Meetings will be social gatherings, service activities, virtual meetings, or fundraisers.

Currently, the Passport Club of District 7750 plans to meet virtually every month.

A second activity for a member will be to visit another club, participate in community projects or fundraisers.

A member will document their activities in their Club Passport. Dues will be \$200 per year.

A cause-based club can be built around almost anything. Ideas include entrepreneurship, environmental issues, food insecurity, health and wellness, international service, literacy, social justice, peace building, veteran’s issues, maternal and child health, water and sanitation, and...

TOP TEN reasons your Rotary club benefits from starting a cause-based satellite e-club...

1

You will leave a legacy and strengthen rotary by sharing the gift of Rotary to a demographic that may not find our current clubs’ style, meeting time, or culture appealing.

2

When compared with Rotary Action Groups and Rotary Fellowships, cause-based Rotary clubs offer advantages of regular meetings, opportunities for grants from The Rotary Foundation, and protections of the Rotary Clubs’ insurance policy.

3

Cause-based e-clubs are an inexpensive and relatively easy way to start a new Rotary club. Affiliate members (Rotarians from other clubs) provide expertise for the new club and reduce the need for mentors from the parent club.

4

One of the benefits of being a Rotarian is the development of leadership skills. A satellite club will offer more opportunities to develop leaders, probably in a less formal and more comfortable environment than in a traditional Rotary club.

5

An e-club can invite members from around the world, reinforcing the international flavor of Rotary and providing new opportunities for service around the globe.

6

You will make a difference by attracting new people to Rotary and expanding the number of Rotarians ‘doing good in the world’.

7

Current Rotarians may be honorary or affiliate* members and participate in both their home club, and the cause-based club, cementing members’ commitment to Rotary.

Members of the satellite club are also members of the parent club and can participate in projects of the parent club. This multiplies your club’s opportunity to make a difference.

9

People who follow their passions in Rotary are Rotarians for life. This makes cause-based clubs a member retention strategy.

Your club will be energized by an influx of new people and fresh ideas.

Clearly, it was no small feat for a club the size of the Rotary Club of Aiken to reach this goal. With approximately 175 members, each member had to contribute, or have contributions made in their name to [The Rotary Foundation](#) in the amount of \$1000.

Achieving 100% status was a goal for President Ellen Priest and Rotary Club of Aiken Foundation Chair, Candy Hamilton. The women encouraged fellow members to make life-changing donations despite the year-long challenges associated with holding club meetings during a time of restrictions put into place due to COVID-19.

The Rotary Foundation uses the funds for a variety of international service projects designed to improve the quality of life around the globe. DG Beth said the Rotary Club of Aiken is the largest club “by far in our district” to be recognized as a 100% Paul Harris Fellow organization. She said, “You have made a difference in the lives of so many people through your giving.” She went on to say

