

Forester, wildlife biologist speaks to Pleasantburg

- —He was the first outside Board member of Greenville's SynTerra Corporation at role he held for 12.5 years
- He currently serves on the Boards of Abundance Capital, and is Chairman of the Board of the Soapstone Preservation Endowment and the Greenville County Historic and Natural Resources Trust.

As if all of that wasn't enough he is a recipient of the Order of the Palmetto.

Thank you to every Rotarian in our District who has given to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Fund – SHARE and to PolioPlus. Despite a slow start this year, we are finishing strong. Thank you!

We will publish our final contribution numbers for 2022-23 in the August newsletter.

As I write this with six days to go in the 2022-23 Rotary year, District 7750 Rotarians have contributed \$448,375 to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Fund - SHARE

program. Almost another \$6,000 has been donated to other Foundation grant programs, while almost \$5,000 has been donated specifically to Ukraine relief

programs. This is a remarkable record of Foundation giving this year.

What's also clear is that we are having one of our best years for giving to PolioPlus. Many thanks to Doug and Sally Kauffmann for inspiring contributions through their PolioPlus Challenge Match. D-7750 Rotarians so far have donated \$164,405.81 to PolioPlus. This is several hundred dollars away from setting a record for Foundation donations in a single Rotary year.

This is our way for "Doing Good in the World" as Rotarians through a Foundation where all the decisions are made by fellow Rotarians. Please make sure that you do not spend any grant funds until you have received and deposited your check. Rotary International will not accept receipts for projects that are dated before the grant funds are received and recorded by the clubs.


