## Make connections. Take action.

School buses are again running and as I mosey about District 7750 I pass long, car pool lines. So, how fitting it is that September is Basic Education and Literacy Month on the Rotary Calendar.

Rotary clubs across the district are finding ways to serve their communities through literacy programs and are connecting with children, parents and teachers.

For example, the photos on the first page of this newsletter show how **Golden Corner Rotary** is connecting with the DAR school in Oconee County.

More examples: Some Rotary clubs are packing backpacks, RC **Fort Mill** for one; some are giving “Happy Feet” and smiling faces to children (Why shoes? New shoes that fit make the school day much more pleasant and help a child learn); and some, such as RC **Greenville**, are “adopting” schools where most of the students are eligible for the free and reduced lunch program. The Rotary Club of **Emerald City** continues to provide books to children through that club’s Dolly Parton Imagination Library project.

The Rotarians in these clubs are serving, giving and growing. Growing you might ask? Yes, because one way we grow our Rotary story is through club and community service. Through service we grow our relationships and friendships within our home club; we grow friendships and relationships with the people

we serve; and we grow our understanding of what it means when we say, “Rotary: People of Action.”

Speaking of people of action, in August the Middle Tyger Community Center’s District 5 food bank in Lyman was running short on food. The Rotary Club of **North Spartanburg** took action and in two weeks had donated canned goods, dry goods, and other non-perishables so that the food bank could continue to serve their clients. For RC North Spartanburg, this was an unanticipated call to action, and a new way to connect to their community.

That’s another attribute of engaged Rotarians, seeing an immediate need and taking action. Does your club have a “taking action” story? Then share it by submitting a newsletter article and adding it to the Rotary showcase (accessed through the Rotary International website).

Do you see an area where your Rotary club can take action? Then meet with your club leaders, develop a plan, and act on it. Who knows, your idea may become a club tradition.

Finally, over the past few days several Rotary clubs in our District have been welcoming inbound Youth Exchange students. I have had the pleasure of meeting two, Imelda from Spain and Kent from Japan, and look forward to meeting them all.

Making connections. Taking action. Isn’t that the business of Rotarians?



## United States Postal Service Alzheimer’s Semi-postal Stamp

In 2017 the United States Postal service issued a semi-postal stamp dedicated to Alzheimers research. Artist Matt Mahurin first designed this stamp in 2008 as a First-Class stamp with a woman facing to the left. For the semi-postal stamp, the woman is facing to the right.

The price of a semi-postal stamp pays for the First-Class single-piece postage rate in effect at the time of purchase

**plus** an amount to fund causes that have been determined to be in the national public interest. The current cost for this stamp is \$0.65. Net proceeds are forwarded to the United States Department of Health and Human Services to support Alzheimer’s research. To date, sales from this stamp have generated \$953,000.

**Buying this stamp is another way to take action and support Alzheimer’s research.**



## Rotary Club of Indian Land Lunch holds charter night

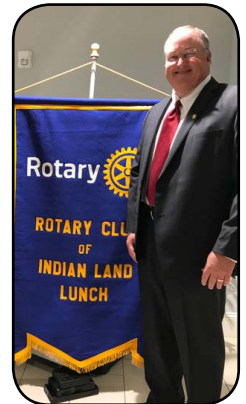

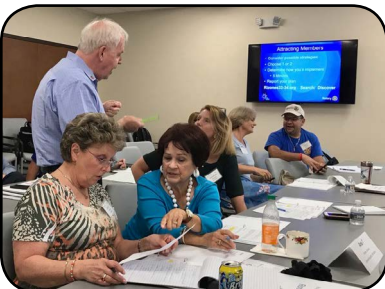

The 2018-2019 Backpack program was funded through grants from several local and international sources. The Laurens County Community Foundation, Balle Foundation, South State Bank and Rotary International all helped make the program a suc-

cess. "Rotary's mission is to do good in the world and that starts right here in our own backyard," said Scott Tollison, Laurens Rotary Club President. meals per student for a total of 2050 meals, all helping our local students."

With the start of the new school year comes the start of the new backpack program for the Laurens Rotary Club. The Rotarians volunteer to pack the meals on Friday mornings at the Laurens School District 55 Office and then deliver the meals to the students in need who are designated by the school.

