

This month is very exciting for me.

Under the leadership of Fort Mill Rotarians Al Steele and Ben Ficklen, I will be part of a team traveling to Honduras as part our district's global grants water project.

District 7750 has partnered with Honduran Rotary clubs for many years to bring clean water to villages, impacting over 2000 homes and the lives of 11,500+ men, women, and children.

We were prevented from traveling to project sites for almost three years due to the pandemic, but the work itself continued. We knew that because of our long standing relationships with our sister clubs in Honduras, their excellent oversight, and Rotary's thorough reporting methods that our projects continued to move forward.

The Copan Ruinas and Santa Rosa Rotary Clubs have arranged for us to meet with representatives

from villages requesting funding to build clean water systems. We will have an opportunity to look into their eyes and shake hands as they commit to the hard work which will make clean drinking water a reality for the children of their villages.

We will also have an opportunity to visit projects completed since our district team's last visit and experience first-hand how clean drinking water improves the lives of these villagers. It will be a joy to meet them and an honor to represent District 7750.

Thank you for your gifts to The Rotary Foundation. It is through these generous donations we can continue to do good in the world. Next month, we will report back on our experiences and share stories of the people whose lives you have touched (just like those children pictured above).







FROM DISTRICT GRANT 3D printing comes to McCormick schools

3D printing has come to the McCormick Elementary and Middle Schools' Media Center thanks to the Satellite Rotary Club of McCormick and a district grant.

The satellite club of the Rotary E-Club of the Carolinas applied for and received \$1,300 to help the small, fairly isolated schools. Children attending these schools live in one of the most impoverished areas of our state.

Two 3-D printers and a stock of filament are on hand and will be operational soon.

School personnel will get help in early March from Joe Barron, a Clemson graduate in Business & Computer Science, who will help them understand the capabilities of the printers, and offer some tips and tricks of the machines. He will also talk with students and teachers about careers in computer schience.

Projects already being considered for the printers include awards medals for reading, goal achievements and fund rasing ideas to support the school's supply cabinet.








Eight new major donors; two in Seneca

Important grant deadlines around the corner

Two District Grant deadlines are near. Rotary Clubs should make sure they are on track to have the 2022-23 Final Report and 2023-34 Grant Application turned in on time.

The Final Report for this year's District Grants is due March 31. The application for 2023-24 District Grants is April 30.

The Rotary Foundation allows us to pool our resources of time, money, and/or talent with the opportunity for "Doing Good in the World." Rotary Clubs have one of their most direct connections to The Rotary Foundation through their participation in District Grants.

A significant portion of

Rotary Foundation donations is returned to our District each year that can help clubs fund projects in their communities.

Club leaders have received training on how to complete a District Grant Final Report and how to turn in a new grant application.

In filling out the Final Report, please make sure you scan and attach your receipts for your project that was funded by the grant. Also, make sure that you retain the original receipts and a copy of your Final Report.

Send the completed report to william.harley@ firstcitizens.com and bpadgettrotary@outlook. com.

District Grant applications must be submitted using the online form but each President-Elect has been supplied a hard copy of the form so they can do a rough draft.

Please retain a copy of your District Grant application and share it with the club board and those

club members implementing the grant.

Also, remember not to spend any grant money until you receive the grant check and deposit it in your bank.

Rotary International usually sends grant funds to District 7750 in August or early September.

When you complete your grant project, be sure to tell your community what your Rotary Club has accomplished. This is one way to attract new members! They see what you're doing and want to be a part of it.

Deadline for April newsletter is March 25.

Rotarians in District 7750 play leadership roles in providing clean water, sanitation, and hygiene in countries around the world. Through your donations to The Rotary Foundation, you are helping save lives and offer hope in places such as Honduras and Guatemala.

On the Rotary calendar, March is Water and Sanitation Month. This is the perfect time to reflect on the good that our Rotarians have done through such projects and continue to do in Honduras and now Ethiopia. Working with World Vision, our District now is working to bring water and sanitation projects to 14 schools in Ethiopia.

Much of our District's work has been done in various villages in Honduras, and a small group of our Rotarians will travel to Honduras later this month to close out some water projects and start new ones.

This will be the first in-person trip since 2019 because Covid limited the ability to travel after that. Don't worry though. Work has been taking place during this time on water projects near Copan and Santa Rosa.

When Rotary does work, it makes sure the projects are needed, sustainable and supported

by the people who will benefit from them. And

Contributions can be made online at My Rotary – https://my.rotary.org/en/donate or by calling the Rotary Support Center at 866-976-8279 and contributing over the phone.

You also may send a donation by mail (The Rotary Foundation, 14280 Collections Center Drive, Chicago, IL 60693, USA) but if so, you must ensure the donations reach Rotary International before this challenge match ends. Donations sent by mail must be postmarked by April 15, but online donations can be made through April 30.

DG Joyce and some of her Rotary friends will donate their Foundation Recognition Points to be used for this special challenge. The challenge match may be limited to the first 40,000 Foundation Recognition points.

Any contributions of \$100 or more will be matched with the same number of Recognition Points (for example, donate \$100 and get a match of 100 points). A maximum number of 500 points will be awarded per person.

Rotarians that are Major Donors or PHF+8 level donors are encouraged to participate but will not receive points. (Donors at this level of giving can no longer receive Recognition Points but their gifts certainly are appreciated!) Rotarians also are encouraged to give less than \$100 if a smaller gift better fits their budget.
