# Great is an understatement: Several intentional changes and efforts have led to the change in Clinton's club culture

So, are you wondering what makes the Clinton Rotary Club so great? Well, we are too, although we think great is an understatement; we prefer terms like awesome and amazing. We know it may sound like we are bragging—because we sure are bragging on all our wonderful members who have worked really hard to increase our membership.

Not only did we exceed our goal, we have diversified our group as well, and that is an extra plus. We appreciate the dedication of the long-term members who have focused on bringing in a younger generation to offer different ideas and insight to the club. The new members, a majority of whom are women, offer a delightful point of view on the many things that are up and coming with our club.

Although the Clinton club has had women members for years, we, like many clubs, have been and continue to be mostly male. So to have so many females joining shows not only how our group is growing but also reflects how Rotary is growing as a whole. We are very proud to have some amazing women from all walks of life and ethnic groups. With so much diversity, we are sure to make a major splash in the coming year.

On July 1, 2018, our membership stood at 23 after a year of intentionally cleaning up our roster of folks who had lost interest and stopped coming. Rather than trying to re-recruit them, we realized that we needed a broader reach if our club was to survive. Today we stand at 39 members. We attribute our growth to a combination of good fortune and the following initiatives:

We were fortunate to be able to relocate our meeting place to a private dining room at one of the local retirement communities. The outstanding food, convenience of parking, and an inviting setting

have helped make our time together much more pleasant. After all, you have to eat lunch on Tuesday somewhere – why not at Rotary.

We adopted a unified monthly dues payment that covers dues, meals, and Paul Harris EREY payments. This has eliminated griping about being charged for meals when absent and philosophical objections to giving to the Foundation. The choice is now pay or don't join.

We have adopted the district's "corporate" membership alternative and have three businesses, including the City of Clinton, who have two or three designated representatives who can attend if the primary member cannot.

We have made an effort to get more representation from various departments of "institutional" members such as the college, the city, and the hospital, rather than just a single member.

5 We try to keep our meetings lighthearted but informative – and we go easy on pushing the ever-changing RI and District agendas.

And we have many members who intentionally invited and followed up with friends and business associates to interest them in our club.

Perhaps also we have just been fortunate enough to be in a time here in Clinton where the pendulum has swung back toward "joining" rather than being disengaged and isolated. Our small, formerly textile centered community is at risk every day, and our community knows that we need to come together to solve our problems and thrive. We believe that our club is a reflection of this urgency and tries to live into our motto – Service Above Self.










% of Club AF Goal Achieved - By Area