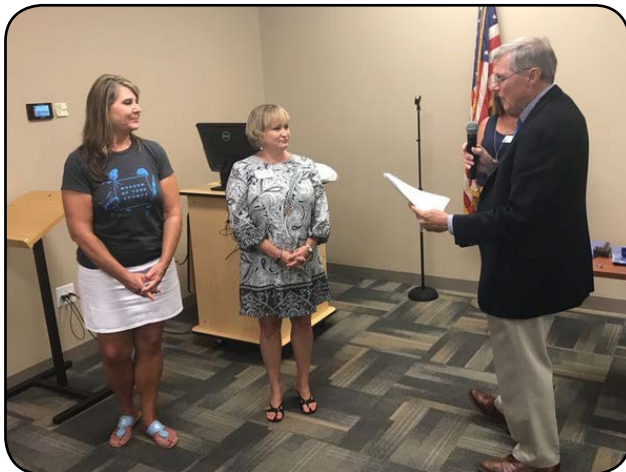

#### GREATER ANDERSON

Anderson District 3 is an agricultural area with three elementary schools. These schools are the most receptive to our dictionary project. The schools host an appreciation breakfast for us. We want to take the next step from delivering dictionaries to Literacy Recognition with the 3 schools. There are 10 classes total. Each class will recognize the

most improved reader in the first half of year and second half of year. 3rd grade is when children should be reading or they can be held back. Greater Anderson wants to begin focusing on one school district with its dictionary effort and take the next step by recognizing the Most Improved Reader. **\$1,800**

#### GREATER ANDERSON

Greater Anderson will provide dictionaries to third graders in four school districts and 105 classrooms. A dictionary is sometimes the only book students can take home. Rotarians go to the classrooms to

present the dictionaries and interact with students. They also tell them about Rotary and explain the 4 Way Test, and help the students look up words. **\$2,418**

#### GREENVILLE

Early Act First Knight (EAFK) is a character education program hosted by the Rotary Club of Greenville at two Greenville County primary schools. The grant monies will be used to continue to support the program at each school. The funds are also used to assist with the lease of the curriculum and ongoing activities to include knighting ceremonies,

