on the road to '24

he Rotary Membership Growth Strategy is our GPS to direct us to where we need to go with membership to keep our Rotary clubs vibrant and vital in our communities.

It is helpful and provides the best advice and direction on how we can accomplish our membership journey each year. If we don't follow those directions, we lose members, and it weakens our clubs.


District 7750 has seen a decline each year in the past 5 years —from a high of 2,648 on July 1, 2019, to a low of 2,348 on July 1, 2023.

We have veered off track and our GPS is blaring an abrupt "RECALCULATING!" with a voice that seems annoyed that we did not listen to the best advice.

All of us have heard that voice blaring "RECALCULATING!"

Our district leadership will be rolling out new directions to enable clubs to finish this year with at least as many members your club had to begin the year.

Your club president and club membership chair will be contacted by a district representative to commit to hosting a standalone Rotary Information Event at a date, time, and place in late February or early March where club members



bring potential Rotary member prospects for an overview of Rotary and their club.

This is a time-tested strategy, used successfully in hundreds of Rotary clubs around the world.

Let's follow these directions to get where we need to go so, we don't have to hear our GPS blaring another annoying "RECALCULATING!"

We're 20 members short of where we needed to be as of Jan 1. An additional new member in just HALF our clubs would get us back on track. We need our clubs to figure out how to find 20 additional members right away, and then keep on finding a few per week.

Membership growth is simple—it's just not easy.



#### Celebrate Rotary and Peace on February 23—

#### It's the 119th birthday of Rotary International and **World Peace and Understanding Day**

Happy Birthday, Rotary. People around the globe commemorate World Peace and Understanding on Feb. 23 every year. This celebration is linked to the birthday of Rotary.

On Friday, February 23, Rotary will celebrate its 119th birthday. This was the day in 1905 when Rotary founder Paul Harris and three of his friends met in a downtown office

building in Chicago for what was to become the first meeting of a Rotary Club. Paul Harris surely had no idea what he was creating when he put together this small group to exchange ideas and build a network for meeting people and making new friends.

Soon Rotary Clubs were springing up all over the country in large cities, and within years those large clubs were venturing out to places such as the Upstate of South Carolina to form other clubs. And then, Rotary crossed the borders to other countries, and by 1922 Rotary clubs were on six continents.

Paul Harris said at the time, "Whatever Rotary may mean to us, to the world it will be known by the results it achieves."

Rotary has achieved much in those 119 years. It was a leader in the movement formed in the mid-1980s to eradicate polio. Today, we are "this close" to delivering a polio-free world to the children of the world. For more than a century, Rotary has changed lives – both in the local communities where Rotarians live and across the globe in places where people need clean water, access to basic health care, and schools that make a better life possible.

Rotary also has distinguished itself by promoting goodwill and peace in the world. It is appropriate that World Peace and Understanding Day occurs each year on February 23. To help fulfill its mission in this area, Rotary International has set up Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution in eight universities around the world.

#### Kauffmann PolioPlus Challenge raises more than \$42,000

Thanks to another enthusiastic response to this year's Doug and Sally Kauffmann PolioPlus Challenge Match, District 7750 is having one of its best years ever for raising money to eradicate polio.

This good news comes on the heels of setting a record in 2022-23 for donations in a single year for PolioPlus donations.

Many thanks to Doug and Sally who are members of the Rotary Club of Greenwood. Doug also is serving as the District PolioPlus Chair for the fourth year.

Our District had \$42,367.90 in individual contributions this year that qualified as donations under the terms of the challenge. Doug also donated 26,585 of his Foundation Recognition Points to donors who qualified for a match

for donations given during the time.

Also, we had quite a few Major Donors and Paul Harris Fellows +8 who gave generously even though they aren't eligible for Recognition Points.

We had another \$8,980.73 given to PolioPlus by Rotary Clubs that are not eligible to receive matching points.

Doug initially had announced a goal of raising \$40,000 this year for PolioPlus from Rotarians in the District and that he would match that amount dollar for dollar. He quickly agreed to match the amount raised during the PolioPlus campaign with a \$43,000 donation.

# Here are the encouraging numbers on new polio cases in 2023.

Wild Polio Virus Cases
Afghanistan—6 cases
Pakistan—6 cases
Other countries—0 cases)

Circulating Vaccine Derived Cases worldwide is 447, down from 878 in 2022. This number is going down significantly.

#### Summary of Polio eradication efforts in 2023

Afghanistan and Pakistan remain the only two countries where the Wild Polio Virus (WPV1) is endemic. Wild polio transmission has now been limited to just a few districts in eastern Afghanistan and one province in nearby Pakistan. Through continuing efforts in 2023 the number of "zero dose" children, those who have yet to receive a first vaccine, is dwindling.

Also, thanks to a newly developed oral vaccine type 2 (nOPV2) which reduces the chances of "vaccine derived" poliovirus transmission, the numbers of the variant poliovirus type 2 (cVDPV2) continues to

greatly decline.

Nearly 1 billion doses of the nOPV2, a safer, effective, more genetically stable version of the oral vaccine, have been administered across 35 different countries in recent years.

In 2023 global health workers vaccinated more than 400 million children.

# NORTH SPARTANBURG Mobile Medical Clinic

#### \$2,000

North Spartanburg Rotary Club will help with a mobile medical clinic that will be in a donated bus that will serve homeless people in Spartanburg County. Rotarians will help with funding medications and medical supplies as well as promoting this project to the media. Up to 10,000 people will benefit from this project, and a dozen Rotarians will be involved.

# NORTH SPARTANBURG Teaching Garden

#### \$500

North Spartanburg Rotary Club will help St. Luke's Free Medical Clinic develop a Community Teaching Garden at Virginia College of Osteopathic Medicine in Spartanburg to educate and help provide vegetables, herbs, and fruit to food-challenged persons. About 1,600 patients will benefit from the project, and two Rotarians will be involved.

The Pickens Rotary Club will create a vegetable garden to be maintained by the special needs adults in the Pickens County Board of Disabilities and Special Needs. One hundred special needs individuals will benefit, and 40 Rotarians are involved.

#### **Dress A Child**

#### \$5,000

The Pleasantburg Rotary Club will provide \$120 worth of clothing to needy children at Cherrydale Elementary School. This project was developed in part because of a study that found children who are well dressed tend to perform better in school. One hundred children will benefit from this project and 25-plus Rotarians are involved in the project. Old Navy also is a partner and contributor to this project.

# REEDY RIVER GREENVILLE School Supplies

#### \$3,000

The Reedy River Greenville Rotary Club will provide school supplies, books, and equipment for children in nine classrooms at A Child's Haven. The agency treats children with developmental delays as a result of limited resources, abuse or neglect and provides support and education for their families. The supplies will benefit 150 students and 10 Rotarians will be involved.

#### **New Uniforms**

#### \$1.675

The Reedy River Greenville Rotary Club will supply uniforms and financial support for special events for children with variable levels of physical and/or mental developmental challenges for children in the Mauldin Miracle League. This is an organization that believes "Every Child Deserves a Chance to Play Baseball." The participants will receive a trophy at the end of the season as well.
