"Let There Be Peace on Earth, ...AND LET IT BEGIN WITH ME"

February is Peace and Conflict Resolution month in the Rotary world. Peace and conflict resolution has been a principle of Rotary for many years. However, it is important to recognize that peace is more than the absence of war—it is the presence of understanding, opportunity, and cooperation. For

more than a century, Rotary International has made peace and conflict resolution a cornerstone of its mission, recognizing that sustainable peace begins at the community level and grows through service, dialogue, and education.

As Rotarians we understand that conflict often arises from unmet needs, inequality,

lack of access to education, and limited economic opportunity. By addressing these root causes, we help create environments where peace can take hold and thrive. Whether through local service projects or global initiatives, Rotarians work to replace division with collaboration and mistrust with mutual respect. We play a vital role in modeling peaceful problem solving by encouraging respectful conversation, ethical leadership, and collaboration. As I traveled around our district visiting our Rotary Clubs, I am blown away by the impactful humanitarian projects each club is doing. Programs that support education, economic development, and health care reduce the conditions that can lead to conflict.

Our Rotary Youth Services programs empower young people to become ambassadors of peace. By learning leadership skills and engaging with other cultures early in life, these future leaders develop the empathy and perspective needed to navigate an increasingly complex world. Every club I visit talks about the work they are doing with the young people in their community. What great role models Rotarians are giving these young people

Just a couple weeks ago I had the opportunity, along with other Rotarians, to view the monks as they are walked through our Rotary District on their way from Dallas, Texas to Washington DC. What a quiet message of peace they are sending to the hundreds of thousands of people who are coming out to see them as they make their way to Washington.

Every Rotarian is a peacebuilder. Through our actions, our words, and our service, we demonstrate that cooperation is stronger than conflict. By listening first, seeking common ground, and serving with compassion, we help build bridges where others see barriers.

As we continue to work in our communities, let us remember that peace is not a distant ideal, but a daily practice. Together, through Rotary, we can help create a world where conflicts are resolved through understanding, and peace is given a chance to flourish. I wonder many conflicts would be avoided if everybody followed the "4 Way Test".

As Rotarians let us never forget the words of the song that we sing while we hold hands and sway at the conclusion of our conferences: **Let There Be Peace on Earth, and Let It Begin with Me.**

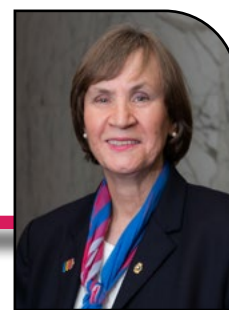
You also may send a donation by mail (The Rotary Foundation, 14280 Collections Center Drive, Chicago, IL 60693, USA) but if so, you must ensure

the donations reach Rotary International before this challenge match ends. The challenge match may be limited to the first 40,000 Foundation Recognition Points.

Contributions of \$100 or more will be matched with the same number of Recognition Points (for example, donate \$100 and get a match of 100 points).

A maximum of 500 points will be awarded per person. Rotarians that are Major Donors or PHF+8 level donors are encouraged to participate but will not receive points. Donors at this level of giving can no longer receive Recognition Points but their gifts certainly are appreciated. Thank you for your leadership giving!

Rotarians also are encouraged to give less than \$100 if a smaller gift better fits their budget.

THE BASIC REQUIREMENTS OF HOSTING:

- 1** Appoint a club member as the student's counselor. The counselor will work with the student and host family to assist them and to involve the student in the life of the club.
- 2** Find two or three host families for the student. The main requirement for being a host family is to provide the student a safe, stable, and loving environment. There is no "ideal" model: host families may or may not be Rotarians, may be younger or older, and may or may not have children in the house. Students have thrived in all kinds of host families.
- 3** Pay the student a monthly allowance of \$125 for ten months.

What is Rotary Youth Exchange?

Youth Exchange is a study-abroad opportunity for young people who spend anywhere from a few weeks to a full year living abroad with a host family, attending school, and enjoying the hospitality of a host Rotary club. It's available both before and after high school graduation.

Am I Qualified? You're qualified if you are 15 to 18-1/2 years old, are above average academically, are flexible and willing to try new things, are open to cultural differences, have demonstrated leadership in your school and community, and wish to serve as an ambassador for our country.