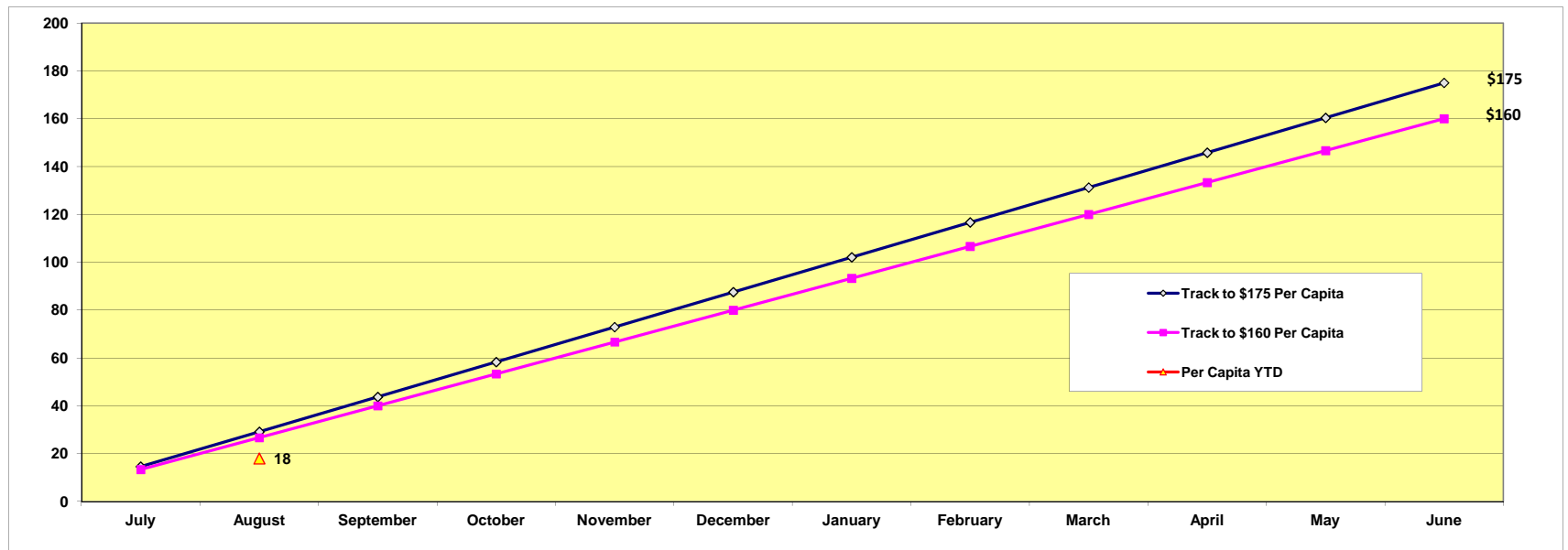

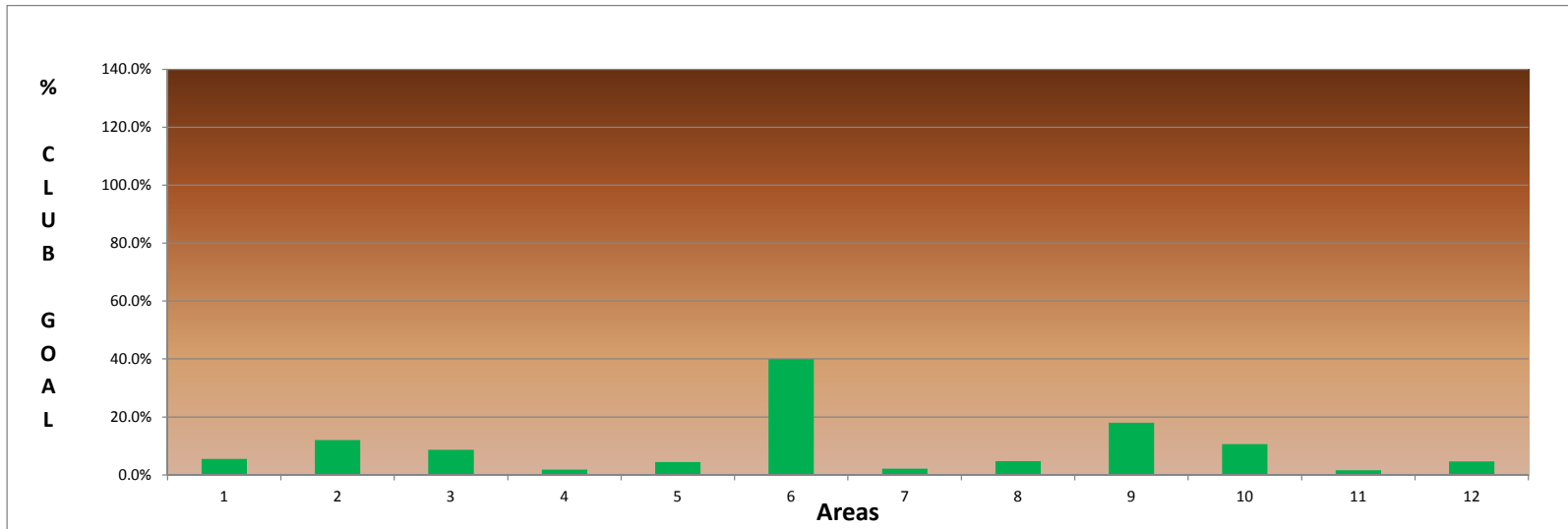

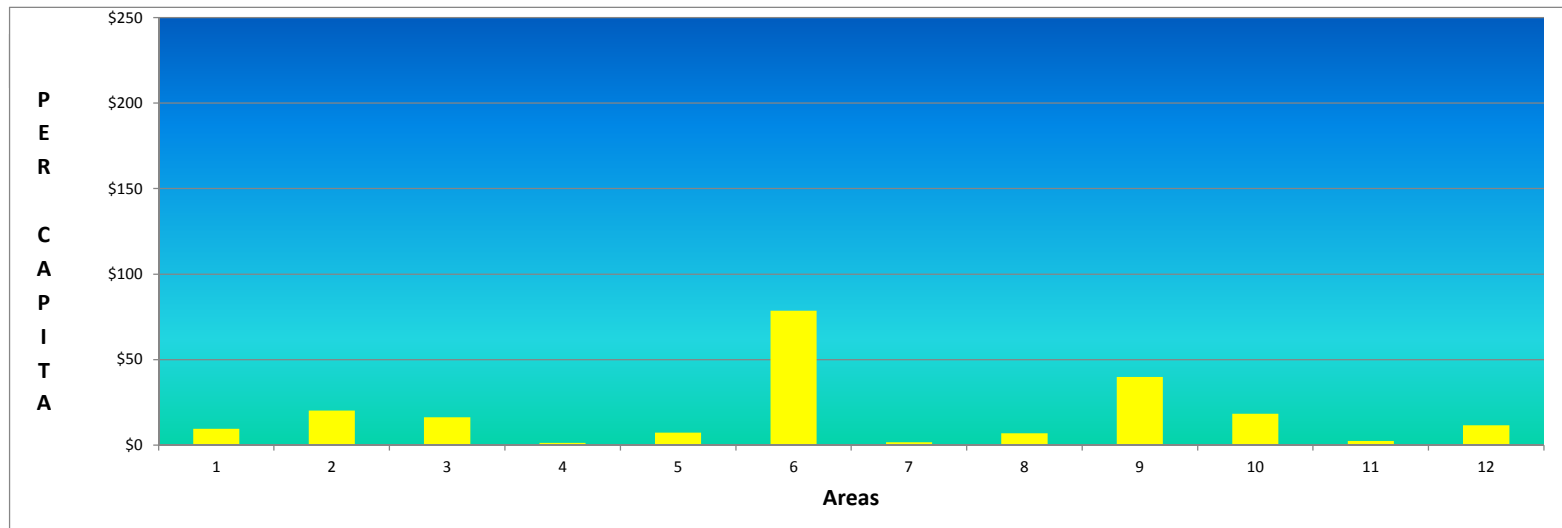
