GROW ROTARY using the three pillars

ATTRACTION: We have a Club Support Team made up of your fellow Rotarians who have been successful in growing and attracting new members to their clubs.

The Club Support Team, headed up by Jim Nichols from Greer, will help you develop, plan and execute an attraction event, like Discover Rotary. These information sessions have been shown throughout our district to be highly successful at attracting new members. However, they must be done right and the Club Support Team members are ready to help you do just that. So how do you get people to attend an Information Hour? Simple, you ask. Membership in Rotary always starts with an "ASK."

Do the folks in your community know about the great work your club is doing? A key element in attracting new members to your club is visibility. We are not "Your Grandfather's Rotary," However, many people in your communities do not know that. Club membership teams and PI teams should work together to attract new members (as well as keep

existing members).

A good public image plan for your club is a must if your club is going to grow. We had seven clubs receive the public image (EPIC) award last year. I hope we have 2 or 3 times than many clubs receive an EPIC Award this year.

Maggie McMahon can help. She will have a public image training session online on Saturday, Aug 2. Be sure someone from your club attends, especially your club public image chair. You can also learn more about ideas to improve your public image by attending the zone PI webinars. Check out elevaterotary.org for more information about the webinars and other public image ideas.

ATTRITION: The second part of growing Rotary is reducing attrition. PDG Terry Weaver reminds me, maybe not daily but frequently, that attrition is not a growth strategy. He is 100% correct. You cannot grow your club by reducing attrition.

However, attrition can be a declining strategy. We have clubs in our district that are great at attracting members, but unfortunately, they are also great at losing members. That is not a formula for growing your Rotary club. People do not join Rotary, they join a Rotary Club.

The reverse is true as well.
People don't leave Rotary,
they leave a Rotary Club.
Now I realize that life
happens, and some people
move on for various reasons.

But let's be honest with ourselves, some potentially great Rotarians leave because they are not happy or satisfied with the club they belong to.

So how do we keep our members from leaving? We do it by making the club experience worth the time and the money that your members are investing to be a member of your club.

Do you know how satisfied your members are with your club? The only way to find out is to ask them. When was the last time you asked your club members what they wanted to do?

Attraction Retention New Clubs

Club Presidents and membership Chairs, send a survey to your members and find out what they think about the club and what kinds of projects they are interested in doing. You can simply use the canned survey that you can create in the Membership Success Center, or design one of your own.

Kylie Herbert from Anderson is a member of our Grow Rotary Team and will be glad to work with any club that is interested in becoming more irresistible and reducing attrition. If you have more people going out the back door than coming in the front

door, call Kylie or Jamison.

STARTING NEW CLUBS: The third part of growing Rotary is by starting new clubs. Last year we started

three new clubs in our district.
Roger Heitzeg from Greenville has a team ready and willing to help any club interested in expanding their reach by starting a new or companion club. If you have an idea about starting a new club, call Roger. He can help.

Attraction or Attrition: Know your nemesis!

So, if your club is not growing do you have an attraction problem or an attrition problem. You can find out easily by going to the **MEMBERSHIP SUCCESS CENTER** in DaCdb and find your club's historical trend. The Membership Success Center is a great tool for clubs. Once you have entered your club's membership goal you can track your performance monthly. You will be able to see early in the year if you are on track to attain your membership goal. The membership success track is based on your club's 3 year history of attrition. —*Dave*

Grants still available to help communities in our district recover from 2024 hurricane damage

Hurricane Helene ravaged the western portion of our state in late September of 2024, leaving in its wake catastrophic damage to infrastructure and regrettably, loss of life.

Rotary Works and Rotary District 7770 contributed funds that were distributed to the United Way of Anderson, United Way of Pickens, United Way of Piedmont, and the United Way of Greenville to assist with disaster relief.

Rotary Zone 33/34 also offered a disaster relief grant to assist those affected by the devastation of the hurricane. We were awarded \$25,000 that was distributed among 10 areas in the western portion of the state. Consequently, there were food pantries that were (and some continue) struggling with the demand of food insecurity and organizations whose freezers were no longer operational due to the hurricane. They faced great difficulty trying to preserve much needed food donations. The grant provided relief for both of those needs.

MONIES ARE STILL AVAILABLE FROM THE ZONE 33-34 DISASTER RECOVERY FUND FOR QUALIFIED GRANTS

Grants can be requested of up to \$25,000 for a project related to recovery from Helene in our district. PDG Joyce Morin will be coordinating requests. DG Dave Brenner transmitted grant instruction to club leadership in July.