How Much Does It Cost? Costs vary from country to country. Local Rotary clubs generously host students, secure room and board with an appropriate host family, assure free school attendance, and provide students a small monthly allowance. Participants are responsible for roundtrip airfare, insurance, travel documents, extra spending money, and optional travel and tour fees.

How Do I Get Started? Send an email to the Youth Exchange Chair for local Rotary District 7750 (Western South Carolina) to express your interest and we'll help you and your parents decide if this is the right experience for you. YouthExchange@Rotary7750.org

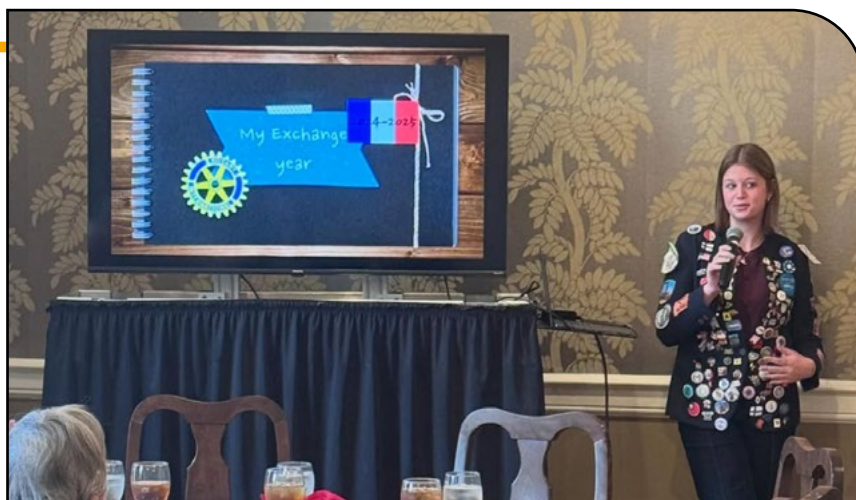

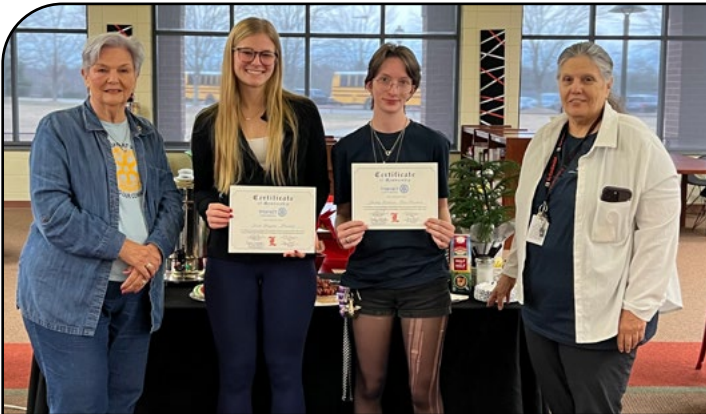

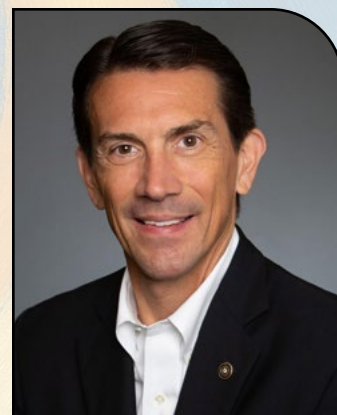

Empowering Service through expertise: Rotary Action Groups (RAGs)

Did you know that your club has access to a global network of experts ready to help your next project succeed?

While our clubs are the heart of Rotary, Rotary Action Groups (RAGs) are the knowledge hubs that power our projects. Whether you are planning a community garden or a large-scale international water project, you don't have to start from scratch. There is a RAG filled with professionals ready to partner with you. RAGs provide the specialized knowledge and strategic oversight necessary to transform local or international initiatives into sustainable, high-impact global projects.

Covering all seven areas of focus, Rotary Action Groups provide specialized expertise in promoting peace, fighting disease, providing clean water and sanitation, saving mothers and children, supporting education, growing local economies, and protecting the environment.

Created in 2005 and recognized by the Rotary International Board, RAGs are autonomous, international groups consisting
