

FAST & FURIOUS FOR '24 In what gear is your club and how can you shift, if necessary?

We are two months from the end of the 2023-2024 Rotary year. This year has sped by!

You might be wondering how we are doing to reach the goal of 2,400 members in District 7750.

As I write this column, we have 2,398 members. Some would say we are only 2 members away from goal. However, we historically lose 60 members in June as clubs clean up their rolls before the beginning of the new Rotary year begins on July 1.

For us to reach our 2,400-member goal, we need to add 62+ new members in these last 2 months.

Our membership theme this year is Fast & Furious for '24, taken from the highly successful action movie series about fast cars and drivers. So, think about a car with 5 forward speeds. With our clubs being the transmission to drive membership growth, here is the breakdown how the 49 clubs in our district are doing.

At this point, we have 17 clubs that are losing members to last year; 3 that are flat to last year; and 29 clubs that are growing over last year from 1 new member to as many as 13 members.

Every Rotary club member can access Membership Success Center (MAP) at DACdb.com to see the Progress Dashboard for their club. This valuable tool

shows the current membership of their club each month and how that compares to the number of new members needed by month for their club to reach goal.

If every club added 1 new member each of these last 2 months, we would meet and exceed the 2,400-membership goal. This would be the first time in 5 years that District 7750 grows membership year-over-year. Every club should be planning a membership event at their board and club level for May and June regarding how they are going to speed up their membership attraction pace to add 2 new members.

Without our contributions to Annual Fund – SHARE, we would not have funds for our District Grants that help us do good at home and our Global Grants that change lives around the world.

DG Renee encourages Rotarians in District 7750 to contribute to Annual Fund-SHARE during this Challenge Match! Make sure you choose Annual Fund-SHARE and provide your Rotary (Member) ID Number.

Contributions can be made online at My Rotary – https://my.rotary.org/en/donate or by calling the Rotary Support Center at 866-976-8279 and contributing over the phone. You also may send a donation by mail (The Rotary Foundation, 14280 Collections Center Drive, Chicago, IL 60693, USA) but if so, you must ensure the donations reach Rotary International before this challenge match ends.

Donations sent by mail must be recorded at RI by May 31. The challenge match may be limited to the first 40,000 Foundation Recognition Points.

Contributions of \$100 or more will be matched with the same number of Recognition Points (for example, donate \$100 and get a match of 100 points). A maximum number of 500 points will be awarded per person.

Rotarians who are Major Donors or PHF+8 level donors are encouraged to participate but will not receive points. (Donors at this level of giving can no longer receive Recognition Points but their gifts certainly are appreciated. Thank you for your leadership giving!) Rotarians also are encouraged to give less than \$100 if a smaller gift better fits their budget.
