Aiken club awards \$105,000 in college scholarships to 21 high school seniors

his has been a year unlike any other, but the Rotary Club of Aiken has made it a very special one for 21 high school seniors in Aiken.

Foregoing our traditional luncheon celebration due to COVID 19 restrictions, the squeals of shock and delight heard during the notification phone calls to these deserving students were evidence that the \$5,000 college scholarship each were awarded is a game changer for most of them.

The Rotary Club of Aiken Scholarship Committee carefully considered approximately 120 applicants.

While grades were considered, it was not the major driver for a scholarship determination. Students were evaluated on their extracurricular activities, their

volunteer efforts, the importance attached to furthering their education, the challenges they have overcome, and their own efforts to address their financial needs.

Linda Strojan, Scholarship Committee Co-Chair, explained, "While we looked at the grades of each applicant to ensure they had the ability to be successful in college, we were very interested in helping those students whose actions spoke to their dedication to Rotary's "Service above Self" motto.

These students were engaged in a host of community service activities." She went on to say, "I believe in the power of education to improve lives. If we can help students achieve their goals by making education

more affordable, we have made a difference."

Many of the stories and the students' efforts were heartwarming but the Scholarship Committee could easily see how the effects of the COVID 19 pandemic would affect each applicant.

Many of the applicants had depended on their own jobs to help bridge the financial gap for college, but these were quickly eliminated due to COVID 19.

Given the unprecedented change from a booming economy to a high rate of unemployment, we could see many parents would be unable to provide educational support for their high school senior.

Betty Ryberg, Scholarship Committee Co-Chair, rallied Rotarians and community leaders to donate additional funds to expand the scholarship awards



from 16 to a record-setting 21 scholarships for Club No. 6187.

Four-Way Test program helped with teacher turnover and student behavior

When the Rotary Club of Greenville Breakfast learned about high teacher turnover and a high number of students with multiple Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) at a local middle school, they went to work to help.

Club members decided to develop a partnership with the school, Tanglewood, that addressed Rotary's focus areas of Peace and Conflict Resolution and Basic Education and Literacy.

During the 2019-2020 school year, Greenville Breakfast Rotary Club (GBRC) members facilitated small group sessions with Tanglewood students and select teachers that agreed to teach the Four Way Test.

This program was modeled after a program in the Rotary

Club of Ft. Collins, CO ("Rotary Connects the World").

GBRC members provided teacher-focused 4-Way Test Ambassador training at the beginning of the 2019-2020 school year to initiate ideas for integrating the 4 Way Test into classroom activities and routines.

After this initial training, fice teachers committed to incorporating the 4-Way Test into their process of conflict resolution.

This was followed by in-school participation of GBRC members and other Rotarians, who worked with small groups of students to incorporate the 4 Way Test in making decisions about how to resolve conflict.

The in-school sessions culminated with a school-wide

assembly with a stunt actor sharing the relevance of the 4 Way Test in vocation and in life.

At the end of the school year, the teachers recommended students who best exemplified the spirit of the Rotary 4 Way Test.

Five students were recognized at the school's virtual awards banquet and each student was presented with a custom laptop, laptop bag, Student of Excellence car magnet and a certificate.

A further example of the 2019 Rotary theme of 'Rotary Connects the World' is that the computers and bags were presented by a Rotarian from Charlotte, NC, who happened to visit the GBRC during a planning session in the fall of 2019.




Golden Corner hears from county sheriff

Polio Plus PERSEVERANCE

Let's finish the task we started

I am Doug Kauffmann, a member of the Rotary Club of Greenwood who will serve District 7750 this year as Polio chair. In this initial article, I want to tell you why donating to Polio Plus became so meaningful to me and has been so meaningful to so many.

I served my club as president in 2005-2006. It was during that club presidential year, as it is for so many Rotarians who first serve as club presidents, that I fully came to appreciate the magnificence of Rotary and the Rotary Foundation. I also learned a great deal about Rotary's heroic cause of eliminating polio.

