# **8 WAYS** to strengthen those Rotary bonds

I got a question at one of my first Rotary Club visits that I hadn't expected. The concern wasn't about attracting new members because the club had already inducted a couple new Rotarians.

Instead, the fear was that the club may have an unexpectedly high attrition rate later in the year because quite a few Rotarians weren't coming to meetings. That's a legitimate concern, and it's one I've started talking about when I meet with the board of directors of each Rotary Club.

With only a few exceptions, most Rotary Clubs fear they are losing a connection with some members who do not want to attend an in-person meeting and also aren't keen on connecting to a virtual meeting. (By the way, if fear of technology is the reason, get in touch with me because we will help provide support for those club members.)

Over the past month, I have collected some ways to keep in touch with club members and ensure they are engaged in the life of a Rotary Club. Some ideas were shared by club presidents or membership chairs in the first Third Thursday Tips & Topics (join us on October 15th for the next one). Other ideas came from some of my District Governor classmates.



Ask each of your board members (and possibly committee chairs) to contact a few club members each month. Let fellow Rotarians know that we care about them and ask if they need any assistance with anything.

2 Have the Club President write a weekly (or even monthly) recap of what's going on in the club.

5 Make sure members who cannot attend meetings have a copy of the program.

Start Pen Pals within your Rotary Club or possibly another
Rotary Club.

Provide a "phone-in" option for members who do not wantto attend the meeting in person or via Zoom.

6 Highlight members at each meeting through a "getting to know you" segment. Include members not attending in person.

T Have service projects that members can do at home such as collecting food for the local pantry, gathering clothes for the thrift store, purchasing gift cards for people in need, or writing notes to people in nursing homes who are lonely.

Record members reading a book for children at a local school or daycare center.

Stay in touch with your friends in Rotary even if you aren't seeing them as much as you did before our world turned upside down in March. These Rotary bonds are more important now than they ever were.

## Consider a satellite club to tap potential members outside your radius

ur Rotary clubs tap barely 1% of the population in a radius of about 15 miles around where each club meets.

We tap 0% of the population where we don't have clubs within 10-15 miles. Most of our clubs are lunch clubs, which data from the restaurant business confirms is a time when fewer people can get away for a 1½ hour meeting (plus travel time). Please watch this video to get an idea of what I'm talking about.

Those constraints alone mean that we're missing a huge number of people – literally a million people in D-7750 – some of whom could and would be Rotarians if we offered a meeting option more to their liking, rather than our traditions. What's the answer?

SATELLITE CLUBS – An extension of your club that meets at an alternative time (most popularly happy hour, 5 pm or so) or an alternate place, perhaps several miles from the current club meeting location.

See https://growrotary.org (log in with your My Rotary credentials) for a "heat map" of where those populations are.

Satellite clubs can also meet at a workplace, such as a medical center or University campus. Beyond Satellite clubs, with hybrid meetings becoming the norm, clubs are able to offer E-MEMBERSHIPS where members can attend virtually, which also reduces 2/3 of the cost of Rotary – the meals.

Don't let these lines get in the way of your club's growth. Remember that a small satellite has a long reach.

The club will partner with a local free cafe, Fort Mill Community Cafe, who leverages a





food truck to provide free meals to communities in need. This engagement will be occurring on a weekly basis where rotary members will have the ability to volunteer to prepare/serve meals in the Fort Mill community.

#### EMERALD CITY Lander Student Pantry \$1,000

Purchase a 25 cubic foot refrigerator and 20 cubic foot freezer for a Student Food Pantry. Will also collect food and other contributions and help to give out students in need.

This will be a new project and this will give the Rotaractors the opportunity to "Do Good in the World". The Emerald City Rotary Club will be involved in the project. This is a chance for Rotarians and Rotaractors to work together.

#### EMERALD CITY Rotary Field Update \$5,000

Renovate the dugouts on Rotary Field and add batting cages. The current dugouts are in disrepair and really need to be replaced. Also, with all the use the fields get there is a need for batting cages. This field was originally built around 2005 and has been an icon in the Greenwood community. Rotary will help purchase the supplies and help to build the new dugouts and the batting cages.

#### **EMERALD CITY**

Inspire a love of reading \$5,000

The project promotes early childhood literacy in Greenwood

County through Dolly Parton's Imagination Library. Parents enroll their children and the Dollywood Foundation mails a book each month to the child free of charge until the child turns 5 or moves out of Greenwood County.

Greenwood County third graders fall below state and national levels in reading proficiency.

#### E-CLUB OF THE CAROLINAS School supplies \$1,150

In conjunction with One Village Uganda led by Herbert Kajoki in our e-club, our grant will provide school children at Nyamyerambiko Primary School with books, pens, pencils, math sets, and rulers in order for the children to be able to write and learn effectively.

This school is located in a rural area with 600 enrolled children and 233 very poor/ needy children, Children often stay at home when they don't have these supplies, so this project will help insure education and improve literacy for these very poor children.

#### EASLEY Landscaping Village \$2,500

We will purchase and plant trees and shrubs for the Opportunity Village Park and walkway leading to park.Funds will be used to purchase trees and shrubs. Rotarians will plant and landscape. Opportunity Village houses families in 23 tiny and 10 transitional homes.

#### **CLOVER**

Roosevelt Park \$1.000

Roosevelt Community Park serves the town of Clover and benefits hundreds of visitors. We will replace the original aging picnic tables located under the shelter within the park

#### **CLEMSON SUNRISE**

**Suicide Prevention** 

#### \$2,000

This project will provide suicide prevention/intervention training to police, firefighters, first responders, teachers, social workers, clergy, and others in contact with those at risk to suicide, providing valuable tips, tools, and techniques to prevent others from taking their own lives.

Rotary will pay for the training materials (\$3.50/workbook) & will help to partially support the funding of the training as well as Rotary signs at the venuas

#### CLEMSON SUNRISE

Reading is Fundamental \$1,500

This project will provide books to under-privileged children (in foster homes, children from abusive environments, dependent on government financial support, and local mother & children registered charities).

We intend to provide books to the children in the areas of Pickens, Easley, Seneca, Clemson, Central, Pendleton, Anderson to encourage them to reading & thus improve literacy. We will buy1,000 books at \$3/book =\$3000

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## World Polio Day: Doug and Sally Kauffmann Challenge

This 2020-2021 Rotary year, our 50 clubs of District 7750 have set their individual goals which come to a joint district goal of \$110,238.

Between July 1, 2020 and November 15, 2020 Doug and Sally Kauffman will match every gift of \$100 or more given to Polio Plus by individual Rotarians up to \$15,000 for the District.

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation will match that money two more times.

That way for every Rotarian that gives \$100 or more, each gift will be increased four times (example Rotarian contributes \$100 for PolioPlus, Doug and Sally will contribute \$100 to PolioPlus, and Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation will contribute \$200 to PolioPlus).

Every Rotarian who gives \$100 or more will also receive that many Rotary Foundation points.

If you make that contribution online or over the phone with the Rotary Support Center 866-976-8279 you will double your points (example Rotarian contribute \$100.00 to PolioPlus through their club, they get 100 points, but if they contribute \$100 to PolioPlus online, they get 200 points).












#### % of Club AF Goal Achieved - By Area