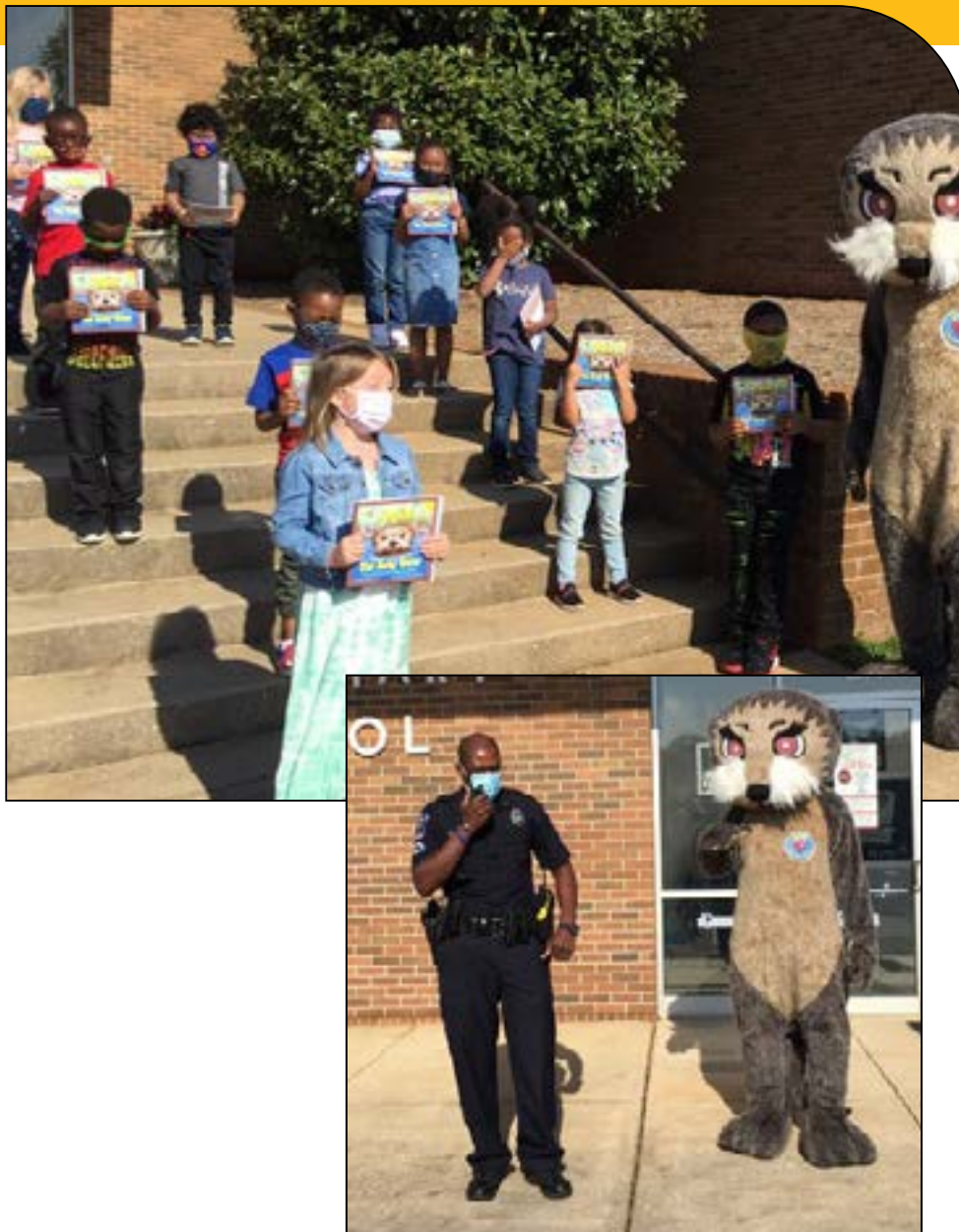
On that site, you or any other Rotarian or Rotaractor you know can:

The cooperation between the town government and the school has greatly increased over the last two years. The town is helping fund the school and the school has agreed to expand its areas of service to include learning disabled children from the town. —Johnny Walker, Rotary Club of Aiken Sunrise



Rotary clubs refurbish school for disabled children in Guatemala

A school in Alotenango, Guatemala (Ensename a Pescar) has been serving the needs of 50 severely handicapped children with a number of disabilities. Through the years, they have asked Rotarians for help in any number of areas.

The government provides very little for them except a space for the school. In their original location, clubs from South Carolina were able to put in two businesses (for sustainability); provided needed medical equipment like wheelchairs and crutches; and most important, fund raised to help pay for a Physical Therapist. With her work over 4 years, 14 of 25 children were able to walk again. Then the government decided to take their school and tear it down for an office space. They were put in a very poor space where they could not hold school and had to store furniture on the roof. The furniture was destroyed by a volcano. Parents united and worked hard to get rid of the local mayor and voted in someone supportive of the school.

This is where Madison South Rotary comes into the picture. In meetings with the school and the UWARA Rotary Club of Guatemala City, we were asked for help in fixing up a new space provided by the local government. Several of us visited that space in January of 2020. The school was to double in size and staff were to take an additional 50 children with learning disabilities. They primarily needed paint, equipment, furniture and supplies for the added number of children. In addition, all desks needed to be replaced. Staff, parents and community members provided the labor.





Guatemala School—

A district grant for less than \$10,000 in total, provided everything they needed to open. Unfortunately, this was right around the time Covid came along so everything was shut down and items could not be purchased right away. Normally, we would have brought a team of Rotarians down from our club and others interested that would have worked alongside the UWARA club Rotarians to join in the painting and decorating of the school. We were not able to do this, again due to Covid.

The UWARA club, under the leadership of Monica Davila and support from other Rotarians in her club, purchased all items at great prices, watching for sales and bargaining with vendors. Since the school was closed, they stored many items in their homes until the school was close to opening. They saved nearly \$3,500, so we were able to go back to our district and request additional items that were needed. Once approved, we were able to use all of the grant and add needed Covid supplies. Take a look at the picture of the desk and attached chair that they were able to buy for \$15 each (made in Guatemala). They have buying power because they purchase so many for other schools.

