85 attendees), services to seniors through Catawba Council on Aging, (250 seniors have been served) and supports Mental Health First Aid Training at the library.

Brad Goodale of C4 accepted the donation on behalf of the ministry. "We meet people in a crisis," he said. "We can't do what we do without two things— the Lord Jesus Christ and people like you, specifically the ministries that are sitting in front of you."

Goodale said the ministries represented at Rotary work hand in hand with one another. He said when C4 is able to place someone in need of shelter, often the other ministries follow closely with food and clothing.

He said he hopes the community can see Union County's homeless population and drug addicted population has decreased.

Prodigal's Home Assistant Director Daniel Coleman said the home takes men who are bound by the chains of addiction and tries to instill in them all God has to offer.

"We provide them with a roof over their head, we join with several different programs who help them get insurance, make sure they get their GED," he said. "We have companies who allow them an opportunity to get work."

Pregnancy Center Executive Director Lisa Hartley said the organization provides pregnancy tests, formula, food, diapers and other items, and tries to show people how they can go from dependency to self-sufficiency and help their children to be lifelong learners.

David Turner, Larry Yarbrough and Charlie Wilson, who is also a Rotary member, represented Neighbors Helping Neighbors. When it started, the ministry did home repairs, including roofing and plumbing. Today, the group builds ramps for the handicapped. The group has already completed four this year and built 15 last year. Five people are currently on the waiting list.



FINISH STRONG

Strategies to end year with net positive growth

Here are some key strategies to help your club finish strong with Net Positive growth:

1. Attrition Is Real

Every year, clubs face unexpected losses near June 30. Be proactive—plan for it.

2. Expand Your Membership Base Now

Follow up with guests and speakers who've visited your club. A simple phone call can lead to a new Rotarian.

Schedule a Discover Rotary session for the first or second week of June. With prompt follow-up, you can welcome new members before June 30.

Reconnect with former members. Life changes—check in to see if the time is right for them to return. Some clubs are hosting Re-Discover Rotary sessions for former Rotarians to share updates regarding the club's culture and events.

Club Presidents and Presidents-Elect should collaborate now to execute these strategies. A strong finish now sets the stage for a fast start in July.

3. Survey Your Club Culture

Use the Member Satisfaction Survey in the Membership Success Center to understand your current environment. Growth isn't just about new members — it's also about retaining the ones we have.

4. Embrace Innovation

Explore new club formats (e.g., Satellite, Companion, or Service-Only Clubs) and flexible membership types (Family, Corporate, Young Professional, etc.) to meet people where they are.

5. Leverage Your Resources

You're not in this alone. Your Assistant Governors and District Membership Team are here to support you. Tap into their knowledge, strategies, and encouragement.




