No one went hungry in Oconee County thanks to our four clubs



When the strongest tornado to hit Seneca in 25 years struck the town on Easter Monday, the four Rotary clubs in Oconee County immediately went to work to help. See what they did on the next page.





EF3 tornado struck Seneca and four Rotary clubs rushed to help

In the wee hours of Easter Monday, April 13, 2020, a magnitude EF3 tornado roared through a portion of Seneca. It was the strongest tornado to hit the state in 25 years.

Damage was extensive, and one life was lost—the night watchman at the Borg-Warner auto components plant which was heavily damaged. (top left photo).

The county has four Rotary Clubs. The two Seneca clubs each had members or relatives of members who suffered total loss of their homes or sustained heavy damage. In all, there were 1100 residences affected, with 92 homes being judged as total losses. Residential damage estimates, not including the factory or other business losses, was put at \$11 million dollars.

As soon as the sun rose that morning, our local Rotarians sprang into action. Members of the Seneca clubs rushed to help not only their affected members, but everyone who was victimized by Mother Nature's wrath.

Three members of the Westminster club, town

mayor Brian Ramey, funeral home owner Brian Allen, and Sgt. Charles Mulwee of the Westminster police force mobilized equipment and crews for tree removal and road clearing.

The mayor was able to send additional crews to attend to electrical, water, sewer, and street issues.

Over the next several days, Rotarians joined various church, civic, and business groups to do whatever was necessary to bring relief to their neighbors. Hundreds of pounds of food to the local food bank, cash donations, personal hygiene and cleaning products and hours upon hours of volunteer time serving meals, clearing debris, and assisting homeowners with their remaining possessions.

This effort continues as this article is being written, 6 weeks after this stunning natural disaster. **NO ONE HAS GONE HUNGRY DURING THIS RECOVERY**, thanks to the on the ground portrayal of "Service Above Self" that was displayed by the four Oconee County Rotary Clubs and all of the heroic volunteers that came without hesitation to carry out whatever task was necessary.

president following in their father's footsteps, but who became a Rotarian through Rotary Youth Exchange.

Some of you shared stories about how you met your partner through Rotary and how you have kept Rotary a part of your lives.

Rotarians shared their stories about participating in National Immunization Day events, seeing first-hand the devastating effects that polio can have, and encouraging Rotarians to fulfill the 1985 promise

Rotarians made to the children of the world.

All across our District Rotarians related stories about how they have shared their treasure and talents to provide clean water, to teach communities to be food secure, and to nourish minds through literacy. To a tee, those who serve said that they have received much more in return by seeing the smiling faces of those they served than they gave.

During my club visits I was able to share my Rotary story fifty-two times and I never tired of telling how Rotary has changed my life. You may recall that I challenged each of you to turn a new page in your Rotary story, and that challenge is still foremost on my mind. "Lil' Ole" Clemson-Calhoun thrives, impacts its community

To paraphrase ClemsonCoach Dabo Swinney, "we're just the Lil' Ole Clemson-Calhoun Rotary Club." CCRC is the younger and smaller of the Rotary clubs in Clemson, but we make significant and impactful contributions to the Clemson community.

CCRC began in 1986 as a spin-off the Clemson Rotary Club, and we have been going strong ever since.

In looking back at the history of the club, membership rose to 65, but four years ago it dropped to the low 20s. In the three or so years since, membership has grown to 40 with the initiation of our two newest members during our Zoom meeting on May 22.

We are proud that of the eight newest members of the club, five are women. This is very appropriate

since the Clemson-Calhoun Club boasts that it initiated the first two female Rotarians in South Carolina. Pam Deal and Donna Patterson were initiated in the fall of 1987 and both are still active members of the club.

As President of the club, I attribute the surge in membership to several factors:

1. Engagement—There are many opportunities for service projects that attract new people and help retain current membership.
2. Enthusiasm—We are known as the "Fun Club" It has branded our club. We added a 5th question to the 4-Way Test of the things we think, say, or do. We end all our meetings by saying "IS IT FUN?" If the club isn't having fun, it makes it harder to get membership moving in a positive direction.

3. Member Focus —At every meeting, we remind current members to be on the lookout for new members.
4. New members bring new members—Six of the eight new members this year were invited to join our club by members with less than 3 years with Rotary.
5. Retention—We only lost two members during the 2019-2020 year.
6. Follow-up—When potential members comes to a meeting, I add them to my weekly email to the club. It keeps them up to date and over time shows them all the activities we do for the community.

When I was inducted as president in June of 2019, I knew that membership was a priority.

I really wanted to end my year with 40 members. I knew it would be a challenge in the best of years, and then COVID-19 changed all aspects of life, even Rotary. We had to find new and innovative ways to meet and keep the members engaged.

