The newest Lake Wylie Rotarian, John Haney, is also an Air Force Veteran and friend of Glen's. John coordinated the project (including use of District Grant funds) and placed the wheelchairs where they were most needed.

PDG Carol Burdette awarded state's Order of the Palmetto

Past District Governor Carol Burdette has been awarded the prestigious Order of the Palmetto. The award is South Carolina's highest civilian honor recognizing a lifetime of extraordinary achievement, service, and contributions.

A native of Pendleton and a graduate of Southern Wesleyan University in Central, Carol has served as Executive Director of United Way of Anderson County since July 2002. She also was mayor of the Town of Pendleton in Anderson County for 12 years.

Carol. has served on the boards of Anderson University, Spartanburg Methodist College, Sister Cities International and the Anderson Oconee Pickens Mental Health Board. Her long resume of community service includes work with, among other groups, the South Carolina Municipal Association, AdvanceSC, Ten at the Top, the YMCA, Rotary International and the South Carolina Association of Nonprofits.

Carol served as District Governor in 2008-2009 and again in 2018-2019. She currently serves as District Membership Chair and is extremely active in her own club, the Rotary Club of Anderson.

"I am both humbled and grateful," Carol said in accepting the Order of the Palmetto. "God has opened more doors than I can count over my 30-plus years of being able to serve this community, in more organizations and in more ways than I can name here this evening. I get the greatest joy in the world from serving."

An individual must be nominated for the Order of the Palmetto. This once-in-a-lifetime award may only be presented to natives or residents of the State of South Carolina.

Applications for the award must include a minimum of one letter of recommendation from either the State Senator, State Representative or U.S



Representative representing the nominee's district of residence or either of the state's U.S. Senators.

Applications must also include letters of recommendation from individuals who can attest to the nominee's character, accomplishments, and his or her significant contributions on a local, statewide or national level.

Immediate Past District Governor Beth Padgett was asked to submit a letter of recommendation for Carol based on her volunteer work in general and particularly her service through Rotary.

"Carol is a natural leader. She is inspirational, and she constantly looks for ways to support and encourage others. She always is willing to take on any challenge," iPDG Beth wrote in her letter of recommendation to Governor Henry McMaster. "Carol embodies the Rotary motto of 'Service Above Self." She works tirelessly for Rotary, her community, and people in need."

The ad campaign was anchored by a memorable spot called "The Crazy Ones" that celebrated visionaries of the 19th and 20th centuries, such as Albert Einstein, Thomas Edison, Mahatma Gandhi, Muhammad Ali, and many others. Part of the text of ad contained the following:

"Here's to the crazy ones. The misfits. The rebels. The troublemakers. The round pegs in the square holes. The ones who see things differently...... They push the human race forward. And while some may see them as the crazy ones, we see genius. Because the people who are crazy enough to think they can change the world are the ones who do." THINK DIFFERENT

Similarly, Rotary clubs must "Think Different." They must create new pathways to attract and retain Rotary members.

How? First, by adding innovative membership types, such as Corporate, Family, Service, and Social. Second, by developing new innovative clubs, such as Satellite, Companion, Alternative Meeting Time, Cause and Interest-Based, and E-Clubs.

Steve Jobs and Apple changed the way we view computers, moving from a clunky desktop to a lighter laptop to a handheld phone to devices as small as a watch.

Computers still compute, in fact more efficiently than ever, but they connect people in ways that most of could not have imagined not long ago.

Just as our computing devices now connect us, Rotary can connect individuals who want to change the world. Providing new platforms for service in the form of Innovative Clubs and new pathways into Rotary in the form of Innovative Membership Types will ensure our viability as an organization and the success of our mission to provide service to others, promote integrity, and advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace.

Partners in Literacy Haiti

Children in Haiti need lots of resources to help them read

For the children and families of Haiti, the opportunity to learn to read will be life-changing. Haitian teachers are eager to teach and young Haitians are eager to learn—they just lack the resources to strengthen education by providing engaging reading opportunities.

Picture village libraries with many colorful books about age-appropriate and interesting subjects. Picture teachers who are excited about checking books out of our libraries and sharing books in their classrooms. Picture groups of children enjoying story times, games, and activities in the library. Picture our vision.

Learning the Kreyól alphabet is central to early literacy, so PILH is dedicated to teaching young Haitians to read in their native language. We have developed fun and colorful alphabet charts and flashcards to facilitate learning in Kreyól. This past year, to our knowledge, PILH was the first organization to introduce these tools in Haitian classrooms.

exempt status with EIN #87-0904773. Before this, we worked as a volunteer committee in Haiti since 2011, and mentored libraries, created curriculum, and trained teachers; now wider outreach will be possible.

Details about more 2021-22 District Grants

These are the last of the District Grants that were approved for Rotary Clubs in District 7750 for 2021-22. The dollar amount included is the amount of the grant, not the total cost of the project. Rotary Clubs are required to match District Grants with club funds. These grants are possible because of your contributions to the Rotary Foundation. A club's level of Foundation giving to Annual Fund - SHARE determines the grant amount for which it is eligible. Clubs cannot receive more in a grant than the combined total Annual Fund -SHARE giving for that club.

