

Here are some popular questions about our campaign:

Why are we doing this?

To make a greater, sustained impact by supporting Foundation initiatives now and into the future.

When does this take place? The campaign officially runs from July 1, 2023, through January 31,

2026. All major gifts donated during this time will count.

What counts as a Major Gift? For the purposes of this campaign, (1) a Major Gift is an outright gift of \$10,000 or more, (2) cumulative giving of at

least \$10,000 during this period, (3) bequests or a donation to the endowment of at least \$10,000, or (4) a pledge made during this period that is fulfilled during a maximum of three years.

A three-year pledge could be made this month or even next year, and not fulfilled for three years, but it would count given the agreement required for a pledge.