We started meeting via Zoom in April and have initiated three new members at our Zoom meetings. I am very proud that we will induct our 40th member with a month left in my term, especially during these very challenging times.

With membership at 40, the Clemson-Calhoun Club has momentum going into the 2020-21 year. The club is invested in many service projects, and with membership on the rise, I can't wait to see what all the "newbies" will bring to the table.

Indian Land Lunch attendance above average at virtual meetings

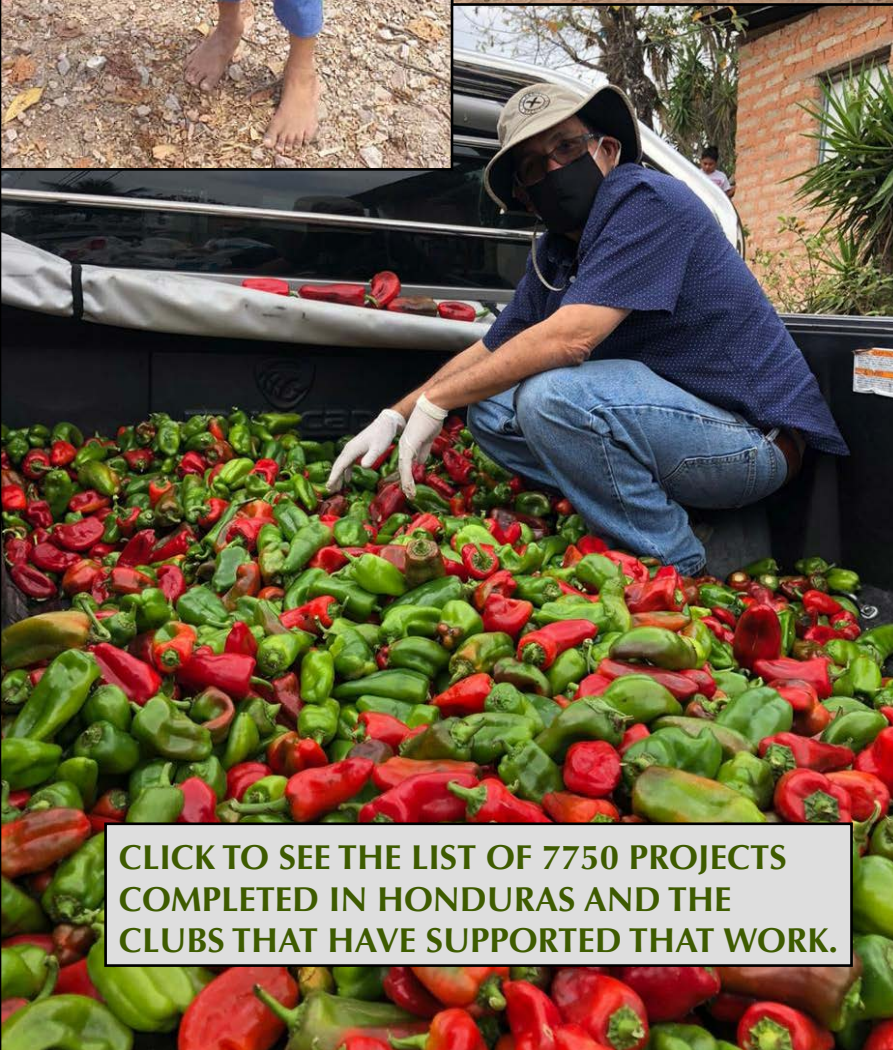

"We have food now to feed our kids."

Villagers in the Copan Valley of Honduras line up to get food bags delivered by the local Rotary club and funded by the Rotary Club of Fort Mill. One day they were treated to a truckload of peppers that was also made available to them.

Fort Mill Rotary funding food bags in Copan Valley of Honduras

The Rotary Club of Fort Mill, District 7750 and other clubs in the district, have long been partners of Rotary in Honduras, members having made multiple trips to the country mainly to complete water projects.

During the time of Covid, the Fort Mill club has been working with the Rotary Club of Copan Ruinas, Honduras, and others to make sure hungry people are being fed. Fort Mill Rotarians have already sent \$15,000 to the local club to provide bags of food to villagers in the Copan Valley, and plan to send more.

The food bags cost about \$16 each and last about 2 weeks.

"Rotarians there told me that many people are begging them for the food," said Fort Mill Rotarian Al Steele, who heads up both the club's and D7750's work in Honduras.

They are trying to go from helping 1,000 families per week to 2,000, a total of more than 8,000 people.

One village helped is El Jural, where D7750 completed its largest water project so far serving 1,590 people, 300 families. Ninety of those families are on the food list. The other 210 families do not need food right now. Seven of our clubs provided funding for that particular project.

Meeting online

1 What made you decide to help clubs adapt to the COVID-19 pandemic?

A large club in my district announced that it would not be meeting anymore: "No Rotary until further notice." Those five words kept running through my mind. I had to do something.