PICKENS

Hagood Mill Equipment **\$2,500**

The Pickens Rotary Club will purchase heavy-duty picnic tables, charcoal/wood fire rings and grill, and heavy-duty trash cans for new picnicking and camping sites for Hagood Mill Historic Site. They will do a significant amount of work including clearing and leveling the sites, making the camp site map, and setting up and installing the picnic tables. They will help set up recreation equipment as well.

PLEASANTBURG Dress-A-Child Greenville

\$5,000

The Pleasantburg Rotary Club will provide \$120 of new clothing to approximately 100 impoverished students in Greenville County Schools. Studies show that children appropriately dressed in new clothing have higher self-esteem and, consequently, higher educational performance. Assistance with clothing also helps unburden needy families.

REEDY RIVER EAFK \$2,500

The Reedy River Greenville Rotary Club will sponsor EarlyAct FirstKnight children in grades K-8 at the Robert E. Cashion Elementary School and Powdersville Middle School. EAFK is a revolutionary character and ethics education program for developing young people into ethical, morally sound, community oriented, self-disciplined, and responsible members of society.

REEDY RIVER

Litter Ends Here \$2.500

The Reedy River Greenville Rotary Club will work with Litter Ends Here to eliminate litter in Greenville County through clean up, enforcement, and prevention education. These funds will help support 500 volunteers in removing 10,000 pounds of trash from Greenville County in the months of October 2021 through February 2022. They also hope to create awareness by cross promoting clean ups and litter prevention education.

SENECA

Education Support \$2,500

The Seneca Rotary Club will partner with the Blue Ridge Community Center in Seneca to help provide a rigorous summer learning program and educational resource center to help students in grades K-5 and particularly those who

qualify for free/reduced lunch programs. The goal is to reverse patterns of low achievement among low-income students and help each student reach his or her maximum potential.

SIMPSONVILLE

Rotary Christmas \$500

The Simpsonville Rotary Club will provide gifts for families at Christmas through the Simpsonville Police Department Advocacy Program. The Rotary Club will provide gifts for children as well as gifts and food for the parent(s).

SIMPSONVILLE

Dictionary **\$2,000**

The Simpsonville Rotary Club will distribute dictionaries to all third graders at the eight elementary

schools in the Simpsonville area. Rotary Club members also will go to the schools for a presentation to the students along with an explanation about Rotary.

UNION

Reading with Rotarians

\$2,500

The Union Rotary Club will purchase and distribute gradelevel reading books to students at Monarch Elementary School. The students will learn four ways that reading can change their lives for the better. Several books will also be purchased for the teachers to aid in student learning.

WESTMINSTER

Urban Renewal

\$2,500

The Westminster Rotary Club will help with urban renewal in downtown Westminster, and indeed, the club has already been helping with renewal efforts to date. The grant funds will be used for a much-needed outdoor stage and seating area that can be used for concerts, plays and other community gatherings.

YORK

Poppie's Garden \$4,500

The York Rotary Club will construct Poppie's Empowerment Garden on the property of a local non-profit organization, Tender Hearts Ministry. The all-season greenhouse and surrounding garden area will grow fresh fruits and vegetables for homebound senior citizens and homeless citizens of the York Community.

PolioPlus Challenge surpasses goal; raises more than 2020 campaign

Last year's Doug and Sally Kauffmann PolioPlus Challenge Match was hugely successful in its first year, and the great news is that the Kauffmann Challenge has raised even more money for PolioPlus this year!

Many thanks to Doug and Sally who are members of the Rotary Club of Greenwood. Doug also is serving as the District PolioPlus Chair for the second year.

Our District had **\$34,461** in contributions this year (compared to \$27,586 last year) that met the terms of the challenge. In addition, we had contributions from Rotary Clubs of another \$7,350.51 made at the club level. Total contributions – including contributions made by Rotary Clubs – to PolioPlus during this period were \$41,811.51 compared to \$32,908 last year.

Points to be distributed from Doug Kauffmann's personal Rotary account will be 39,222 compared to 35,065 last year. Many Rotarians qualified for double matching points. Also, we had quite a few Major Donors give generously during this period even though they aren't eligible for Recognition Points. Doug initially had announced a goal of raising \$28,000 this year for PolioPlus from Rotarians in the District



and that he would match that amount dollar for dollar. He and Sally quickly agreed to match the more than \$34,000 raised during this year's campaign. This is extraordinarily generous of the Kauffmanns. Please find an opportunity to tell them thank you for their commitment to Rotary and to eliminating polio.

Eradicating polio has been the signature project of Rotary International since 1985. At that time, there were approximately 350,000 cases of polio a year. In 1988, Rotary joined the Global Polio as one of several partners in this publicprivate partnership.

So far in 2021, there have been a total of 5 cases of the wild poliovirus reported in the two endemic countries. Four cases have been reported in Afghanistan (two in January and two in the past couple of months) and one case was reported in Pakistan in January. We really are "this close" to eradicating polio.

Thank you for giving generously to The Rotary Foundation and for supporting our work to End Polio Now. Are you interested in joining the District 7750 PolioPlus Society? It's easy.
