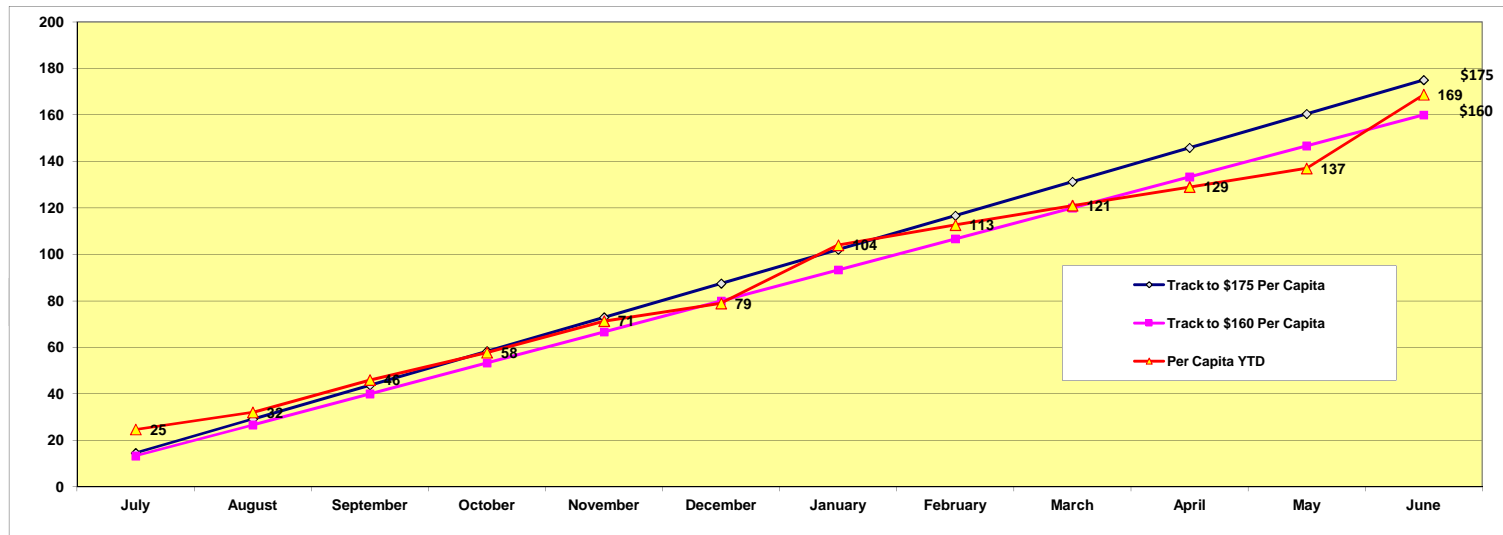

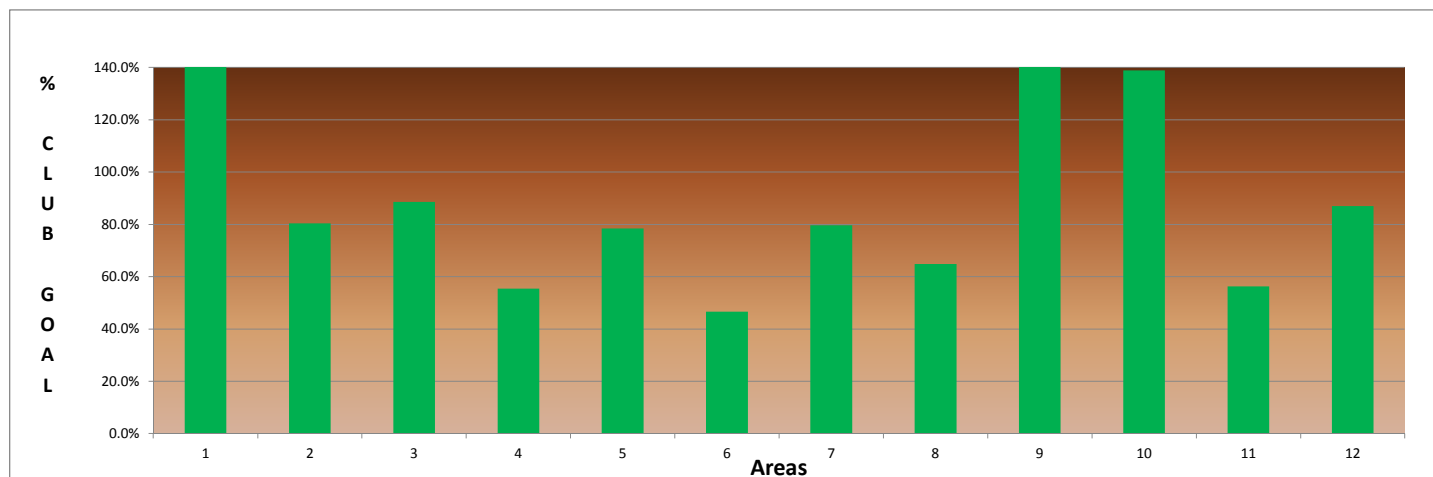

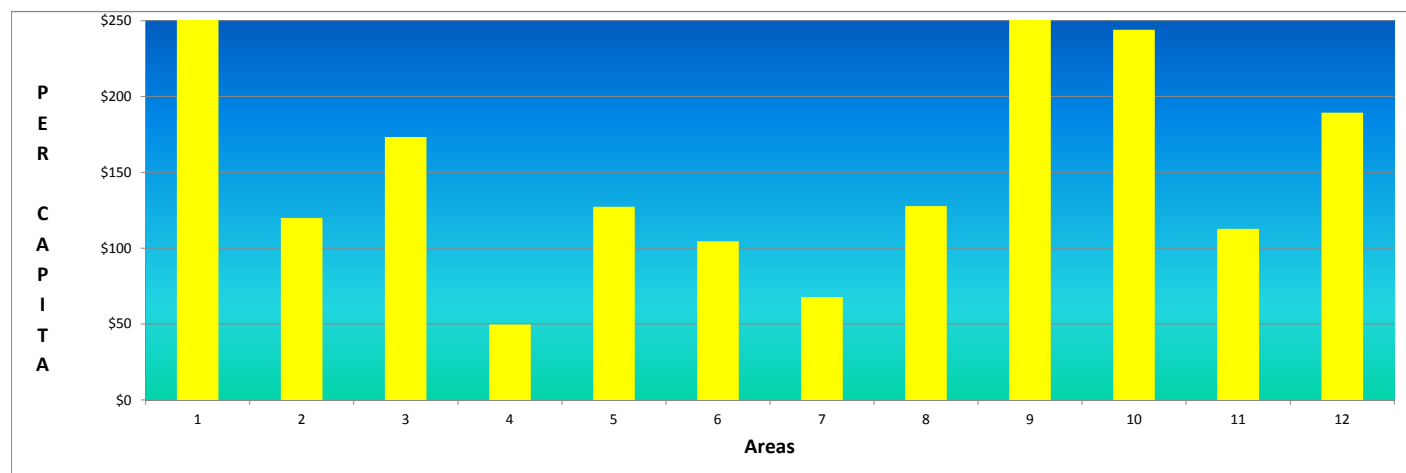


% of Club AF Goal Achieved - By Area