What a great Rotary Foundation year!

Thank you! Our District had its best year ever for giving to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Fund. This is outstanding especially since we set a significant record last year. We also came close to setting another record for PolioPlus. You should be proud of yourselves. You are "Doing (a whole lot of) Good in the World."

Rotarians in our District contributed **\$520,819** to our Foundation's Annual Fund and gave **\$170,818** to PolioPlus. Some of the Annual Fund donations were made to funds other than Annual Fund – SHARE so those will not count toward a club's maximum eligibility for District Grants. Our District will not

receive District Designated Funds in those cases.

Our Rotarians' gifts for PolioPlus help move us closer to fulfilling our promise that one day soon children will live in a world free of polio.

And through the contributions to the Annual Fund, we are increasing our District's ability to do more at home through District Grants and more through our Global Grants in places such as Honduras and Guatemala and possibly other countries this new Rotary year.

Donations made to other areas of the Annual Fund will help fund our Peace Centers and provide disaster response grants in the world.

District Grant checks coming soon, maybe by mid-August

Our District soon will receive our District Grant Funds from Rotary International, and those checks will be sent to club Treasurers shortly after we receive the money.

All of our paperwork is at Rotary International, and we're at their mercy. We hope to have the checks by mid-August.

As soon as you receive and deposit your District Grant check, you can start your projects. A couple of the checks will come from District 7750's main account. Our District has provided some supplemental funding to ensure as many clubs as possible can enhance their work in their own communities.

Make sure to keep a copy of your bank statement that shows when you deposited the check. You will need that when you submit your final report.

Also, please remember that you must have receipts for all purchases made with the grant funds and with your club's match of those funds.

Finally, Rotary International will not accept any receipts for purchases made before the club received and deposited the grant check.

Bill Harley is the longtime District Grants Chair. He does a great job every year, so please tell him "thank you" when you see him.—*Beth*

Spartanburg celebrates its numerous successes during 2024-25

The Rotary Club of Spartanburg held its annual meeting to celebrate accomplishments and introduce new leadership.

Members recognized William Marcus, Jim Rohrer, and Tammy Whaley for completing their three-year terms on the board. They also thanked Ross Hammond, Cindy Hughes, and BG Kondaveeti for reaching the halfway point in their service.

The club welcomed new board members Ann Angermeier, Leah Blanton, and John Langford, and highlighted Ann's role in organizing programs.

Louis Smith led the club as President during the 2024–2025 year. He helped drive the success of the club's Gala, which raised \$45,600 for Total Ministries, Project R.E.S.T., and PolioPlus. The club distributed more than \$35,000 in Youth Opportunity Grants and contributed to disaster relief following Hurricane Helene. Members also supported the Rotary Foundation.

The club awarded \$2,500 scholarships to students attending Wofford College, Converse College, and USC Upstate. The club donated \$1,000 to the Hub City Writer's Project and backed "Story Book Live," a Little Theater initiative that serves children nationwide.

Club members promoted science and literacy by sending Region Three Science Fair winners to the International Science and Engineering Fair and by hosting Rotary Reader Day in District Seven.

At the close of the 2024–2025 year, the club had 186 members—maintaining its spot as the largest in District 7750. At the end of the Annual Meeting, Louis Smith passed the gavel to incoming President Chip McLeod.

The club recognized Louis Smith, CEO of Smithworks Fine Jewelry, for his leadership. They also acknowledged his wife Carter Willard Smith for helping coordinate the Gala.

Chip is a Senior Resident and First Vice President at Merrill Lynch who brings 31 years of experience and a strong record in community service and mission work to his president's role.

Keep asking AI for tweaks until you get what you want, or take what it gives you as a starting point and modify yourself to add more detail, such as specific dates and who is responsible.



Ulan Abdimamatov, Pleasantburg Rotary Club's 2007-2008 RYE student from Kyrgyzstan, had no idea his gift to the club would leave such a lasting impression.

Every year since Ulan's gift of ceremonial Kyrgyz regalia to then club president Ed Maier, the kalpak (headwear) and chapan (robe), along with an elaborate horse whip, are passed from one president to another during the official incoming president's induction.

Made by tribal women, the color and patterns of the chapan, as well as the placement of the kalpak's pointed creases, reflect the power and position of the leader in the community.




