- Two-thirds of adults who volunteered began volunteering while they were young.
- Adults who volunteered at a young age, regardless of income, donate to and volunteer more at charitable organizations than adults who did not volunteer.
- Youth who volunteer are less likely to engage in risky behavior.
- Students who performed voluntary community service were 19 % more likely to graduate from college than those who did not.
- Volunteering is associated with a 27% higher odds of employment.

We can be glad that many of the nation's volunteers are young people interested in making a difference in the lives of others.

Does it help Rotary? You bet. Just look at Ellis Gourdin, President of the Rock Hill Rotary Club. She began her journey as a Youth Exchange student, came home and created an Interact Club, later was an active Rotaractor, and now leads a large Rotary Club as its president. Way to go, Ellis. That's just what we hope for.

SPARTANBURG District's largest club becomes 100% Paul Harris

The Rotary Club of Spartanburg, 7750's largest with 183 members, has become a 100% Paul Harris Club. That means every member has reached a level of giving of at least \$1,000 to the Foundation. Only 20% of clubs in the world achieve this status.

District Governor Joyce Morin and Foundation Chair PDG Beth Padgett were on hand at a special meeting to present the club with its banner.

Club Foundation Chair Scott Girouard said the club has given \$83,000 to the Foundation so far this year, and its total all-time giving to the Foundation is more than \$750,000.

Club president William Gray set the goal of a 100% Paul Harris Fellow Club for 2022-23.

"The Spartanburg Club is quite a large Club with 183 members," Scott said. "It is also a very generous Club. We had many Paul Harris Fellows already and a group of 10 individuals were Paul Harris Fellows plus 5, plus 6, plus 7 and more (each number represents another \$1,000 in giving to the Foundation)."

Scott began looking at what it would take for the club to be 100%. "With the continued generosity of our members we were able to add 84 Paul Harris Fellows at one time, setting a new

Rotary International record," he said.

"As part of our plan to connect our Club to national and international causes, I set the goal for us to be a 100% Paul Harris Fellow Club," said President William Gray. "We see the impact of our Club's generosity locally through our Youth Opportunity Grants, Spartanburg Sings, Rotary Has Heart campaign, among others, but I wanted our Club to make a significant contribution to the Rotary Foundation."

To encourage continued giving to the Foundation, the Club will match donations from new members for the next year so that it can maintain its 100% status. Spartanburg is also encouraging

Pleasantburg helps fund global grant to purchase mobile clinic in Turkey to aid earthquake victims

A Global Grant to purchase a mobile multi-Clinic (MMC) in Turkey is complete.

The Rotary Club of Pleasantburg was a contributing partner to purchase the medical unit that is now open to deliver emergency care to the wounded and sick until the hospitals of Adiyaman, Turkey can resume their work.

Located in a temporary container city with 650 housing units and with purpose to service the residents of this city, the unit is capable of:

- treating up to100 patients a day, equipped with diagnostic equipment (x-ray, ultrasound)
- emergency service with 4 patient capacity
- a laboratory
- patient observation rooms with capacity for 10 patients/ beds

- It is self- sufficient with generators, showers, bathrooms.
- It will have at least one family physicians and 3 specialists.

We are very proud to participate in an international project of this magnitude and humbled by its impact on the survivors of the devastating earthquake.

This is a perfect example of what makes Rotary unique from other organizations. We are an international organization and we bring our forces to serve our communities locally and globally.

We thank Greater Anderson Rotary Club and Greenville City Club for their direct donations to our club for this project.