My father, knowing I was in preparation for my year as a Rotary Club president, sent me an April 12, 2005 copy of the Opinion Page of the Wall Street Journal, which included an article on "Polio and Rotary." That date was the 50th anniversary of Dr. Jonas Salk announcing his polio vaccine. A portion of that article that thrilled my heart that day is quoted in the right column.

Of course, that article now dates from 15 years ago and even more has been achieved in eradicating polio, and other organizations, of particular notice, the Gates Foundation, have joined Rotary in this noble (Nobel) effort. However, as close as we have come to eradicating polio, minimal cases still exist in Afghanistan and Pakistan, and we must continue our "Rotarian perseverance" and finish the task we started.

Winston Churchill said of the Royal Air Force pilots who won the Battle of Britain in 1940 against overwhelming odds versus Nazi Germany's air force, "Never was so much owed by so many to so few." Let's make that eloquent statement come alive again in our victory over polio.

So, I ask you as club presidents, Rotary Foundation chairs, and Polio Plus chairs, to make a generous club goal for Polio Plus this year. Please let me know how I can be of service to your club.

oday polio has
disappeared from the
Americas, Europe and the
Western Pacific and is nearly
gone from the rest of the world.

A too little known part of this feat is the role played by Rotary, the international (civic) club, which 20 years ago adopted the goal of wiping out the disease. In 1985, when Rotary launched its eradication program, there were an estimated 350,000 (annual) new cases of polio in 125 countries.

Last year, (2004) 1,263 cases were reported. More than one million Rotary members have volunteered their time or donated money to immunize two billion children in 122 countries.

An economist of our acquaintance calls Rotary's effort the most successful private health-care initiative ever... Rotary's unsung polio effort deserves the Nobel Peace Prize.—From 2005

We won't see more children like this in Nigeria. In June the World Health Organization certified Nigeria poliofree. The last new case of polio in that country was in 2016.

COVID-19 risks are real

Be aware of guidelines when your club members are together

Many Rotary clubs understandably are eager to start meeting again and having events, and some clubs already are meeting in person. All clubs need to take adequate measures to keep people safe during this time when COVID-19 poses a serious risk to the health of Rotarians, their guests and the greater community.

Rotary International strongly recommends that U.S. Rotary clubs and Districts follow "all applicable guidelines from the CDC, and their state and local regulations." RI also has made clear that clubs and districts cannot require a Rotarian to attend any event in person during this new Rotary year. Clubs and districts have been encouraged to have a virtual backup for each event.

COVID-19 presents some special challenges in South Carolina because **cases of the coronavirus are increasing rapidly. South Carolina** now is considered a hotspot for the coronavirus. New cases have jumped from 1,000 to 1,300 weekly during the eight weeks from March 24 to May 23, to 4,515 new cases for the week ending June 13 and 5,906 new cases for the week ending June 20.

Some Rotary Clubs meet in cities in District 7750 that have more restrictions on public gatherings than other places in the state. Rotary Club leaders need to know their local and state restrictions.

A wealth of information can be found at the Centers for Disease Control that will guide club and district leaders on how to keep meetings as safe as possible. Please pay special attention to the sections on Gatherings and Public Events, and Community and Faith-Based Organizations.



Rotary Clubs are urged to follow recommendations to mitigate the risks associated with COVID-19 when offering in-person meetings or events.

The CDC offers guidelines if groups are planning in-person meetings that include:

- ☐ Urge people to stay home when appropriate, such as when a person is sick or has recently had close contact with a person showing COVID-19 symptoms.
- ☐ Encourage frequent handwashing and make available a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
- Promote social distancing at all times during the meeting or event.
- Require cloth face coverings, as feasible.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces.
- Have individual, pre-packaged boxes or bags instead of a potluck, buffet, or family-style meal.
- Avoid sharing of foods and utensils.

A complete set of recommendations can be found on the CDC website. We all have a role to play in keeping our communities safe during this global pandemic and protecting the health of our Rotarians and their guests. It's important to prepare and plan for any Rotary meeting or event.








% of Club AF Goal Achieved - By Area