Some will ask, what if they get moved again? Well, the only thing that won't go with them is the paint used in the school and the wood for building a railing on the stairs. We take that into consideration when funding a project. An additional plaque with the Madison South Rotary and Oregon Interact Club will be added to the school wall when we are able to visit the school, hopefully in March of 2022.

Rotarians fight Polio and Covid-19

World Immunization Week ended April 30, but it's not too late for Rotarians to reflect on the importance of vaccines in saving lives.

As Rotarians, we have decades of experience working to eradicate polio, and we are *this close* to eliminating this dreaded disease. We also have a key role to play in publicizing the power of vaccines in this time when we can dramatically slow the spread of Covid-19 and make our communities safer.

Rotarians know that vaccines save lives. We have been instrumental in working to eradicate polio and the progress is undeniable.

Let's redouble our efforts to raise awareness about the importance of vaccines during this time when many people need a little encouragement to get their Covid-19 vaccinations.

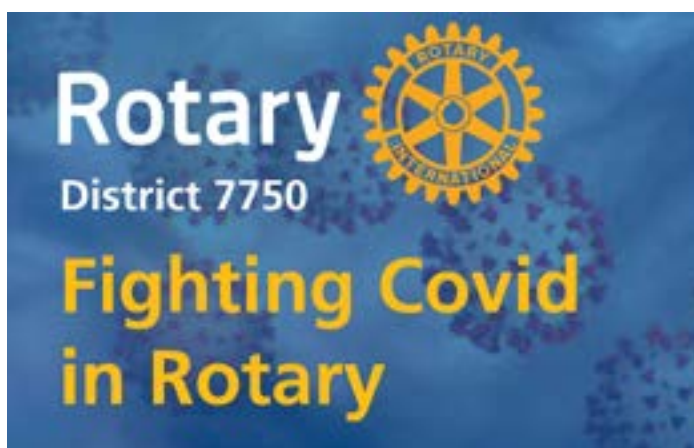
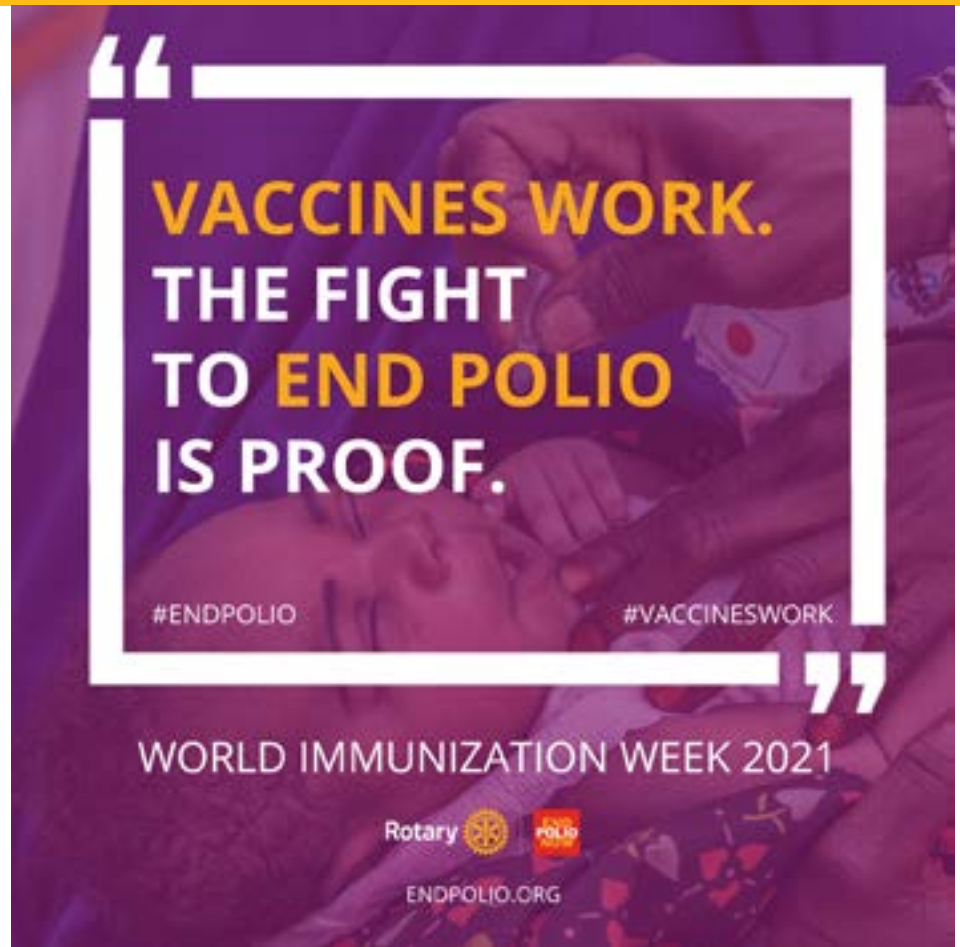
I am proud of the work that many Rotarians have done in places such as Aiken and

