# Rotary Club of Rock Hill starts Satellite Club

The Satellite Rotary Club of Rock Hill was officially underway in April 2021, however the planning for this club began in the fall of 2020.

The idea sprang from the increasing need for an evening meeting time for younger members. Certain professions, teachers for example, as well as young professionals that are just starting out in their fields, don't have the flexibility to arrive late to work after a breakfast meeting or leave work mid day for a lunch meeting.

The Satellite club was created to solve these issues as well as that of the high dues required by a standard Rotary club.

The Satellite Rotary Club of Rock Hill, since starting in April, has 10 members registered with Rotary International.

Membership consists of previous Rotarians as well as those new to Rotary. The Satellite club is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Rock Hill and therefore members hold full active membership of the lunch club.

With fluid membership everyone from the lunch club is welcome to attend Satellite meetings and vice versa.

A typical Satellite meeting consists of about 15 attendees and membership is growing fast! The club welcomes speakers from the community, just like a lunch or breakfast club, and members are encouraged to bring guests to every meeting. The Satellite Rotary Club of Rock Hill meets the 1st and 3rd Thursdays of the

month which are alternating weeks of their sponsor lunch club.

The club meets from 6 to 7pm to allow members time to commute after their work day. Meetings are held at Millstone Pizza in Downtown Rock Hill on the 1st Thursday of the month and then they rotate locations around town for the 3rd Thursday.

Members are greeted and attendance is entered before hearing from the scheduled

a Saturday afternoon sorting and packing goods at the Second Harvest Food Bank of Metrolina in Charlotte, NC. The club has signed up for several dates this fall to volunteer at the Second Harvest Food Bank Mobile Pantry at varying locations around Rock Hill.

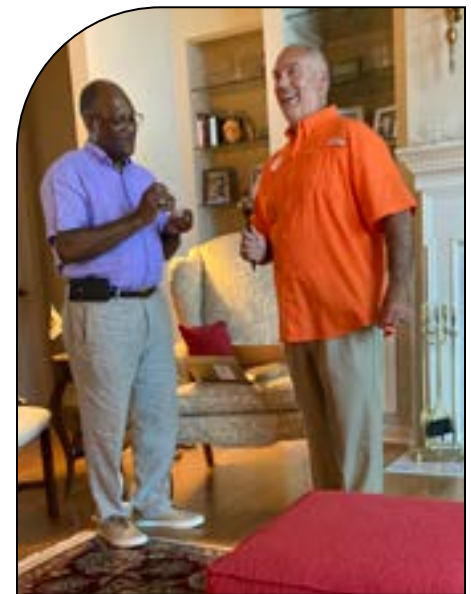

## Korean War hero and Medal of Honor recipient remembered, honored

Seneca native Sgt. Lewis G. Watkins, Oconee County's only Medal of Honor recipient, was recognized at ceremonies in Greenville marking the end of the Korean War, July 27, 1953. Sgt. Watkins was killed Oct. 7, 1952 when he pushed fellow Marines out of the way and covered a hand grenade.

## We raised more than our goal for polio, despite Covid

Congratulations to the clubs and Rotarians of Rotary District 7750 for your gifts to Polio Plus this past 2020-2021 Rotary year. We all know what a challenging year it was with the COVID-19 pandemic to even be able to hold Polio Plus fundraisers, much less to focus on this noble Polio cause with so many other concerns demanding our attention.

However, we were able to surpass our 2020-21 Polio Plus goal of \$105,970 by raising a total of \$121,567. Thank you for your generosity, Rotary District 7750!!

### Important Polio Plus facts to keep in mind as we look ahead in 2021-2022

1. When Rotary began its Polio vaccinations decades ago, the cost of one vaccination was then 60 cents. This past year the cost to vaccinate a child was approximately \$2.60.
2. Though the numbers of countries where the wild polio virus remains prominently is two—Afghanistan and Pakistan—the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) vaccinated 450 million children in 50 countries last year.
3. Why are so many vaccinations still required? One reason is that we still have outbreaks of the wild polio virus and vaccine-derived mutations in countries with vulnerable health systems around the world. Thank goodness, where an outbreak occurs, it is addressed quickly and effectively. Accompanying this problem of outbreaks is the reality that until Polio is fully eradicated vulnerable communities and countries will still need to vaccinate newly born, unvaccinated children.
4. The question is asked by Chuck Davidson, Polio Plus coordinator for Zone 33, “Are we close to finishing our job?” The answer is, “Yes, we are, but we are not quite there yet.” The informed opinion, goal, and desire is that the world will be effectively polio-free by 2026, which includes the three-year certification period of the World Health Organization.