So I wrote a guide [bit.ly/2WNedoZ] to help clubs navigate online platforms like Zoom so they can meet virtually.

As Rotary coordinator for Zone 34, which includes Georgia, Florida, and parts of the Caribbean region, I'm very membership oriented. My initial thought was that clubs should keep meeting online to retain members, but now I've realized there's also a possibility for growth there. So many people are stuck at home right now, and there are no sports for them to watch. Virtual meetings offer an opportunity to get some new people into

for the elderly. Tell them that Rotary still cares about those in need and ask how you can help.

Sometimes the assistance that we give has to be to our own members who are in the at-risk group. Reach out to older club members and reinforce our fellowship. I also suggest a social evening, a glass of wine and video chat, over Zoom. My club tried this out very successfully.

here said, "There is absolutely no way we can go online. It's just not a possibility. No one in the club is tech-savvy." The fail-safe is to maintain a written newsletter and send personal cards and letters to members. It's important to show that Rotary continues in its mission even in adversity.

3 What successes have you seen?

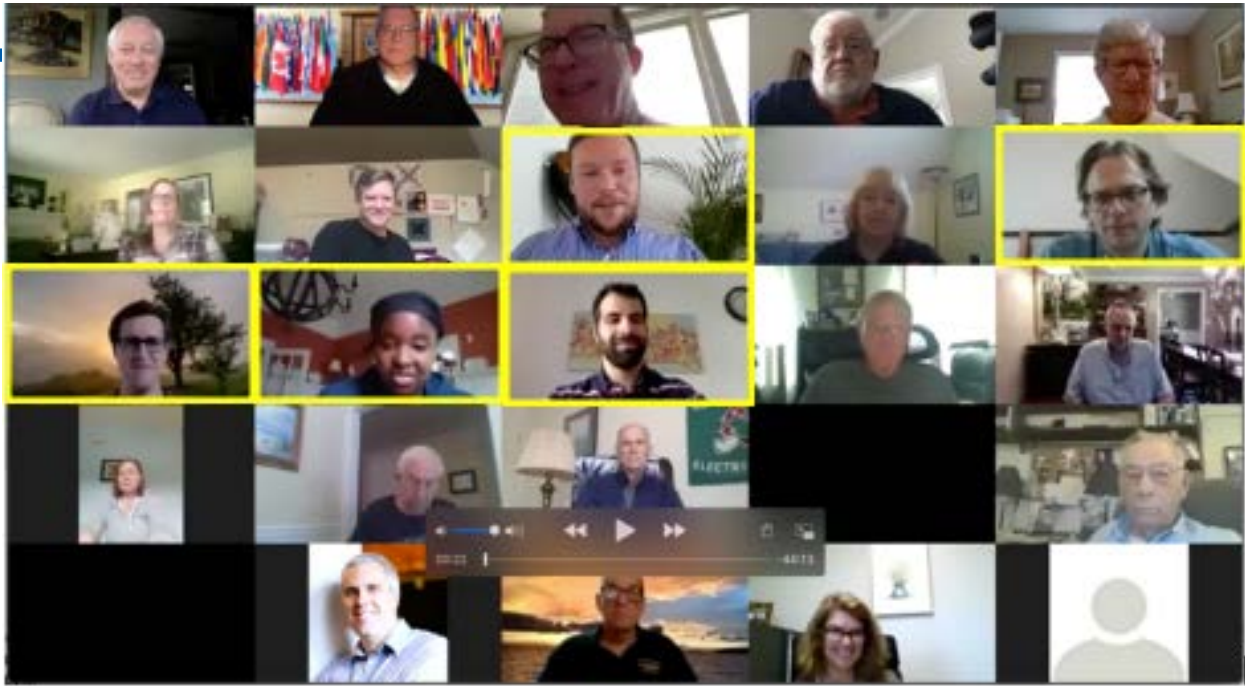

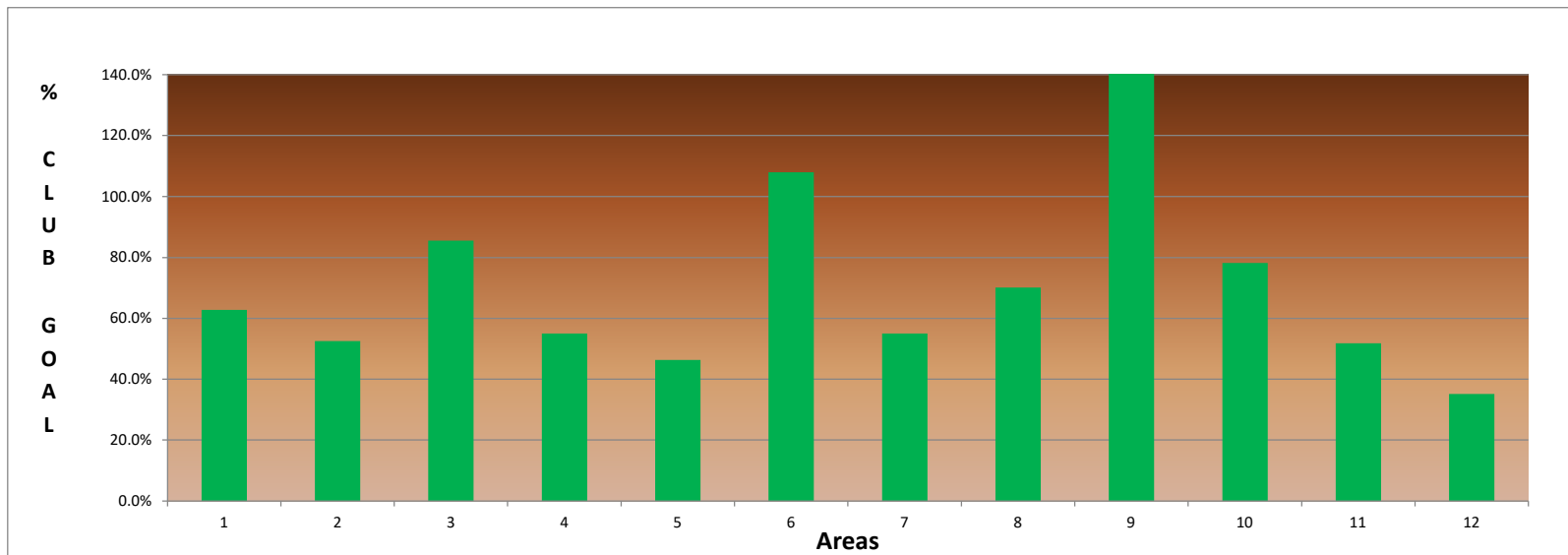

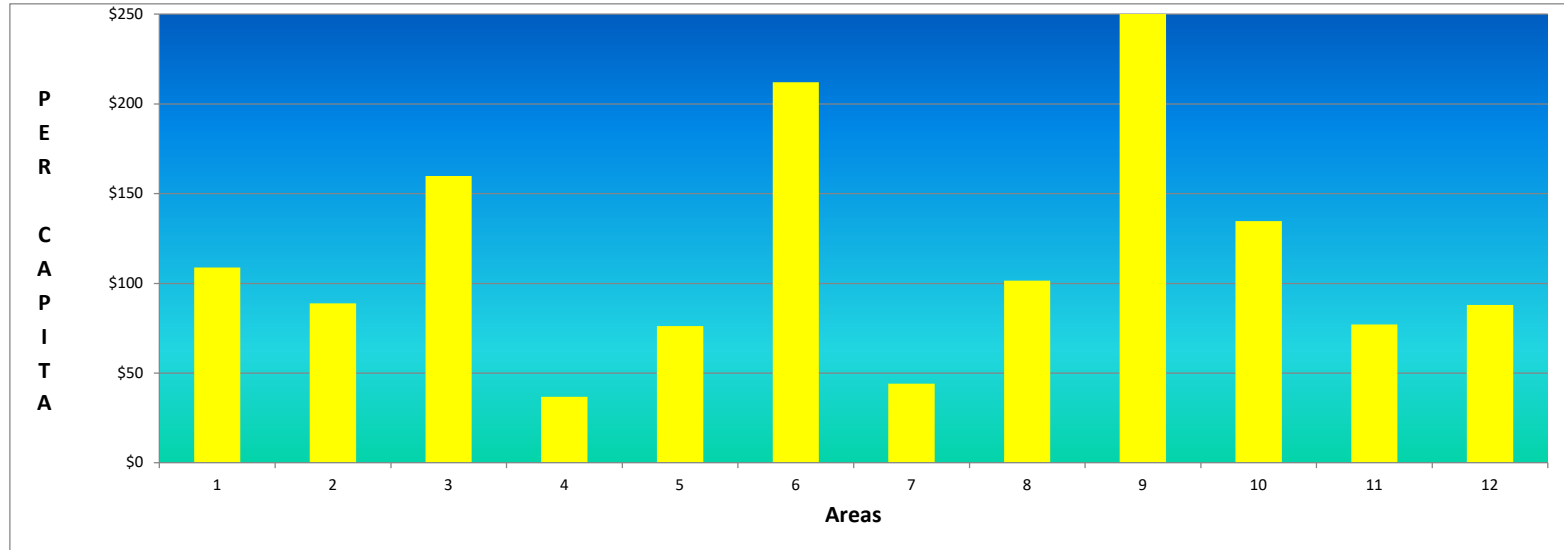


% of Club AF Goal Achieved - By Area