In the world of Polio, the World Health Organization reports that the work of Rotary and our partners have saved more than 19 million people from living with paralysis since the 1980s.

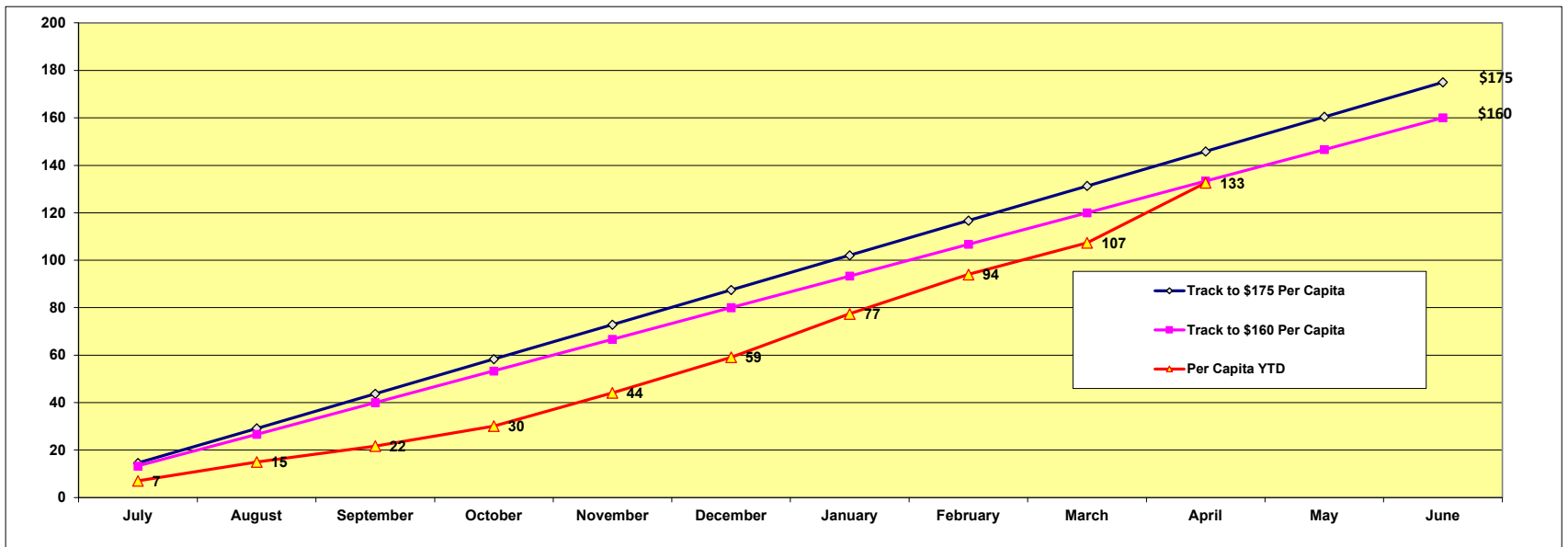

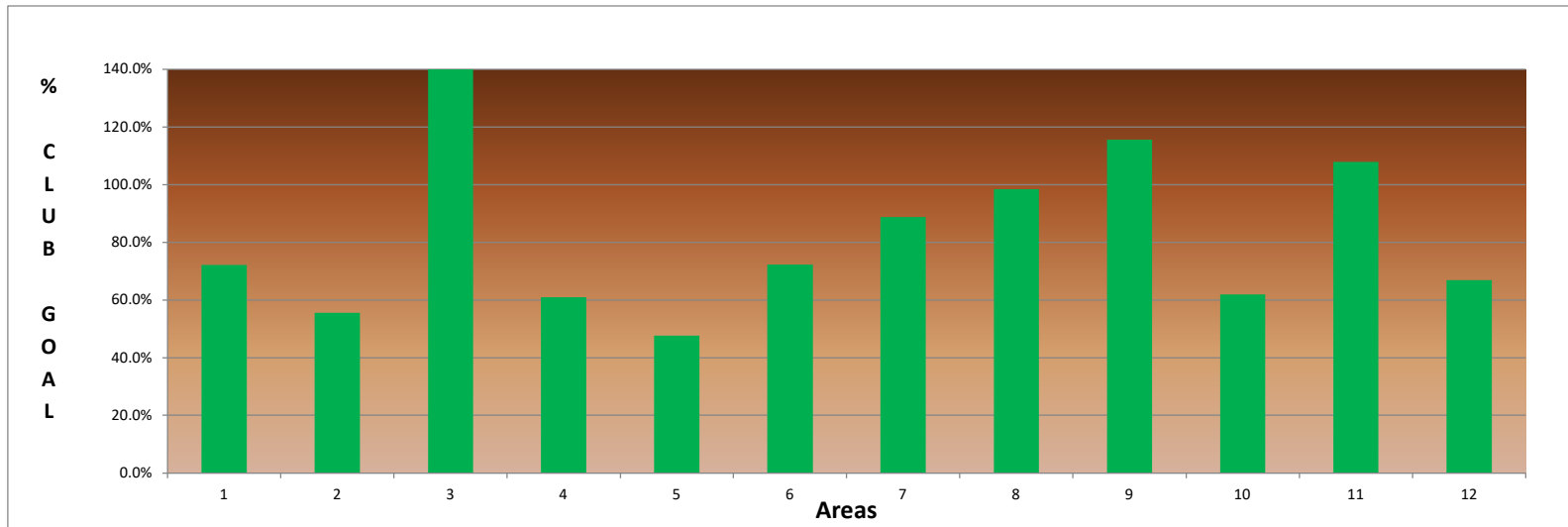

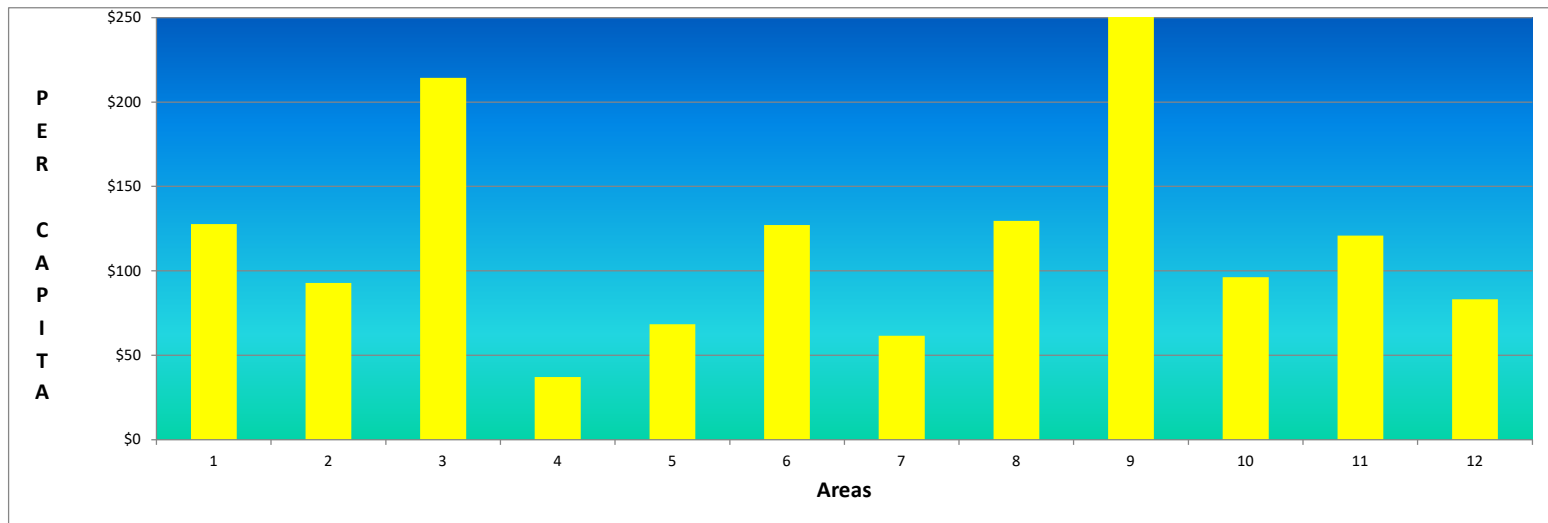


% of Club AF Goal Achieved - By Area
